Death at South End of Mrs. Meiklejohn

South Porcupine Boys have Narrow Escape in Motor Accident. Rectory Practically Completed. Other South Porcupine News.

South Porcupine, Ont., Oct. 3rd, 1934. Special to The Advance.

Another sad occurrence took place in South Porcupine on Monday afternoon when Mrs. Meiklejohn, of Strachan avenue, was found dead by her son, David, in the living-room of their home on his return from work. The doors and windows of the house were locked when he came home—an unusual occurrence—and on breaking in through a back window he was shocked to find his mother lying dead with a wound in her throat. Assistance was immediately obtained, but death had taken place some time previously. No inquest was deemed necessary, as conclusive circumstantial evidence proved that the poor woman had undoubtedly taken her own life. Loneliness since the death of her husband was given as the probable cause of the act. Mrs. Meiklejohn was of Scotch birth, and had lived in Canada for some years—the last three years being spent in South Porcupine. Neighbours and friends testify to her worth and character, and all are deeply grieved over this sad circumstance. Her sisters and two brothers arrived from Toronto on Tuesday, and the remains will be taken to Toronto and be buried beside her husband.

We are sorry to hear that little Hilda Harry who was struck by a car on Crawford street, north, two weeks ago, is still under the doctor's care, and is suffering from the effects of the accident.

Ray Binch and his brother, Hilton, were returning from New Liskeard on Tuesday morning by car when they collided with an oil truck on the bridge at Swan Lake, some ten miles north of Swastika. The car went over into the river, but the two boys managed to get out and with the exception of a cut on Hilton's wrist and a few bumps and scratches were none the worse for the accident. As it occurred between 2 and 3 a.m. in darkness, the boys were lucky indeed. They came on to South Porcupine later in a friend's car.

Ulysses Levinson parked his car outside his store on Golden avenue one day last week and came back to find it gone. It was found on Tuesday in Kirkland Lake in a ditch with several parts missing. The police notified "Uly" and he went down yesterday to bring it up. No trace has yet been found of the thieves.

The rectory is a seven-roomed house, fitted with all modern conveniences. A considerable amount of voluntary labour has been given to the erection of this building, and the committee in charge is grateful for the practical and financial help given. A pleasing note is that assistance has been tendered from persons not of the Anglican faith—all working together for the good of the community. Dr. Woodall and his worthy wife are too well known among us for any eulogy here, but the general feeling among us all is, that after the years spent by both, in the furtherance of Christian work in the North, and for many years under primitive conditions, nothing that we can do for their comfort now is too much to offer. Much effort is still needed to clear off the necessary debt incurred in the erection of this building and the parish hall in process of erection next to it, but we know that time will prove—as it has done before—that South Porcupine can rise to an emergency and will work for this end.

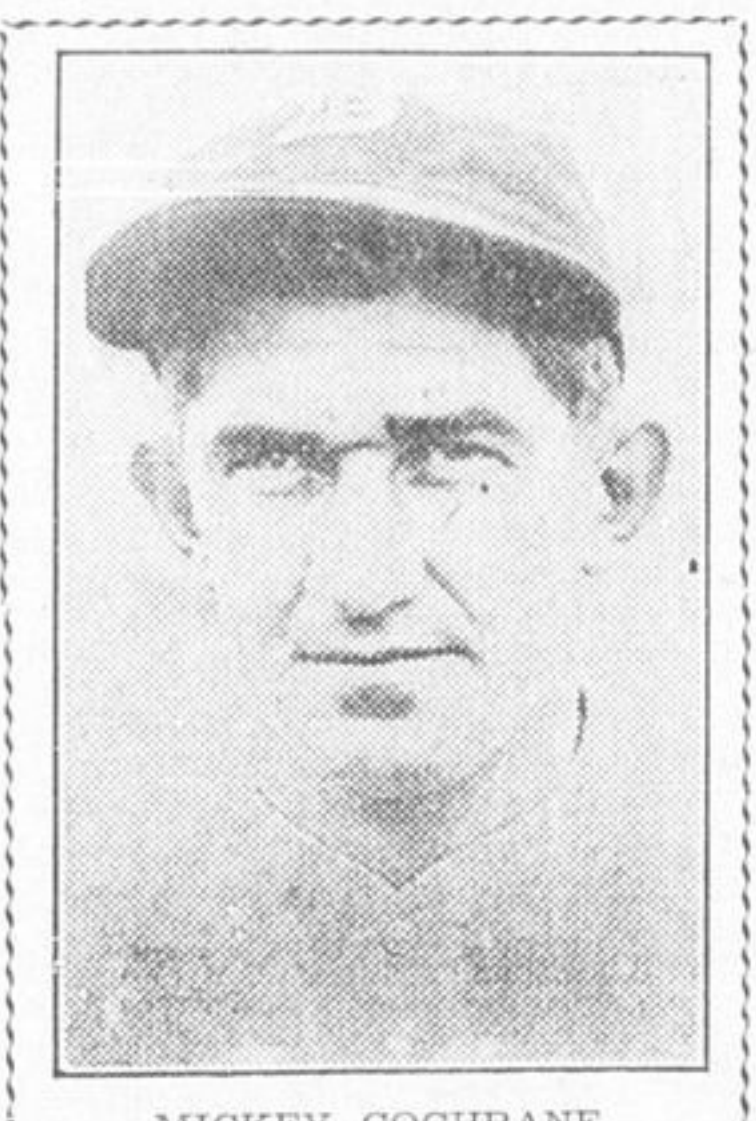

Says Bruce Avenue Centre of South End

Old-Timer Notes Growth of South Porcupine and Looks for Still More Notable Growth in that End of Camp

Writing this week from South Porcupine H. A. Preston, old-timer of the North says in part:—

"By the looks of things at South Porcupine, Bruce Avenue will be the main business street of the city of South Porcupine. Already brick and cement buildings are in course of erection. Every time a new gold discovery is made in Ontario they say it will beat Porcupine or Kirkland. But don't forget that Porcupine is just beginning, especially at its eastern end. It is in that direction (eastward) that all the mines at the west end are headed. Hollinger no doubt put faith in the McIntyre, and they stuck to it and made another big mine. If Hollinger had not turned out as good as it has proved to be it would have been much harder for McIntyre to continue. Well then, look at the Big Dome all alone all this long time. There surely is something as good or better adjoining it. There's gold all around South Porcupine and Porcupine Lake and right on to Three Nations Lake besides quite nice chances to the south, where Arcadia is getting good results. Only a few minutes run in a car to Nighthawk also. So you see they will have to hustle to beat Old Porcupine. I don't think Porcupine will ever be beaten. With a big mine at its east end and the one that started the gold fever 25 years ago and which has mined seventy-millions, and two more big ones at the west that has mined hundreds of millions of dollars' worth of gold, how could anyone think that there are no more big ones. Don't fool yourself, there lots more. Let me ask a question:—From the time that the T. & N. O. train leaves Golden City till it gets to Schumacher how many millions of dollars in gold is there for a quarter of a mile on each side of the track? I say myself that there is double what Porcupine has produced to date. Central Porcupine Mines will get a nice share of it. If diamond drilling were done between Connaught Hill Crossing and Dome Crossing at a few places the results would be encouraging. One good look at the Dome in the distance would make anyone believe there's a wonder mine there.

Sudden Death Oct. 4 of James Campbell

Well-Known and Popular Resident of Camp Dies Suddenly from Heart Trouble. Was in Timmins 13 Years.

Hosts of friends were shocked this week by the sudden death of James Campbell, a well-known and well-liked resident of the camp for the past 13 years. He was dressing about 6.35 p.m. at the fire hall when he complained of pains around his heart. A doctor was called and the sick man hurried to St. Mary's hospital where he passed away less than an hour after the heart attack.

The late James Campbell was very popular here in sporting circles, being an enthusiast in most sports. He was at the McIntyre Recreation hall for some years. Recently he has been at the swimming pool. He was a volunteer fireman and a favourite of the fire hall. At the time of death he was fifty-four years of age. He was born in Ayrshire, Scotland, but came to Schumacher from Winnipeg where he had worked in railway work. A niece, Mrs. Green, resides in Schumacher, and a sister lives at Winnipeg. These are the only relatives that could be located after his death.

The funeral took place on Wednesday afternoon with the services conducted by Rev. Bruce Millar of the United Church. The volunteer firemen and paid firemen, were present in a body at the funeral. There were many beautiful floral tokens from the paid firemen, the volunteer firemen, the Girl's Softball team which he had coached for the T. F. D., and from other organizations and associations. Interment was made at Timmins. Pinned on his breast in the coffin was the medal awarded him for good service to the volunteer fire department.
