Rev. Peter Bryce, D.D., a leading figure in the United Church of Canada, and for many years prominent in social work in Ontario, is coming to the North for a brief tour of public meetings and social study.

Among other places in the North, Rev. Dr. Bryce will speak at the following centres on the dates indicated:

- Oct. 12th—At Iroquois Falls.
- Oct. 13th—At Connaught.

Oct. 15th—At Kiwanis Club luncheon at Timmins, and supper meeting at Schumacher United Church.

In regard to Rev. Dr. Bryce's meetings on Monday, Oct. 15th, at Timmins, it is worthy of note that these two meetings will be of particular interest. At the supper meeting at Schumacher United Church Rev. Dr. Bryce is to speak on "Robbie Burns and Brotherhood." As he is an able and eloquent speaker this address will be of outstanding interest. The Schumacher United Church is giving a cordial invitation to all to come and hear this address.

In several areas Dr. Bryce is expected to visit the new settlements. At Cochrane he will take part in the 25th anniversary of the United Church.

Dr. Bryce first came to leadership in Canada as student-pastor of a large settlement of newly-arrived settlers from the old country in the Earlscourt suburb of Toronto. On several occasions he was delegated to social congresses on various problems. He became first chairman of the Mothers' Allowance Board of Ontario. He is now secretary of the Missionary and Maintenance committee of the United Church.

After the ceremony a reception was held at the home of the bride's parents, First avenue. Mr. and Mrs. Simmons will reside in Schumacher.

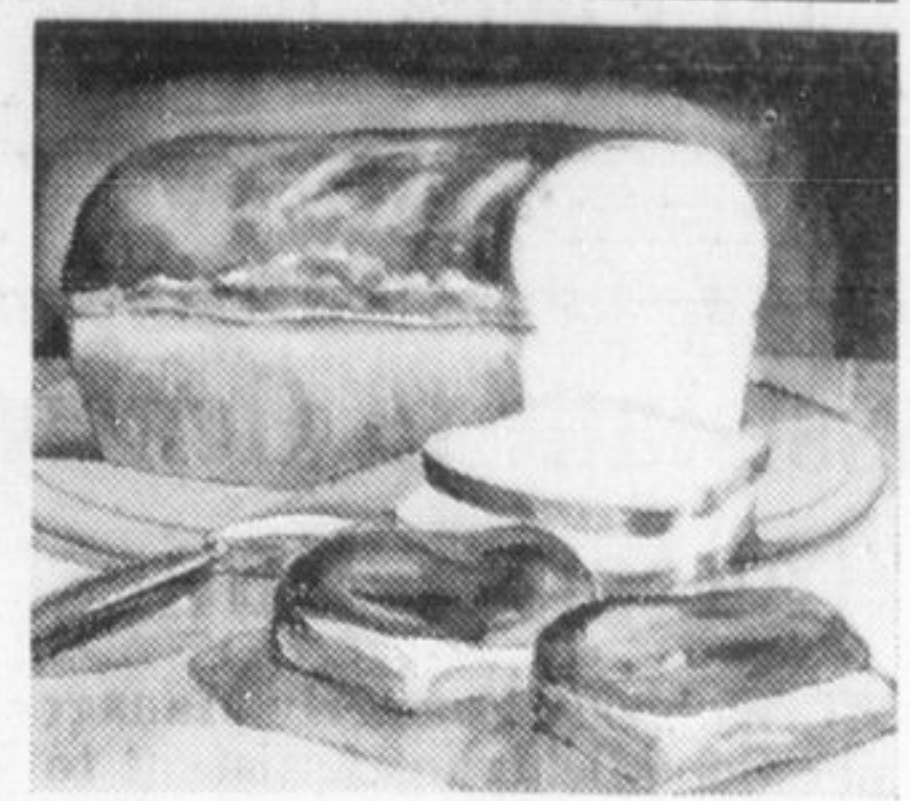

Death Roll of Rulers in the Past Fourteen Years

Eleven heads of Governments have met violent deaths since 1920. The list of assassinations follows:

- 1920—President Venustiano Carranza of Mexico.
- 1922—Michael Collins, chief of the Provisional Government of the Irish Free State.
- 1922—I. Narutowicz, first President of the Polish Republic.
- 1928—President-Elect Alvaro Obregon of Mexico.
- 1932—President Paul Doumer of France.
- 1932—Premier Inukai of Japan.
- 1933—President Sanchez Cerro of Peru.
- 1933—King Nadir of Afghanistan.
- 1933—Premier I. G. Duca of Rumania.
- 1934—Engelbert Dollfuss, Chancellor of Austria.
- King Alexander and Louis Barthou are the fourth and fifth great national figures to die so far this year.
- On Feb. 17 Albert, King of the Belgians, met death in a mountain-climbing accident. He was 59.
- Chancellor Engelbert Dollfuss of Austria, at the age of 41, was assassinated on July 25.
- President Paul von Hindenburg of Germany died Aug. 2.

New Discovery Reported at McConnell Gold Mines

Good progress is being made in shaft sinking at the Matachewan property of McConnell Gold Mines, according to J. J. Hollinger, president and managing director. Last week the shaft had reached a depth of 125 feet, but it is possible it will be carried deeper before the first station is cut. When lateral work begins it is intended to crosscut westward to explore an area where diamond drilling indicated values of \$16 across an 18-foot width. Some high assays have been obtained in development work but values are declared to be erratic.

A new discovery is reported on the south block of claims. A mineralized red porphyry intrusion with quartz veinlets has been uncovered and traced for 180 feet. The showing has a width of about 18 feet and is described as typical of the Young-Davidson occurrences. A number of showings of visible gold are reported to have been found. Twenty-two men are now employed on the property and most of these are engaged in opening up the new discovery.
