ELECT A GOOD COUNCIL

Apparently a great many people in town believe that a serious and costly mistake was made last year in allowing a number of unsuitable men to secure places on the town council board.

During the year that is now almost concluded Timmins has suffered from the actions of the present council—suffered more, perhaps, than is generally realized.

It will take some time to forget the bitterness of 1934. The attitude of the present council towards previous councils has been such that the members of this year's board can scarcely object if they are accused of the very defects they charged against previous councils.

Kapuskasing Farm Weekly News Letter

Article for the Week Deals with the Question of Clean Milk. Essentials for the Production of Clean Milk Given.

The following is article No. 51 in the series of weekly letters from the Dominion Experimental Farm at Kapuskasing—

Clean Milk Milk is one of the most healthy foods if handled properly, but no food is so easily contaminated if not properly handled and so becomes more dangerous to the health.

Clean Cattle and Stables.—The stables should be cleaned regularly, twice a day. Calf-pens and box stalls should be cleaned at least twice a week.

Clean Utensils.—Milk pails, cans, separators and all other utensils used for milk must be thoroughly washed and scalded twice per day, and well aired in a room free from dust and flies.

Milk Handled Quickly.—It is better not to leave milk in the stable or to pour it in the stable after being drawn from the cows. It should be weighed and poured into the cans in a clean room adjoining the barn.

Death at Rollet, Quebec, of Sister Marie-Ozanna

(From The Royn-Noranda Press) Sorrow came to the little household of the new community of the Grey Nuns of the Cross of Rollet (Lonely River) by the death during the past week of the Superior, Rev. Sister Marie-Ozanna, who passed away on Saturday morning last, in Youville hospital here.

Sister Marie-Ozanna had been ill only about twelve days, a sufferer from pneumonia. A week ago last Thursday she was brought from Rollet to the hospital by ambulance, and at first there were strong hopes for her recovery. Here she received every possible care and treatment, but the disease had laid heavy hands on her, and she was unable to battle successfully against the attack. On Saturday morning, surrounded by many of the local community, she closed her eyes in the last long sleep.

A daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Theo. Bissonnette of Timmins, Sister Marie-Ozanna before entering the Grey Nuns community twenty years ago was Regisanna Bissonnette, and at her death she had attained the age of forty years. Since her profession she had taught at Odanah, Hull, and Shawinigan Falls, coming from the latter place only last

September to become superior of the new community at Rollet, being also a member of the teaching staff of the school in that pioneer settlement. An earnest and faithful religious, she was held in very warm regard there; and in the community of which she was a most worthy and useful member, and to which her death is a distinct loss, she had many devoted friends who regret deeply her untimely demise. The remains were taken at one o'clock on Saturday to the Nipissing Central station at Rouyn for conveyance to Ottawa, and from the mother house of the Grey Nuns in that city the funeral took place on Monday to the community cemetery near Sister St. Laurent Justina superior of Rouyn convent, and Rev. Sister Paul Marcel, of Youville hospital staff, accompanied the body to Ottawa. Many citizens from Royn and Noranda were in the cortege of about fifteen cars from the hospital to the station here, and about thirty Sisters from the ranks of the local members of the community were present in final tribute to one of their number whose early death they all deplored.
