## May be Changes in T. & N.O. Commission

Report that Management May be Taken by Mr. Griffin and an Advisory Committee without Salary be Appointed.

Among a number of rumors and reports it seems to be probable that some changes are contemplated by the new Government, although in answer to a question Hon. Mr. Hepburn said last week that the matter had not been considered. In any event reports that Chairman Lee and the other members of the commission had been let go are at present not according to the facts, no action having been taken. There is a general opinion that the T. & N. O. has been well conducted and has served the North and the province in most effective way and that accordingly changes are hardly in order. On the other hand the Government's plans for economy and reduction of expense are said to make it likely that some changes will be made. In some well-informed circles it is said that the present plan of conducting the T. & N. O. will be altered. The plan involves the appointment of Mr. Griffin as general manager with enlarged power and authority, and the taking away from the commission of active management of the railway. A new commission, it is suggested would serve in advisory capacity and without salary. This commission would be composed of Northern men. The three suggested are:—A. T. Smith, North Bay; Dr. J. A. McInnis, Timmins; and C. A. Byam, New Liskeard. In the meantime, however, there is nothing official about any of the suggestions and no changes are planned for the immediate present according to information from reliable sources.

## Six Beautiful Roses Grow on One Stem

Novelty Grows in Timmins Garden. Horticulturalists Say Occurrence Rare. Roses Especially Beautiful.

Occasionally The Advance is handed a bouquet but usually it is only a verbal one. This week, however, a bouquet was presented to this office, the flowers being actual roses of fine type. There were six lovely roses and they were all on the one stem, a most unusual occurrence, especially with flowers as perfect as in the specimen referred to. Each rose was perfectly formed and a beauty of its kind, the bouquet of six making a charming novelty. This cluster of six roses on the stem grew in a local garden. The flowers were grown from slips purchased at one of the local stores. The rose is known by the name of the "Hugh Dickson" rose. Experts in floriculture asked about the matter say that six roses on the one stem is something very much out of the ordinary and worthy of special note. This cluster of roses growing in novel form make another proof that in the growing of flowers Timmins and the North stand high, indeed.

## Dolfuss Slain by Murder Gang

Dolfuss, head of the state of Austria, has been slain by a murder gang, according to despatches received this morning. The despatches say that all Europe is shaken by the tragedy. Italy is ready to intervene. Berlin repudiates envoy. Loyal troops seize slayers as their chief, Dolfuss, dies. Martial law is declared throughout Austria. Dolfuss bled to death, denied aid of confessor, Austrians were told. Paris and Rome both stirred by the murder. The Reich tells the ambassador at Berlin to pack up. Rome orders border army to stand by. 28 Dolfuss assassins shot. Crowds clamor for lynching as civil war looms. Chancellor's party controls but rebels rampant in some sections. Dr. Rintelen dead. Dolfuss lay dying for five hours, denied a priest. Shot twice. Italy ready to go to war to curb Nazis. France to aid Hitler near Austrian border.

## Those who May Have Beer Licenses Here

Licenses Expected to Arrive This Week. Only Given to Standard Hotels and Authorized Clubs. Only Two of Latter Likely.

While Toronto and other centres throughout the province were celebrating in one way or other the advent of freer beer and wine under the new regulations of the Ontario Government, everything was as usual in Timmins and district this week. Up to date no licenses have arrived in Timmins, and though they are expected to-day, tomorrow or Saturday at latest, it is not known what licenses are granted. The applications were made direct to the department at Toronto, and the licenses will be sent out direct from Toronto to the successful applicants. Under the new regulations licenses to sell beer and wine in beverage rooms can only be secured by approved standard hotels and clubs. The latter can not be of the type that are conducted for private gain. In Timmins there are only a very few clubs eligible to secure licenses. Of these only two have made application for the wine and beer licenses. These are the Canadian Legion, Timmins branch, and the Cercle Canadien, both of which have large memberships and are securing permanent quarters for their clubs. It is expected that both these clubs will be given the licenses.

## Reports of Changes Lack Official Stamp

Rumours of Wholesale Dismissals from Government Service Not Warranted, Says Liberal Party Official.

According to reports and rumours every Government official of every kind in this riding has been dismissed or is about to be discharged. As a matter of fact, however, there have been no changes here and only evidence of one or two official indications of contemplated changes. Officers of the Liberal party in town say that no wholesale dismissals have been considered and that men who have given good and faithful service and performed their duties efficiently are not in any danger. There may be some positions discontinued in the interests of economy and some changes necessary for better efficiency, but broadly speaking there is nothing radical contemplated in the way of dismissals or changes in public servants. Rumours, however, keep very busy. For instance in the positions under the Liquor Control Board there are constant reports of changes said to be made or impending. In these reports only one has actual official support in any way at the present time. It is understood that the management of the brewery warehouse will be changed, D. Martin to be replaced by another appointed. H. Charlebois is said to be the choice to succeed Mr. Martin if the latter is replaced at the brewery warehouse. No other officials have received word of dismissal or change, so far as is known. There may be some changes later, but these have not yet been announced. In regard to the dropping of work on the roads, this is said to be a matter simply to assure the garnering of the harvest so badly needed. In any case there would have been difficulty in keeping enough men at the work if the settlers looked to their own interests, it is pointed out. As soon as the coming month is over work will be resumed on the roads, and assurance is given by local leading Liberals that there will be no neglect of Northern roads. Indeed, Liberals are hopeful that the North will get more attention and assistance than before when the plans of the present Government get going rightly.

## Lieut.-Governor of Kiwanis Pays Visit to Timmins Club

R. J. Carter, of Kirkland Lake, Lieutenant-Governor of Kiwanis for the Northern Division, on Official Visit to Timmins Club on Monday. Delivers Inspiring Address on the Aims and Purposes of Kiwanis. "Service" the Keynote.

At the weekly luncheon of the Timmins Kiwanis Club at the Empire hotel on Monday the club was honoured by an official visit from Lieutenant-Governor R. J. Carter of the Northern Division. The Kiwanis Lieutenant-Governor, who is a member of the club in his home town of Kirkland Lake, has always taken a keen interest in Kiwanis activities. This was his first visit to Timmins in official capacity and he was given hearty welcome.

President Vince Woodbury presided at Monday's luncheon and carried through the business of the meeting with efficiency and despatch. He extended sincere welcome to the Lieutenant-Governor both as a neighbour from the friendly town of Kirkland Lake, as an old-timer of the North, and also for his capacity as head of the Northern Division of the Kiwanis.

Mr. Kinkel, of the Buffalo Ankerite Mine, was welcomed as a new member of the Timmins Kiwanis Club. He

will receive the formal initiation ceremony at the next meeting. Mr. Kinkel made a brief address thanking the members for their welcome and touching on the value of service clubs to the community and to the individual.

In opening his address Lieutenant-Governor Carter extended greetings from his home club of Kirkland Lake. He complimented the Timmins club on its progress and the good work it was accomplishing. He thought the bulletins of the meetings were outstanding in the district for their pep and interest. After visiting many of the clubs in the division he was impressed with the grip that Kiwanis ideals had on the members of various clubs and the value of Kiwanis to better citizenship and broader living.

South Porcupine Lad Thrown Against Windshield of His Father's Car When Collision Occurs.

There was an accident at Schumacher on Wednesday of this week at 1:30 p.m., a boy of eight years being taken to the hospital as a result of the collision of two cars. The accident appeared much more serious than it turned out to be, the boy not being badly hurt and the other occupants of the two cars escaping injury, while the damage to the cars was not very serious. The two cars accidentally collided and the accident would not have appeared different to scores of similar accidents had it not been for the eight-year son of the driver of the one car being thrown against the windshield of the car and sustaining a deep cut over one eye as well as some minor bruises. The boy, son of Mr. Huot, of South Porcupine, was rushed to St. Mary's hospital where he is recovering in fine shape and is expected to be out of the hospital to-day or to-morrow. He fortunately escaped any serious injury from the accident. The driver of the other car was G. Dennis, of Schumacher. Police investigated the occurrence and found it one of those accidents that may occur at any time.

## Liquor Control Dept. Now Under Premier Hepburn

Administration of the Liquor Control Act has been transferred from the Attorney-General's Department to the Department of the Provincial Treasury and the Ontario Hydro has been transferred from the Prime Minister's department to that of the Attorney-General, Premier Hepburn announced at Toronto on Tuesday. The Premier explained that as Attorney-General Roebuck is a Hydro commissioner, he will answer for its operations on the floor of the House and therefore it is advisable to have it placed in his department. Opposition attacks on the Liquor Control Act will be answered by the Premier himself as a result of change in jurisdiction which now places the act under the direction of the treasury department, of which he is head.
