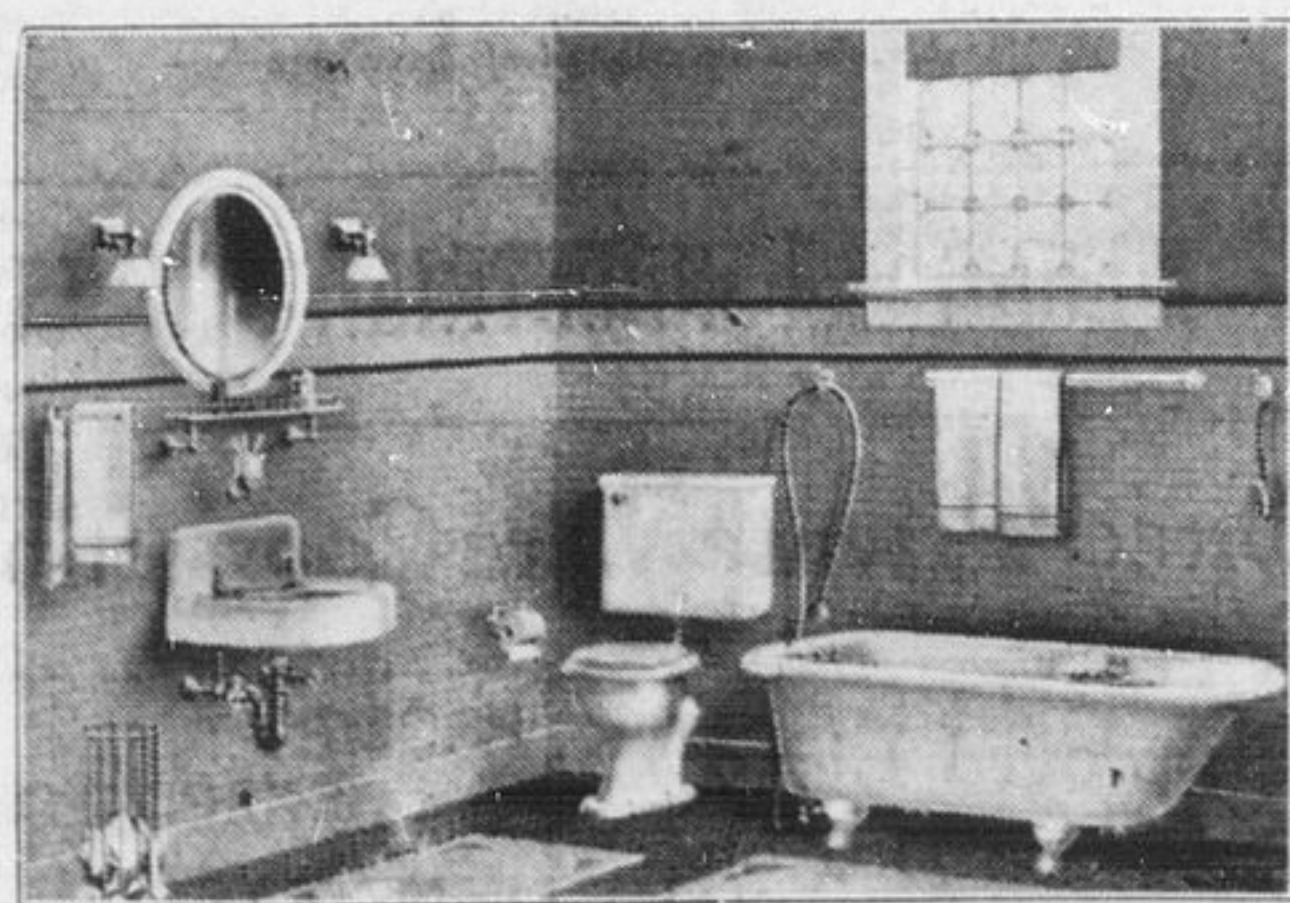
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McIntyre and Southampton in a 1-1 Tie at End of Overtime

Asking Amendment of Parking By-Law

Merchants Find Twenty Minutes' Restriction Too Brief and Not Convenient for the Buying Public.

A petition signed by 82 downtown merchants and professional men is being presented to the town council this (Thursday) through the Timmins Merchants' Association, requesting that By-law 444 which deals with the parking regulations be amended.

This decision by the merchants came after carefully observing the effect of the newly-enforced 20-minute parking restriction had upon the buying public and visiting motorists. The opinions were unanimous that the time was all too short for the convenience of anyone. Women shoppers were often distressed by the fact that 20 minutes hardly allows them sufficient time to visit the stores and make their needed selections, many preferring not to come down town at all to the inconvenience to which one is subjected, in parking.

The petition to the council is accompanied by a recommendation that the parking limit be extended to one hour in certain zones from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. only.

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Cancellation Many Timber Leases Soon

Such is Report from Toronto, New Government Said to be Planning Wholesale Cancellation for Non-Payment of Fees.

A despatch this week from Toronto suggests that with the return to the city in a week or so of Hon. Peter Heenan, Minister of Lands and Forests, there will be a wholesale cancellation of timber leases negotiated by the former Ontario Government. The despatch continues as follows:—"It was authoritatively learned at the parliament buildings on Friday last that companies now in default upon timber leases to the extent of more than one million dollars have been advised that unless all payments now owing the Provincial Treasury are made within fourteen days same will be cancelled. The government has ascertained that almost a score of Northern Ontario companies are holding timber leases upon which nothing has been paid for several years. Most of these were negotiated at barely above the minimum allowed by Ontario Statute. After having been granted it is claimed, that the last government cut the rentals below that actually required by Statute in many cases amounting to 50 per cent. Even in such cases it is charged that the Ontario government has collected nothing. Orders-in-councils reducing such amounts will be cancelled at once and the original contract, demanded, regardless of the fact that present market prices for pulp paper practically precludes companies from paying off such deficiencies.

"Premier Mitchell Hepburn asserted that such cancellation of timber leases rested with Hon. Peter Heenan who declined to comment thereon. The only change admitted by Premier Mitchell F. Hepburn Friday concerned Charles F. Greer timber operator of Kenora. In former years Mr. Greer collected 30 cents a tie. This was dropped in 1931 to 18 cents a tie eventually reaching 10 cents early in 1933. Later last year Mr. Greer collected 14 cents per tie. According to Premier Hepburn Mr. Greer cut 392,000 ties in 1933 but these were not all cut on his own leaseholds. Eighty-seven thousand were cut off Crown lands," said Mr. Hepburn, "and these will have to be paid for at once by Mr. Greer. The price we have fixed is 20 cents a tie." At the present time arrears in timber dues amount to \$1,500,000. Unless these are paid up at once all will be cancelled. Premier Hepburn has given Hon. Peter Heenan instruction to make the Lands and Forests Department pay their way. Regardless of present pulp prices, every company which has been granted concessions by the government is going to pay up or forfeit their grants. While the announcement of all cancellations will not be made until after the by-election in Kenora, it is said the government is already negotiating new agreements on more favourable terms upon properties now in arrears."
