Train No. 17.—North Bay to Cochrane, Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Through sleeping car service Ottawa-Mooseonee.

Train No. 18.—Cochrane to North Bay, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday.

Trains Nos. 17 and 18 use Canadian Pacific Railway Station at North Bay.

Trains Nos. 46 and 47.—Through service daily between Toronto and Cochrane, carrying through sleepers between Toronto and Timmins, Toronto and Rouyn, Montreal and Cochrane, and through sleeper Mooseonee to Ottawa. **The Canadian Legion in

No Dealings

On more than one occasion it has been voiced that the Canadian Legion is strictly a non-political organization. Politicians have tried to have the organization enter politics and all kinds of tricks have been tried. At Sault Ste. Marie those who were strongly in favour of beer by the glass tried to swing the provincial command. Their efforts failed and no support was given. Now comes another phase in the fight to keep out of politics. The politicians already equipped with a first-class angler's outfit, are busy baiting their line to hook returned men's votes. It has happened this way:—The Canadian Legion recently made an official announcement that it intends to hold a pilgrimage to France, the unveiling of the Vimy Memorial to be the big occasion. It was to be strictly a Canadian Legion affair, but evidently the Liberal party can see possibilities of making a name for itself, (perhaps some graft also) catching quite a number of votes in the bargain. The fact remains that a Liberal candidate in Toronto last week in addressing his constituents, made the statement in effect: That if elected he would promise that every widow or dependent whose loved ones rest in Flanders Field will have a free trip to France, at the time of the Vimy Pilgrimage. The speaker then went on to show that hundreds of people had never seen the resting places of their loved ones and he would see that this opportunity would be forthcoming. The newspapers do not say whether loud cheers greeted this new election promise. The committee which in charge of the Vimy Pilgrimage will no doubt give their thoughts to the suggestion. Numerous ways can be devised between now and July 1st, 1935, to secure finances necessary to accommodate those dependents who could not afford to pay, if desired. The writer does not think this is the aim behind the big event. There are 69,000 Canadians resting at this time in England and France. If all the dependents of these men stated they would like to go and visit their loved ones' graves, but did not have the finances, could the Canadian Legion or even the Government secure the money to take them? I think not! The idea behind the Vimy Pilgrimage is to provide opportunity to those who served in 1914-1918 to visit again the places they knew so well, to be present at the unveiling of the memorial at Vimy Ridge, and to show once again to our sisters and brothers of the Empire that Canada still stands by the Motherland. The Legion keeps out of politics! Let the politicians keep out of the Legion affairs with the high-flying election promises! If a returned soldier votes in accordance to his own ideas without anyone offering enticing bait, he remains as always a good Legionnaire. Much more could be written on this subject, but a hint is sufficient to put any returned soldier "On Guard!"

Keep On Saving
The boxes for the Christmas Toy campaign are now in town and will be in the stores and other places in town and district this week. The Timmins branch of the Legion wishes it to be known that the toys and candy received for these Buckingham packages will be distributed to the needy children of the camp only. The Legion will hold its Christmas parties as usual, providing its own toys as formerly. This year it is hoped to secure a record number of empties. In the first place there is a larger number of cartons for receiving the packages; secondly, a committee will see that they are emptied regularly; thirdly advertising will be kept always to the fore, directing attention to the collecting boxes. **SUBSBURY TO PROVIDE WORK
FOR MEN ON WINTER RELIEF**

A works programme which will keep the 430 or more physically fit men on relief busy all winter was approved last week by the Subsbury city council. The works are chiefly on streets and roads. In many of the works planned the cost of materials will be practically nothing, the costs being all for labour. It is expected that the cost to the ratepayers will be less than relief costs last winter. Even in view of the fact that less men are expected to be on relief this year, Subsbury will be advantaged by the plan as the city will have valuable improvements for the money spent.

**Moynour's Store at Fort
Matachewan Changes Hands**

A despatch from Matachewan in The Sudbury Star last week gives the following interesting information:—

"A trading post known to prospectors the length and breadth of Northern Ontario changed hands recently when J. B. Moynour, pioneer resident of Fort Matachewan, sold his store on the banks of the Montreal River to Sylvio Bellehumeur, of Ville Marie, Que. Mr. Bellehumeur owns two other stores. Mr. Moynour came to Matachewan when gold was first discovered 25 years ago, and established his post. Until the last three or four years, it was a typical frontier trading post, with Indian fur traders and prospectors its chief clients. When more recent gold discoveries put Matachewan on the map again, Moynour's blossomed into a general store. A year or so ago Mr. Moynour subdivided his property on both banks of the Montreal River, and established the Matachewan townsite. Old-timers still refer to Matachewan as "Moynour's." In addition to his store Mr. Moynour operated a sort of private post office, bringing mail from Elk Lake at his own expense, for the convenience of his customers. Despite the greatly increased work occasioned by the advent of 1,000 or so miners within the last three years, he has continued to handle Matachewan mail without remuneration. He will retain an interest in the store and in the townsite.

"Ville Marie interests are taking an aggressive interest in the new town of Matachewan. O. Herbert, brick and cement merchant of Ville Marie, is building a four-apartment brick building at the corner of Knott and Roche streets. The building has just commenced, the apartments are already rented.

"Matachewan's unofficial one-bear welcoming committee, which was owned by George Reid, and kept at his taxi stand near the bridge, has been sold to Olivier Goulet, of Montreal for \$35.00."

**McNEIL MATACHEWAN TO
SINK SHAFT ON PROPERTY**

Operations are to be resumed shortly on the claims of the McNeil Development Syndicate, in the Matachewan district, Northern Ontario, according to a report by R. J. Jowsey, trustee.

A contract has been let to sink the shaft to 125 feet after which the vein will be drifted on. During the period of inactivity the claims have all been kept in good standing.

The syndicate's properties are situated in McNeil township, about seven miles north of the Ashley. In former operations the shaft was sunk to a

depth of 95 feet and is now to be deepened 30 feet farther. On the property four felsite and porphyry dykes occur, trending east. Three north-south fractures have been traced for some distance and show free gold. A number of quartz veins and veinlets have also been uncovered.

The syndicate is capitalized at 3,000 shares of \$100 par value. R. J. Jowsey, Toronto, is the trustee.

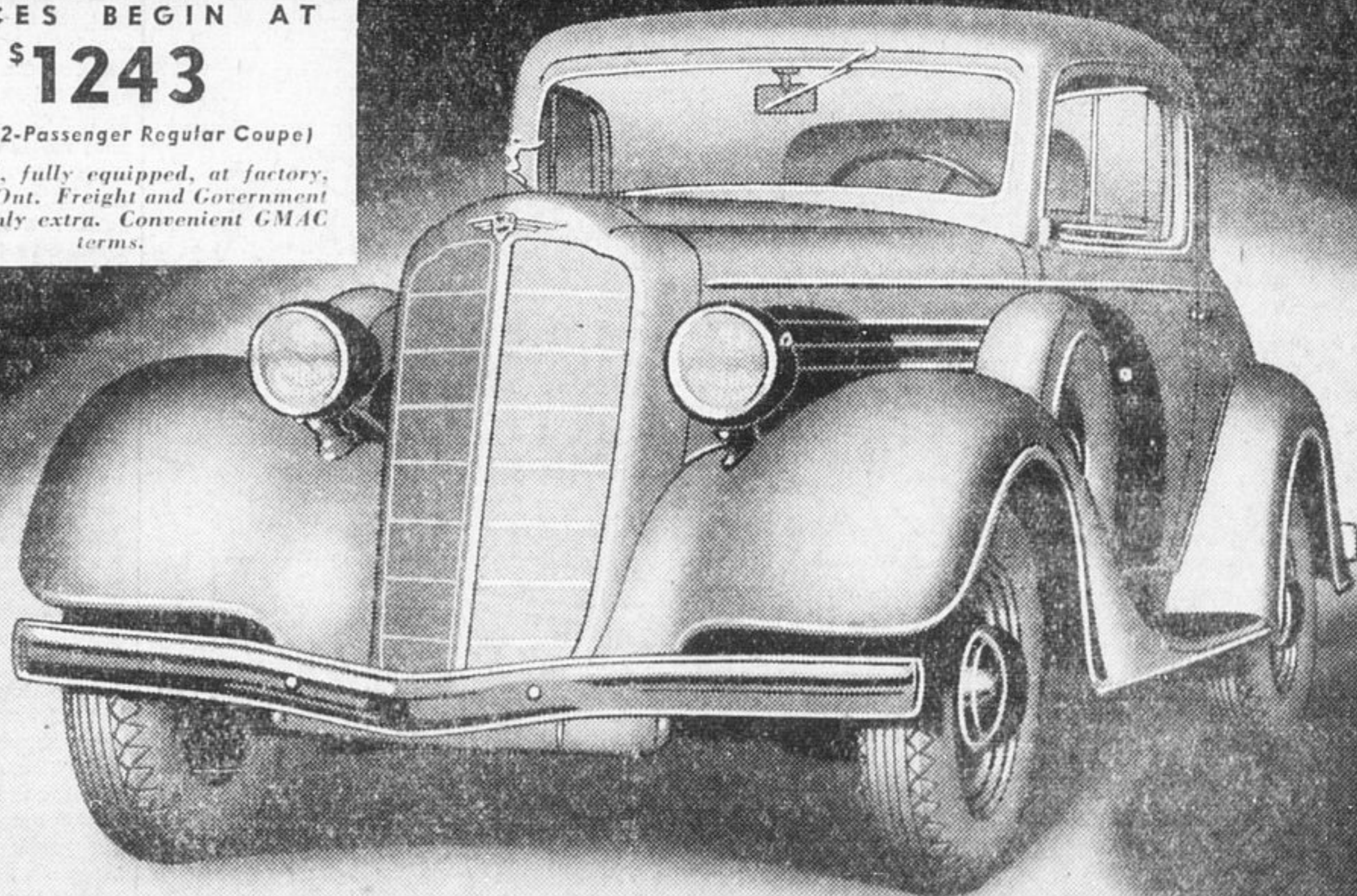
