Lower Insurance on Residences in Town

Substantial Reductions in Fire Insurance Rates Now in Force. Timmins has Earned Decreased Rates.

Substantial reductions in fire insurance rates for residences not in the business section of Timmins have been announced by "tariff" fire insurance companies, members of the Canadian Underwriters' Association. It is now possible to write fire insurance for a period of three years. Until this time one year has been the limit of a policy for Timmins.

Timmins is structurally of a more permanent nature now. Home-owners have cleaned up their lots, planted grass, painted up, put fireproof roofs on. The fire department has a record of service that shows a surprisingly small loss and the experience of fire insurance companies with residences in Timmins has been decidedly favourable. These were the main reasons given The Advance by George S. Drew for the tariff companies' recent action. The new rates in Timmins will apply to "all dwellings not exposed to mercantile risks," that is, all residences not actually within the business section and not within 40 feet of any business.

COBALT MAN TO BE TRIED AT AMOS FOR HIGH-GRADING
