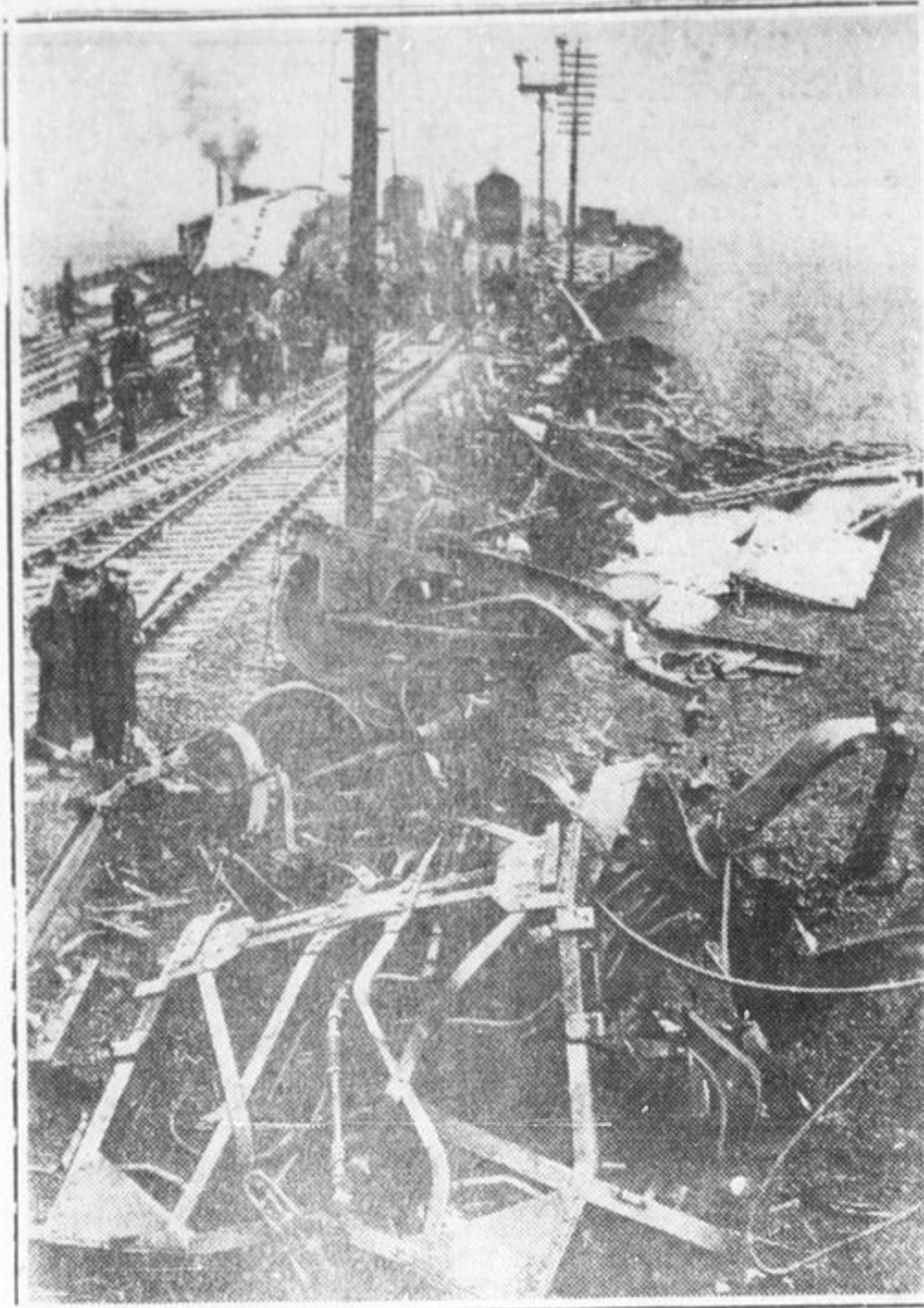

Hallow'e'en Event by South End Firemen

The judges were very bewildered as excellence after excellence paraded before them in the grand march. Their final selections, however, seemed to meet with popular approval. A different set of judges selected the ladies and gents' costumes. One of the most original and ingenious of the prize winning dress-ups, was that of Mrs. Wilson Rayner, who, as a squaw, with her papoose would be hard to beat anywhere. Moreover, it was all homemade and her fringed burlap dress was a triumph. She took the special prize amid great applause. A negress (Mrs. Clement) won the comic prize for ladies and Miss Natalie Kostynik as a Russian peasant in gala costume deserved the prize which she won for the best fancy dress. It was not only correct in every particular, but very pretty. Her brother Mike Kostynik, as her male counterpart, in grey astrachan wedge-cap, and high boots with all trimmings, received much applause as he went up to take the gents' fancy prize. Mr. Chick Abramson surpassed nature as a Cannibal King and his well-earned "comic" prize received popular approval. Death at Toronto of Mrs. Chas. Morgan

Pioneer Resident of Porcupine Passes Away Suddenly. Had Wide Circle of Friends in the Porcupine Camp.

South Porcupine, Ont., Nov. 7th, 1934. Special to The Advance.

The news that Mrs. Charles B. Morgan had died at her residence in Toronto on Tuesday morning came as a very sudden shock to our community this week. Very little information as to details have as yet come through, but her death was due to a stroke, undoubtedly caused by high blood pressure, from which we know she suffered and grief over the death of her beloved eldest son, "Bill," who was accidentally killed at the Dome Mines just two months ago.

The late Mrs. Morgan was a native of Hamilton. She was born Clara A. Richter—a name well known there and belonging to one of the oldest of the pioneer families of Hamilton. She came to South Porcupine in November, 1911, just as the town was being rebuilt after the fire and remained as an honoured resident until five years ago when the family moved to Toronto. With the exception of Bill all her family were born here—Jack in 1914, the twins, George and Jim, in 1916, and Mary, the only daughter, in 1918. Another daughter was born later but only lived a day. Mrs. Morgan would have been fifty-two years of age this month. The sympathy of all the old-time residents here and in the camp generally will be extended to the bereaved husband, and the four surviving children.

Three sisters, Mrs. Riach, of Toronto, Mrs. Gordon, of Hamilton, and Mrs. Gardner, of Hamilton, survive, as well as one brother, Charles Richter, postmaster of Hamilton.

Details as to the funeral will be given next week. Undoubtedly she will be buried in the family plot at Hamilton beside the boy she loved so well.
