CLAIM ASSAY OFFICE AT PORT ARTHUR NOT LEGAL

The assay office at Port Arthur was ordered closed, so far as the Ontario Government is concerned on Oct. 31st, the claim being made that it was contrary to the Ontario statutes. The Government contends that the assay office in the parliament buildings at Toronto is the only place where free assays may be made. Accordingly prospectors in the Sturgeon river area will have to send their samples to Toronto. It is understood, however, that the Government has agreed to lease the present equipment to the present assayer at the nominal rental of \$100 per year. Prospectors and others who desire assays will have to make their own arrangements with the assayer.

Canadian Bacon Takes High Place in Britain

In the effort to recapture the domestic British market from Danish and other foreign bacon interests, Canada has won signal triumph in competition with other Empire producing countries.

At the London (England) Dairy Show, sponsored by the Empire Marketing Board, Canada Backers with their Wiltshire Bacon have carried off first prize against determined competition from the whole Empire, including several entries from Canada. This success, which marks another forward step in the progressive effort of Canadian packers and livestock interests to re-capture Imperial markets, is of particular interest to Canadian housewives. Canada Packers' Maple Leaf "Dated Bacon," that is sold on the domestic market, is of precisely the same high quality as their Wiltshire Bacon that has won such distinction in the export field.

Comradship Shown by Canadian Legion

Example of the Spirit of the Legion Given by the Charlton Branch of the Legion in Case of Death of Comrade Scull.

An example of the spirit of comradeship that is the moving force of the Canadian Legion was given last week by the Charlton branch of the Legion in the case of Comrade Charles Scull, a stranger to the district, who in his time of need found friends among the men who had been his comrades overseas in the great war.

Scull was found dead in the stable of a farmer in the Charlton area. The lady of the house had heard Scull coughing in the stable and when he did not appear for dinner the farmer went out to see what was keeping him away from the meal. He found Scull lying dead. The police were notified and the remains brought to Charlton. There the Legion took charge of the arrangements as soon as it was known that Scull was a returned soldier. He was buried with Legion honours six members of the Charlton Legion acting as pallbearers and the body being followed to its last resting place by the Charlton Legion members. In death the late Charles Scull was among friends who showed their sympathy and comradeship. Interment was made at the Charlton cemetery.

The late Charles Scull came to the North last spring with a Toronto family. He worked during the summer on the government road work in the district and after the close of the roadwork he was stopping with a family named Bell on a farm at Long Lake near Charlton. It is understood that the Legion is now taking steps to locate any relatives the late Charles Scull may have. The incident of this man's death and burial is another evidence of the comradeship of the Legion—the comradeship that shows that no man is without friends if he is a returned soldier and if the Canadian Legion knows about him.

Proof of Pudding's in Eating Thereof

Hot Apricot Pudding, Date Pudding, Chocolate Cream Pudding, Prune Pudding, Steamed Cherry Pudding, Etc.

Writing for the readers of The Advance a culinary expert this week says: There's an old fashioned flavour about the pudding type of dessert that appeals to most people. And fortunately there are scores of recipes that come under this head. If your repertoire is worn a little thin by frequent repetition—why not try some of these?

Hot Apricot Pudding
Rub a low baking dish with shortening, cover the bottom with cooked apricots (dried, soaked and stewed). Sprinkle the apricots with 1-2 cup brown sugar. Then make a mixture of the following: 1 tablespoon shortening, 1 up granulated sugar, one egg, beaten, 1-2 cup milk, 1 1-2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla.

Mix as for a cake batter, then pour over the apricots. Bake in a moderate oven for 1 1-2 hours. Turn onto a hot platter and serve at once with cream or foamy sauce, or cream and a little apricot juice whipped together.

Date Pudding
1 pound dates, cut fine.
1 teaspoon soda
1 cup boiling water
1-2 cup butter
1 cup nut meats
1 1-2 cups flour
2 eggs
1 teaspoon baking powder
Cut dates fine, then add the boiling water and soda and cool. Cream butter and sugar, add eggs. Add dates and water, then flour and baking powder and last the nut meats. Bake about 1 hour in moderate oven. Serve with lemon sauce.

Recipe for Lemon Sauce
2 cups hot water
1 cup sugar
2 tablespoons corn starch
2 tablespoons butter
1 lemon—grated rind and juice.
Mix sugar and corn starch, add boiling water gradually, stirring all the time. Cook 8 to 10 minutes. Add lemon juice and butter. Serve hot.

Chocolate Cream Pudding
1 cup sugar
4 tablespoons flour
1-4 teaspoon salt
2 cups milk
2 egg yolks
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 egg whites beaten stiff
2 squares chocolate.
Cut chocolate in small pieces. Add sugar, flour and salt. Add milk and egg yolks. Cook in double boiler until pudding thickens. Stir frequently. Add vanilla and fold in egg whites.

Cool and chill. Serve plain or with cream.

Prune Pudding
1 cup prunes, cooked, stoned and chopped.
3-4 cup sugar
1 cup chopped nuts
3 eggs
1 tablespoon melted butter
3 tablespoons flour
1-2 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon vanilla.
Mix all together and pour into a buttered dish. Bake for about 30 minutes. Serve with plain cream, whipped cream or marshmallow whip.

Steamed Cherry Pudding
Drain canned cherries from syrup. Make a batter of one cup of flour, one teaspoon baking powder, 1-4 teaspoon salt, add sufficient milk to mix into a drop batter. Butter pudding cups, add a tablespoon of the mixture, then a tablespoon of the cherries. Cover with

another spoonful of batter. Leave plenty of room in the cup for rising. Set the cups into hot water, cover closely and boil fifteen minutes. Use the juice slightly thickened for sauce, adding a little butter.

Graham Cracker Pudding
1 quart milk
3 eggs
1 cup sugar
3 tablespoon flour
1 teaspoon vanilla
Line a large pan with graham crackers. Slice bananas over them, add another layer of crackers. Pour custard made of the ingredients given above over them. Set in refrigerator to chill before serving.

Orange Minute Tapioca
1-3 cup minute tapioca
1-2 cup sugar
1-4 teaspoon salt
1 quart milk, scalded
1 egg yolk slightly beaten

1 egg white stiffly beaten
1 teaspoon orange or vanilla extract
4 oranges in sections free from membrane
Add minute tapioca, sugar and salt to the milk and cook in double boiler 15 minutes, or until tapioca is clear, stirring vigorously. Pour small amount of tapioca mixture over egg yolk stirring constantly. Return to double boiler and cook until thickened. Remove from fire, fold in egg white and flavoring. Place few sections of orange in bottom of individual serving dishes and cover with tapioca mixture. Garnish with additional orange sections and whipped cream.

Intend to Develop the Macjoe Sturgeon

Property Staked by Pete McDonough, Prospecting on Claims Shows Gold-bearing Quartz Veins with Free Gold.

Macjoe Sturgeon Gold Mines, Ltd., has been organized to develop a group of nine claims comprising approximately 360 acres in the Sturgeon River gold area, situated adjacent and between the Sturgeon River Gold Mines (Coniagas option), and the Brennan and Kenty property, which is under option to Casey Contract.

Surface prospecting on the ground, which was staked by Pete McDonough for the Jomac Syndicate, resulted in gold-bearing quartz veins being disclosed in three places, and a crew is now at work stripping these veins. In one quartz vein, free gold was found and grab samples from two others gave good values in gold.

It is planned to immediately put more men at work to thoroughly explore and develop the property. Geological conditions on the three properties are stated to be identical and on the north end of the Macjoe property, adjoining the Brennan-Kenty, new gold discoveries have been made, panning gold in many places.

A picket line from the Coniagas gold discovery has been continued on to the Macjoe property which picked up their fault, with the same geological conditions. Camp buildings have been constructed to accommodate a crew of men engaged in active exploration of the property.

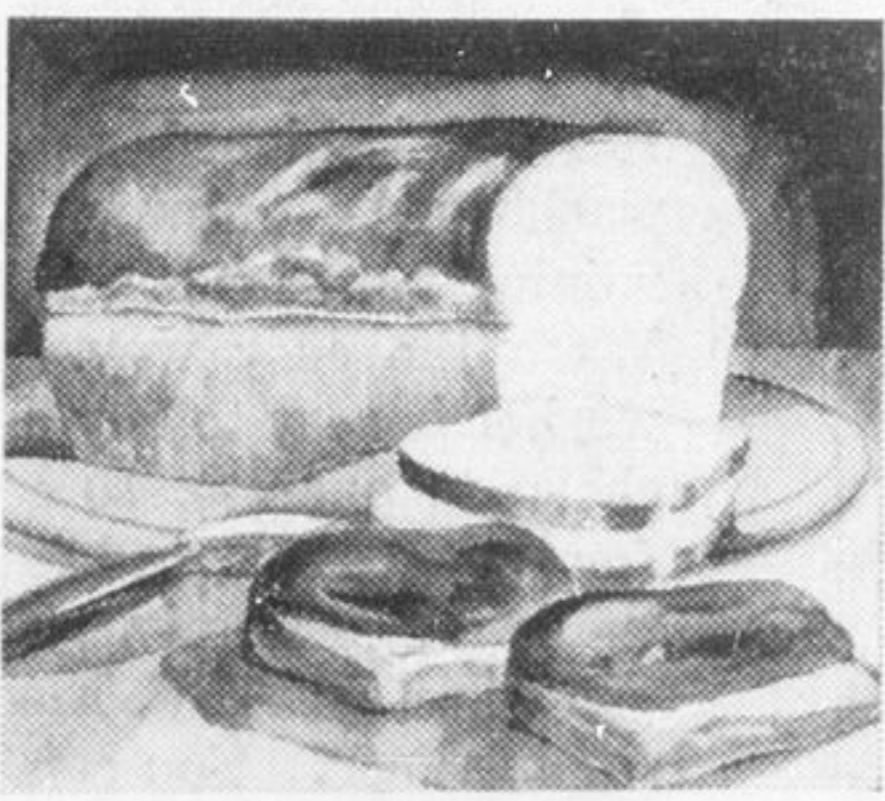
Macjoe Sturgeon Gold Mines is capitalized at 3,500,000 shares, \$1 par of which 1,500,000 have been issued for the property and are pooled for a period of 18 months. A public offering of \$1,000,000 shares at 30 cents per share is being made by H. R. Bain & Co., Limited, Toronto, to provide funds to carry out the development programme and bring the property to production.

Officials of the company include Joseph McDonough, president; Gilbert A. LaBine, vice-president; Robert Fannell and Fred Marshall, directors. Reginald E. Hore, consulting geologist, is managing director.
