to the reductions not going into effect before the end of the year. Mr. Day replied that the rates applied to all parts of the system and not to Timmins alone. The bookkeeping alone for 10,000 customers was a matter of importance and had to be done in the most economical way.

In answer to Mr. Bartleman's complaint in regard to variation of voltage, Mr. Day did not think the variation would be apparent. There had been no complaints to the company. Sometimes an overloaded transformer would cause this difficulty but it was remedied as soon as known.

Councillor Bartleman called attention to the difference in rates for street lighting at Timmins and Port Arthur. There were 4000 street lights at Port Arthur and only 404 here, because this town could not afford more. "It is the worst-lighted town in America," said

Says that Morro Castle Destroyed by Fire Bombs

According to a despatch from New York this week, the Morro Castle was destroyed by three separate fires, beginning almost simultaneously, Arthur J. Pender, night watchman on duty when the flames were discovered, told the U.S. Department of Commerce investigation board on Tuesday.

Furthermore, he continued, he was convinced the flames he saw first came from burning chemicals, they looked like such flames, and he smelled odors which he variously described as like benzene or paythna and burning rags.

He told of an explosion "loud" and "intense" which followed shortly after the heat from the blazing lounge had driven him and other fire-fighters to another deck.

"In the light of everything that happened," he stated, "I think that the ship was bombed."

Pender also corroborated the testimony of Acting Captain William F. Warme that Captain Robert D. Willmott, who died of heart failure a few hours before the fire, suspected and feared George I. Alagna, the second wireless operator.

He went even further and asserted that he was suspected Alagna might have set a fire in the No. 5 hold of the liner, a blaze discovered and extinguished on August 27 on the voyage previous to the one that brought the fatal disaster.

Captain Willmott, he said, told him of his fear that Alagna "might do some criminal act," and had instructed him to watch the wireless man closely.

MARRIAGES INCREASE BUT BIRTHS AND DEATHS LOWER

Births registered in 70 cities and towns in August numbered 6,767, an increase of one per cent, as compared with 6,704 in August, 1933, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported on Tuesday. Deaths numbered 3,554, an increase of four per cent, against last year when they numbered 3,423 and an increase of 16 1-2 per cent, in marriages when there were 2,952 as compared with 2,539 in August, 1933.

Births registered during the eight months January-August of this year totalled 53,462, deaths 30,747 and marriages 20,533 against 54,970 births, 30,889 deaths and 18,322 marriages during the corresponding period last year. This comparison shows decreases of three per cent in births and one-half per cent in deaths and an increase of 12 per cent in marriages.
