**NORTHERN DEVELOPMENT WORKERS GO OUT ON STRIKE**

With a strike in the Westminster penitentiary in British Columbia, nothing in the strike line should be considered unusual. There are lots of strikes these days, the strikes at the lumber camps in the Abitibi area being some of the strikes in progress at the moment.

One of the latest strikes and one that will attract a little special attention on account of some of its features is the strike reported from Gogama. More than 100 employees of the Ontario Northern Development branch at Gogama went out on strike on Sunday. They "demanded" 26 days' work each month with \$2.00 per day as pay. Can you guess where they got this "demand" stuff?

According to the despatches the new regulations are that they work only for the amount of relief they receive at the rate of 25 cents per hour. Single men have been working half time and married men full time.

It is said that the strikers have picketed the roads in the area affected by the strike and none are allowed to work during the strike. Threats are reported as used towards any who show any disposition to work in the strike area. Road Supervisor Napoleon Dupuis was ordered by the picketers to remain quietly at home and it would be all right for him for the present. He was given to understand, however, that if he tried to carry on the work it would be too bad for him.

In referring to the matter a despatch from Gogama says:—"The road work being done at Gogama is part of the relief works programme of the Department of Northern Development, it was stated today at the Sudbury branch of the department. If the men decline to work for their relief, it is probable that relief will be refused. That, however, is a matter for provincial relief authorities to determine."

**Six Nations Stand by the Gold Basis, at Geneva**

Six European nations still backing their currency with gold this week at Geneva at the League of Nations conference were pledged to stand pat on the gold standard for "the economic and financial restoration of the world" Belgium, France, Holland, Italy, Switzerland and Luxemburg joined in the assertion that "the maintenance of the present parties appears to us to be one of the essential conditions" of that restoration.

They agreed further, in the course of their conferences "to entrust to a commission composed of the delegates of the respective governments the task of examining the principal problems raised by development of the economic and financial relations between the six nations."

A communique issued by the conference emphasized however, that stimulation of such relations would be undertaken "without neglecting the interests of other countries and the necessity of more extended collaboration on an international basis."

The statement declared that the gold bloc "wishes to emphasize that their initiative is directed against no nation"

**Hollinger Management Setting Good Example**

The Toronto Mail and Empire on Tuesday of this week had the following good words to say in regard to Hollinger:—"The management of Hollinger Consolidated Gold has just given a fine illustration of its appreciation of responsibility to shareholders and to the investigating public. It will be recalled that last week the stock hit a new high of \$21.65 on the local market; and though the company has been doing remarkably well in the way of dividends there was a general feeling on the street that something more than a laudable dividend policy was playing a part in pushing the stock up the scale. So a variety of rumors began to circulate. One of the rumors was that Hollinger had hit it particularly well on its new property in Hislop township in the Beauty-Munro area.

A private engineer not connected with Hollinger, who, it was understood, had an opportunity to look over the property, came back with the observation that Hollinger had \$55,000,000 worth of ore blocked out to the 500-foot level on its new holdings. That was naturally bullish, and the statement, when spread around the street, must have had some bearing on public attitude towards Hollinger stock.

"Now N. A. Timmins, president of Hollinger, has come out with the following: "That statement is manifestly an error, as sufficient work has not been done to justify any estimate of ore in sight. It is true that diamond-drilling results were favourable, but it will take several months' development before it would be fair to make any statement about the property."

"Of course it is recognized here that the president of a company cannot come out and correct or endorse every rumor which the street sees fit to start about the operations or prospects of his company; but Mr. Timmins has made it obvious that a few words are all that is necessary to keep a sane public attitude towards a company's activities. The chances are almost certain that, if some statement had not come officially from Hollinger, that \$55,000,000 estimate would have gradually worked itself into \$100,000,000. Favourable rumors have a way of growing like that. The Hollinger management accordingly deserves a pat on the back. If the managements of all mining organizations in Canada would follow the same procedure, the mail which reaches this office would not be filled with protests against stock market action of certain stocks; and there would be less insistence that somebody should start a campaign to introduce stock market control in Canada along the lines which have been adopted in Washington."
