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## Proactinium Would Pay for Sudbury Rd.

New Metal Worth Million Dollars an Ounce Superior to Radium. Canada has Deposits of Pitchblende, in Which Metal Occurs.

H. A. Preston, old-timer of the North this week sends The Advance the following clipping taken from a daily newspaper:—

"After years of research work Dr. A. V. Brosse, assistant professor of chemistry at the University of Chicago, has succeeded in isolating the world's rarest metal and last week at Cleveland, Ohio, he exhibited to the American Chemistry Society one-tenth of a gramme of the precious substance called proactinium, one ounce of which is worth more than \$1,000,000. Proactinium emits more penetrating rays than radium and has extensive scientific and medical possibilities. It may make possible medical experiments too dangerous to be attempted with radium. The fact that proactinium is 'squeezed out' of pitchblende is of especial interest to Canada, which possesses large deposits."

Commenting on this despatch Mr. Preston says that one or two ounces of this rare mineral would pay for putting the road from Timmins to Sudbury in good shape. He points out that if this mineral comes from pitchblende, there is lots of pitchblende in the Matachewan-Gowganda-Sudbury area along the route of the proposed Sudbury-Timmins road. "Already we have platinum, silver, copper, nickel and gold," says Mr. Preston, "and if any rarer minerals exist in the North, there is no more likely spot to discover them than in the area mentioned. Years ago I was the first to notice that the height of land westward from Montreal River at Matachewan is all split up into mountains of all sizes and great valleys below, as well as lakes. To the east it is a solid rock with towns and auto road and railroad on top of it. Westward all the way to Sudbury is all broken up and this gave me the idea that there must be rarer minerals than gold in these parts."

## Another Reduction in the Price of Explosives

## Kirkland Man Welcomed in Toronto and South

R. J. Carter, of Kirkland Lake, the Lieutenant-Governor of the Northern Division of the Kiwanis Clubs, including Barrie, Cobalt, Kirkland Lake, Midland, New Liskeard, Noranda, Orillia, Owen Sound, Penetang, Sault Ste. Marie, Timmins and Toronto, has made a notable hit in all the places visited in the South, achieving the same regard there as is held for him in the North. Speaking of his visit to Toronto, K-Ray, the official publication of the Kiwanis Clubs says:—

"Lieut.-Governor Dick Carter's official itinerary brought him to the Toronto Club on Wednesday, August 29, where he was heartily received. He delivered a fine address on the philosophy of life and Kiwanis. Dick, a citizen of Kirkland Lake, was accompanied by his son, Alex, an exceedingly bright, happy-countenanced lad, who, no doubt, in later years, will follow in his dad's footsteps of Kiwanis leadership. On Thursday, Aug. 30, Dick visited the Owen Sound Club."

Commenting on the official visit of Lieut.-Governor R. J. Carter at Orillia, where he was introduced to the Kiwanis Club by Dr. R. E. Hipwell, a former Lieut.-Governor, the Orillia Packet and Times says:—"Mr. Carter is an Irishman and tells a story with true native talent, so it was not surprising that his address was well filled in with humour and quotation, which all seemed to have point."

## Attendance Record Down for Local Kiwanis Club

The current issue of K-Ray, the official publication of the Kiwanis Clubs of the Ontario-Quebec-Maritime district, shows that Timmins club is down somewhat from its high attendance records of previous months. K-Ray gives the attendance records by divisions for June and July. In June with twelve clubs in the Northern division Timmins club stands sixth, with 67 per cent. Kirkland Lake is first for June with 81 per cent.; New Liskeard, second, with 77 per cent.; Owen Sound, third, with 76; Noranda, fourth, 73.8; Toronto, fifth, 70 per cent.

The average for the division is 67 per cent. Timmins this is just up to average while in previous months it was among the first few leaders. The average for the five divisions, including 46 clubs in Ontario, Quebec and the Maritimes, is 64.1, so after all Timmins club, even in June can be considered above the average in attendance. The holiday season is responsible for the decreased attendance record.

In July, the record in K-Ray shows that Timmins climbed up to fifth place in attendance. Kirkland Lake was again first with the remarkable percentage for holiday time of 87.9; Noranda, third, 70 per cent.; Owen Sound, fourth, 68.7. The average for Division No. 1 for July was 63.5, so Timmins club in July was above the average. The average for the whole district, including all the five divisions, was 59.8, so Timmins was well over the average for July.

## DIVIDEND AND BONUS BY HOLLINGER CONSOLIDATED

## Offer Student Free Trip to Australia

Particulars Announced of Essay Competition to Make Australia Better Known to Canada. Official Details.

This week The Advance received a letter from L. R. Macgregor, Australian Trade Commissioner in Canada, giving particulars of the Australian essay contest open to students not older than 18 years. The first prize is a free trip to Australia (including rail transportation to Vancouver from student's place of residence by Canadian Pacific Railway, return steamer fare by the Canadian-Australasian Line from Vancouver, and rail transportation in Australia) for the best essay throughout the whole of Canada. Hon. F. H. Stewart, M.P., the Australian Minister of Commerce, has kindly undertaken to provide hospitality for the successful student at his home near Sydney. In addition to the foregoing a money prize of \$50.00 will be awarded for the best essay in each Canadian province.

The purpose of the contest is to "inculcate goodwill towards Australia by Canadians and to stimulate interest in travel to Australia." The Advance is pleased to publish herewith the official review of the conditions of the contest:—

### Conditions of Australian Essay Competition.

With a view to inculcating goodwill towards Australia by Canadians and stimulating interest in travel to Australia, the Commonwealth of Australia offers a free trip to Australia (including rail transportation to Vancouver from student's place of residence, return steamer fare by the Canadian-Australasian Line from Vancouver, and hospitality and rail transportation in Australia) for the best essay throughout the whole of Canada. And also:— A money prize of \$50 will also be awarded for the best essay in each Canadian province.

The following are the conditions of the competition, viz:—

- (1) Essays should be approximately 2,500 words, and may be written in English or in French.
- (2) The age of competing students

shall not exceed 18 years.

(3) In addition to references to Australian history, resources, and development generally, some reference must be made in the essay to the relations of Canada and Australia. At least one Australian product used in the homes of the Canadian people and one Canadian product used in the homes of Australians must be mentioned in the essay.

(4) Students writing essays must have been bona fide students at Canadian schools during at least 3 years prior to the date of the writing of the essay and at the time of writing must be a regularly enrolled pupil of a Canadian High School or Collegiate Institute, or equivalent educational institution.

(5) The essay must be written in the classroom, but may be spread over more than one day at the judgment of the teacher. It should indicate the full name, address and date of birth of the student. The writing of the essay must be the personal work of the student and should not be blind copying from any books or pamphlets, although there is no objection to access to works of reference.

(6) It is stipulated that any high school (or equivalent institution) participating in this competition must arrange for at least 20 essays on Australia to be written by its students. The principal of each high school (or equivalent institution) will determine the best essay in his school and forward the same to the Deputy Minister (or superintendent of Education in his province, so as to reach the Deputy Minister not later than 15th December, 1934. Each essay so forwarded must be accompanied by a certification of the principal of the educational institution concerned, to the effect:—

(a) that such essay in his institution is the original, unaided, and personal work of the student.

(b) that in the principal's belief the age of the student concerned is correctly stated on the essay.

(c) that at least 20 essays were written by students in the institution.

(7) The Deputy Minister (or superintendent of Education in each province) will arrange for a provincial adjudication as between the essays submitted in the province and will select the four essays considered to be the

best among those submitted in the province.

(8) The Deputy Minister (or superintendent) of Education in each province will forward these four best essays to:—The Australian Trade Commissioner in Canada, 15 King Street, West, Toronto, so as to reach that office not later than 15th January, 1935.

(9) The Australian Trade Commissioner will submit the 36 provincial essays to a central committee for determination:—

(a) as to the best essay in each province.

(b) as the best essay in the whole of Canada.

In making final adjudication the central committee will adopt the following scheme of marking, viz:—30 p.c. for facts; 45 p.c. for deduction and vision; 5 p.c. for spelling; 10 p.c. for style and originality; 10 per cent. for neatness.

(10) All essays after submission will become the property of the Commonwealth of Australia.

(11) Pamphlets with information regarding Australia for issuance to high schools (and educational institutions) will be sent by the Australian Trade Commissioner to the Deputy Minister of Education in each province, and will be available to principals in reasonable quantities from that source, but not for

indiscriminate issue.

An arrangement is being made to make available to Deputy Ministers a composite silent motion picture film depicting Australian scenery, industry, and resources and facts regarding Australia, for showing in such high schools (or educational institutions) where facilities are available.

(12) The Australian Trade Commissioner will make a special tour across Canada, visiting principal centres, under an itinerary to be arranged with the Deputy Ministers and will be available for conference with principals at all main points.

Further information may be obtained from the Deputy Minister of Education in each province, or from the Australian Trade Commissioner, 15 King Street, West, Toronto.
