Len Wadsworth Lost Title in Boxing Final

"At long range Shawyer was definitely superior, scoring with a left hook. The judges were divided in their verdict, one calling Shawyer and the other Wadsworth. The referee cast the deciding vote for the Englishman."

Comment on Decision
There is a similar report of the event in The Toronto Globe, while in his column, "Highways of Sport," M. J. Rodden, sports editor of The Globe, writes as follows:—

"Canada's Empire Games boxing team, it must be confessed, was a disappointment. The mitt contests finished yesterday with no titles won by the competitors from this country. At the same time, and without making excuses, it is to be gathered from Canadian Press cables that Canada should have had two, and perhaps three, titles. It is reported that the decision against Maxie Berger, Montreal flyweight, was a questionable one, and that against Len Wadsworth, of Hamilton even worse. Wadsworth, a hard puncher, was forced to engage in three bouts yesterday. He won the first two by knockouts and was declared loser of the third, although the fans and critics took issue with the decision, a split one. His opponent was guilty of repeated holding, and it is hard to understand how the decision was arrived at in England, a country in which boxers guilty of holding are penalized severely by the judges. The other Canadian who might have won is Sammy Tomlinson, but he has only himself to blame. He allowed his opponent to do the leading for two rounds and only in the third did the Toronto boy show his real form—too late to overcome the victor's early lead. The showing of Old Country boxers in winning six of the eight titles is exceptional, and goes to prove that there still is plenty of good boxing material in Old England."

Dangerous Fire is Stopped by Brigade

Blaze at Kist Beverages Looked Like a Serious One, but was Extinguished by Firemen with Only a Small Loss.

On Saturday evening about 8.30 there was a fire alarm call to No. 2 Cedar street south, the property of the Kist Beverage Co., owned and operated by Mr. Marrinacci. At first it looked as if the blaze was going to prove a dangerous one and might cause damage to other buildings as well as to the one in which it commenced. Chief Rolland, however, had his old rule in force—that a fire must never be allowed to get out of the building in which it starts, and also that other old rule of his that the firemen are there to extinguish fires as quickly as possible and with the least loss possible. Accordingly, the fire was killed by the prompt and effective use of a couple of the big chemical tanks and one water line. There was a big crowd soon gathered on account of the fire and Chief Rolland and his men received many compliments on the able way in which the fire was handled. It was, however, only the usual good work of the chief and his brigade. For a time the fire appeared to be a menacing one and likely to travel, but prompt measures stopped this. The fire apparently started in the upstairs part of the building and seemed to have a good grip before it was discovered. The cause of the fire is not known. Before it was extinguished the fire caused a loss of \$200.00 or more.
