Announce Garden Contest of the Horticultural Society

Prize Lists Issued This Week Give Details of the Annual Garden Competition in Town. Also Classes and Prizes for Flowers and Vegetables at the Annual Exhibition on Monday and Tuesday, Sept. 3rd and 4th.

The Timmings Horticultural Society this week issued its annual prize list for flowers and vegetables at the tenth annual exhibition to be held at the curling rink, Timmings, on Monday and Tuesday, Sept. 3rd and 4th.

The neat little prize list shows a large array of prizes for the different classes of flowers and vegetables.

Prominent in the prize list is the announcement of the annual garden competition and this feature should arouse very general attention. All entries for the garden competition must be in on or before Thursday, August 30th. The entries may be left with Geo. Corless, 32 Messines avenue, or Geo. Hogg, Box 2293. The gardens will be judged on Saturday, Sept. 1st. The following are the prizes for the garden competition:—

Hollinger Townsite gardens only—1st, 2nd, 3rd prizes donated by Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines; 4th prize by Canadian Industries Limited; 5th prize by Timmings Provisions Co.; 6th prize by A. J. Shragge, Limited; 7th prize, by L. Halperin.

Gardens 30 feet and under—1st prize donated by Robt. Simpson Limited, 2nd prize, by C. F. Huckerby; 3rd, by Yolles Furniture Co.; 4th, by Goldfield Drug Co.; 5th by Swift Canadian Co.

Gardens over 30 feet to 60 feet (Hollinger townsite excluded)—1st prize donated by T. Eaton Co.; 2nd prize, by Ideal Hardware; 3rd, by Canadian Packers; 4th, by Northern Ontario Power Co.

Gardens over 60 feet—1st prize donated by Marshall-Ecclestone, Limited; 2nd prize, by Canadian Industries, Ltd.; 3rd, by Beatty Bros.

Measurements of gardens stated are frontage as measured inside of fence. Owing to larger membership and to encourage new members, the Hollinger Townsite has been placed under

separate heading. This eliminates the possibility of two prizes being awarded to one garden and so extends the prize list, but it does not alter the possibility of a townsite garden being the best garden of its kind in town.

The prize list shows a long list of classes in cut flowers, annual, perennial, fancy baskets and bouquets of cut flowers, house plants, flowering house plants, foliage, vegetables, etc. In addition to the regular classes there are four special exhibits of vegetables for which valuable prizes are to be awarded.

Special prizes are also offered in several of the classes. The specials include a silver cup donated by N. A. Timmings for the most points in the show. First prize counts 3 points; second prize 2 points, third prize, 1 point. The cup is to be won three times before becoming the absolute possession of the exhibitor.

Forty-four Cases at Police Court Here

Big Court This Week, but Not a Record Variety of Cases. Many Pleas of Guilty. Some Juvenile Cases.

The re-organized Timmings police force with Acting Chief R. Paul in charge and Sergeants Mervin Salley and L. Gagnon on active duty, is busy at present and this week had an extra large docket for police court, though by no means a record. There were 44 cases in all, including seven cases in the Juvenile Court. In connection with the latter it is interesting to note that the Juvenile Court cases include a case of a man charged with receiving stolen goods, the police believing that temptation to steal is greatly reduced if there are none ready to buy or receive the purloined goods. Three of the boys in Juvenile Court were charged with theft, the goods being picked up in a store, two others were charged with receiving and the other lad faces the more serious count of breaking and entering. All the Juvenile Court cases were remanded for a week, the C.A.S. superintendent being out of town.

V. Coursal was sentenced to two months for theft when found guilty of taking goods from the Chas. Pierce store. The specific articles taken, according to the charge, were roofing paper and a keg of nails. The evidence showed that the accused while in the employ of Mr. Pierce had been taking goods from the store and disposing of them for private gain. Gaston Goulet, who was found last week in the International hotel with

some liquor, ownership of which he claimed, this week pleaded guilty to the charge of having liquor without a permit and was fined \$100.00 and costs, the fine and costs being paid forthwith.

There were seven different cases under the Master and Servants Act. Three of the defendants in these cases were ordered to pay the amount of wages found due. The four other cases were against the one man for wages said to be due and unpaid to four complainants. These cases were remanded for a week.

The police have been active in seeing that the highway traffic rules and regulations are observed for the safety of the public. Three charged with speeding paid \$10.00 and costs each on Tuesday. Each of the three pleaded guilty. There was one reckless driving case, a fine of \$10.00 and costs being imposed. Three were fined \$2.00 and costs for failing to stop at intersections. Another case of this sort was remanded. A driver whose brakes were said to be defective was remanded for a week. A remand was also made in the case of a driver who failed to produce his driving license when the police requested same. There was an interesting case of reckless driving where the charge was laid by the one motorist against the other driver concerned in a collision. The driver against whom the charge of reckless driving was laid was a woman and the case was remanded for a week to allow service of the summons on the defendant in the case.

There were several assault cases, both plain and fancy. One man charged with hitting or kicking a girl friend was remanded for a week. Another man faced two charges of assault; he was also given a remand for

a week. Still another assault charge brought a penalty of \$10.00 and costs. A woman had a charge against her husband for assaulting their son, the wife's story suggesting that the man threatened the use of a knife; this case was remanded for a week.

The charge of attempted suicide against M. Driscoll, laid by Provincial Officer Pretorius, was dismissed.

A vagrancy charge was dismissed by the magistrate, as was also a wife's maintenance case.

Three of the unadorned common drunk variety pleaded guilty and contributed the usual ten dollars and costs.

Some arrests were made on Tuesday after court to give a foundation, as it were, for the cases in court for next week.

Rev. Ben Spence Again on Warpath Against Booze

Rev. Ben Spence, for many years famous for his battle against liquor selling, is reported from Toronto as again on the warpath. For some years past little has been heard of Rev. Mr. Spence in Ontario. Much of the time it is said he has been in the United States lecturing on liquor. On Tuesday, however, Rev. Mr. Spence made the rounds of the hotels opening beverage rooms that day in Toronto and he is reported by Toronto papers as expressing himself Tuesday evening as follows:—

"To-night I saw conditions that I had hoped would never be witnessed in my native city of Toronto," he said. "I remember the old bar-room with its mauling sounds and disgusting smells, but it was largely a masculine

proposition. These new beverage rooms with their mixed crowds out-revel the old bar.

"Fully forty per cent. of the drinkers in the Royal York and King Edward were women, mostly indeed mere girls.

"If the liquor sold was not intoxicating, then the imbibers were mighty fine actors, for many of them gave perfect imitations of various degrees of tipsiness.

"For myself I have renewed my vows of hostility to the whole damnable liquor traffic. This condition must be ended. It will be ended. The moral sense of Canadians will assert itself."

TECKOTTO MINES TAKES OVER THE OLD SWASTIKA MINE

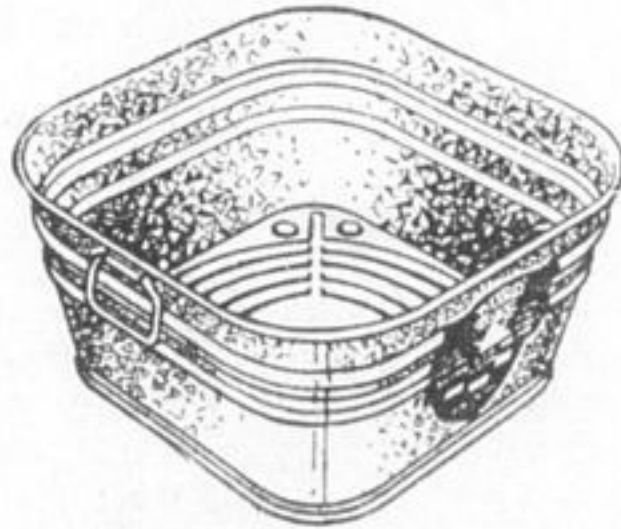
Teckotto Gold Mines, Ltd., has been formed to take over the property of the old Swastika Gold Mines. E. S. Sayer & Co. has underwritten the share issue and report that official reports from the old mine showed on a bulk test of 530 tons of ore the milling produced 230 ounces of gold. Share offering to the public is now being made.

It is proposed to dewater and reopen the Swastika Mine, now known as the Teckotto; to test a number of veins by diamond drilling; to install hoisting and drilling machinery and to install a 50-ton mill.
