

### Softball Honours to the Moneta Team

Defeated Yolles Team in Two Games in Town League During Week-end. Moneta to Play Iroquois Falls this Week-end.

Two of the best softball games were played over the week-end when Moneta and Yolles played a double-header to decide the championship and the former won both games by the scores of 6-4 and 5-4.

In the first game Yolles started to score in the third the first run being scored on a bad peg to third. A second run came when a wide delivery was made and the catcher failed to hold it. Before the innings was over another run was made by a wild peg to first.

In the fourth Yolles scored again which seemed to put the game on ice. Moneta failed to hit Fox until the sixth frame, when they batted in two runs.

The seventh looked bad for Moneta, as the first two men were put out; the next reached first, and was leading off as the pitcher was getting ready to deliver. Fox protested the man was out, but the umpire allowed him to stay, and Yolles blew up, and Moneta played heads up to score four runs and win the game.

The second game was nip and tuck all the way through.

Moneta took an early lead with three runs in the second and Yolles came back with three in the third.

Moneta got two more in the fourth, with Yolles scoring their other counter in the fifth.

By winning both games Moneta kept their record of winning every game this season.

They play Iroquois Falls this week-end at the Falls and there is a likelihood of a game here the following week-end if it can be arranged. If not a double header will be played at the Falls.

### Campaign for Blind is Successful Again

Tag Day About \$100.00 Better than Last Year. Expect Donations Also to Exceed Last Year. All Donations Not in.

D. B. Lawley, field secretary for the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, left on Wednesday for Iroquois Falls and later in the week will go on to Kirkland Lake for the annual campaign there. Mr. Lawley was in Timmins this time for twenty-two days in which time he organized a very successful campaign to collect finances for the carrying on the good work of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind. Mr. Lawley's first step this year, as in previous years, was to secure an active working committee of local men. In this committee Mr. Lawley had a number of the prominent professional and business men of the camp and to this working committee Mr. Lawley gives most of the credit for the success of the campaign. "And don't forget the generous people of the Porcupine camp," said Mr. Lawley, who added that they gave hearty and kindly support, indeed.

Last year the total raised by the campaign for the camp was \$1,000.00. This year it will be a hundred dollars or more over that mark. This is very satisfactory.

The tag day in Timmins realized \$299.00 this year; the Dome and South Porcupine contributed \$71.50; while Schumacher's tag day on Monday of this week brought in \$100.00. Thus the total tag day receipts were \$471.56. This is an increase of seventy or eighty dollars over last year's tag day.

Up to date donations to the amount of \$350.00 have been received. Some of the most important contributions, however, are yet to come in. There are amounts from the Buffalo-Ankerite, McIntyre, and other mines to come in, while a number of individual subscriptions are also expected. When all the returns are in it is expected that the total will exceed last year by a hundred dollars or more. Any donors to this fund who have not yet made their contributions should do so as soon as possible. For Timmins contributions may be given or sent to F. A. Burt, manager of the Dominion Bank, Timmins, Honorary Treasurer of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, or to W. S. McDowell, manager Bank of Toronto South Porcupine, Honorary Treasurer for that part of the camp.

While in Timmins Mr. Lawley has been doing more than seeing to the progress of the campaign for funds to carry on the good work for the blind, important as the money feature may be. In addition to this, Mr. Lawley has been visiting blind persons in the district and assisting them in different ways. He also arranged for a Timmins blind boy to go to the School for the Blind at Brantford, Ontario. The boy will leave here this week. Other assistance to the blind people in the district has been generously given by Mr. Lawley. Mr. Lawley who was a miner in his younger days has been blind for years. He has hosts of friends in Timmins and district who always enjoy and appreciate his visits to the camp.

### Caught Right in Act of Robbing Jeweler

Young Man Broke Window of Jewelry Store in Moneta. Caught with Some of the Goods on Him.

A young man named Wainman employed in a mine of the district was caught redhanded in a jewelry store robbery on Tuesday morning about 3.30. Constable Cyr was on his beat around the warehouses when he heard a crash of glass and hurried to Pine street to see what had occurred. He saw a man at the broken window of Rame-sever's jewelry store and at once attempted to capture the man. The man took to his heels and for a minute or two made good his escape. The fellow had apparently smashed the window with a stone and then helped himself to the goods in the window. Constable Cyr had no chance to catch the burglar who had too big a start, so the officer simply called the police station and asked that the car be sent to see if the trail could be picked up. In the meantime Constable Cyr slipped round the block and started in the direction taken by the window-smasher. He had not gone far when he met a young man going towards the main part of the town. The officer strolled along as if the approaching man were of no interest to him. "Good evening, officer," said the man when they met. "Good evening," said the constable, and then he said something else, something along the line of an invitation to the young man to come along to headquarters. As they started for the station the man said: "Well, you've got me all right! I've got a couple of clocks in my pocket." So he had. The man explained that he had ran towards the south and then turned around to walk back to his room down town. It was on his way there that the officer had met and recognized him as likely to be the man he saw at the jewelry store window.

All that was missing from the jewelry store was a couple of small clocks and a couple of cheap watches. The watches were later found on the floor. The clocks were recovered from the prisoner. He admitted that he was disturbed by the police before he could do much.

At police court on Tuesday when Wainman was asked to plead guilty or not guilty, he replied that he "was and he wasn't." He admitted to breaking the window and taking the clocks but explained that he was so drunk he did not know what he was doing. The robbery seemed a particularly foolish piece of business all the way through. There was nothing of particular value left in the window and the noise made in breaking the window was almost as effective as a burglar alarm. Yet the police did not think the man was drunk. Wainman was given a term of two months in jail on the charge of breaking and entering.

## Baseball Championship of North Goes to Frood Team

Clever Team from Sudbury Trims McIntyre Team. McIntyre Won One Game, Tied One and Lost Two Here to Lose the Series. Frood Team Left Sunday to Play in the E. O. B. A. Series as Representatives from the North.

The Northern Ontario championship has been decided and it is now a thing of the past. The Frood Mines sent a ball team up here that showed the Macs how baseball should be played and also showed them just how costly a few errors can be. It is no secret that the Macs played their worst ball of the season in the play-off series with Frood and with the exception of a few players, and very few at that, it was terrible. Carl "Inkey" Wood was one of the few that played ball the way he was expected to and he gave a performance that was even better than ordinary when he sent back the Frood crew without a hit in the first game to give the Macs their only victory.

Lloyd Chambers also gave a good performance that gave the Macs a little longer life when he held Frood to a tie after twelve innings. Johnny Monaghan was, at times spectacular. He was the big factor that enabled Wood to get a no-hit game last Wednesday. Apart from these players the McIntyre team was not so good, or worse.

The Advance, in the following paragraphs attempts to give a concise but descriptive review of the last three games of the series. A detailed report of the first game was given in last week's Advance and a lengthy report of last Friday's game is given elsewhere in this issue.

#### Thursday's Game

The game played last Thursday was a humdinger. The weather was perfect baseball weather and the two teams battled it out for twelve innings without coming to a decision and eventually the game had to be called on account of darkness. The fact that each team only scored a run each tells its own story, a tight battle between two evenly-matched teams. Harry Smith was on the mound for Frood while Lloyd Chambers was chucking 'em over for the Macs.

Frood scored the first run of the game in their half of the second stanza when A. Silver got a life through a fielder's choice and going to second when Adamson let one get by him. Beaver's nice double to centre field scored him. No more runs crossed the plate until the eighth when Harry Cowden started things moving for the Macs. He sent out a hot grounder to left field and stole second. Cybousky brought him in with a single to centre field. The only double play of the long game was engineered by Cowden when he nabbed A. Silver's liner over short and threw the pill to Monaghan to catch Smith away off the bag. Beaver's two-bagger in the second was the only extra-base hit of the game.

#### Friday's Game

Last Friday's game was a very poor excuse for baseball. Frood played heads-up ball but the poorness of the Macs more than offset it, making it poor baseball. O'Donnell pitched a nice game and with the exception of two errors by himself it was possibly the best game he pitched this year. The two errors he did commit were not as bad as some that the rest of the team made. He had no support and although he struck out eight batters, the infield is expected to help him out when a batter does connect with the apple. All of Frood's runs were brought

in or helped around by errors. The final score in this game 7-1 in favour of Frood Mines. A detailed report of this game is given elsewhere in this issue.

#### Saturday's Game

Last Saturday's game, the final of the championship went to Frood by a score of 3-2. Once again poor support of the pitcher and errors spelled defeat for the Macs. "Inkey" Wood pitched a three-hit game; but even at that he couldn't win. The Macs started the scoring in the second frame on a walk, a steal and a sacrifice. Angrignon was the man that scored on Quinn's beautiful sacrifice. A single, an error, a sacrifice and a fielder's choice scored Smith in Frood's half of the same cant. The Macs took the lead again in the fifth when Adamson, a weak hitter, came through with a three-bagger and scored on Angrignon's single over second. In the sixth the Frood nine took the lead again to maintain it till the end of the game. Barnett was given a free trip to the initial sack when he was hit with one of Wood's fast balls. Smith singled and they both worked a double steal. An error by Cybousky let Barnett in with the tying run and another error by Cowden allowed Smith to cross the plate with the winning run. Wood struck out seven, (Ron Silver being the victim four times in four trips), and issued two free trips while he hit one batter. Harold Buck, pitching his second game in two days, struck out three and walked four. Incidentally,

this game was the only one that "Inkey" Wood lost this season. Adamson was the only extra-base hitter clouting out a three-bagger in the fifth. One double play was the only fielding feature. Wood to Cowden to Cybousky.
