

## Liskeard Fire Loss Will Total \$100,000

Heavy Loss from Fire Reported in The Advance on Monday. Cause of Blaze Unknown.

In reporting Sunday's serious fire at New Liskeard The Advance on Monday gave the estimated damage as \$75,000. This proves to be too conservative a figure, later estimates placing the loss at \$100,000.00, with about three-quarters of the loss covered by insurance.

The fire was in the two-storey structure known as the Lafond block, Whitewood avenue, New Liskeard, and owned by the Belanger Estate. It housed the Canadian General Electric Company's offices and show rooms, the Ontario Liquor Control Board's liquor store and stocks, the office of J. R. McCrea, insurance agent, and the apartments of the Lafond and McDougall families. All of the occupants of the building escaped safely though some of the children had to be taken out in their bare feet with the weather bitterly cold.

As noted in Monday's Advance the fire was discovered about 9 p.m. on

Sunday night. It originated in the furnace room immediately beneath the C. G. E. store and had a good start, spreading all through the building before it could be checked. The firemen put up a splendid fight. On their arrival smoke was coming from the building at various points. There was at least one serious explosion in the liquor store premises, and this and other considerations, including very cold weather, added to the difficulties of the firemen. The flames raged fiercely for some time but through the persistent and determined work of the firemen the fire was confined to the old block. At times there were five lines of hose in use and the

auxiliary pumping system had to be used. Lafond's grocery store adjoining the building caught fire at the roof but was extinguished before harm was done. On Monday afternoon there was nothing left but the walls. Parts of the ruins were still smoking while at other places there were several inches of ice coating the debris.

The cause of the fire has not been determined, but it is the opinion of Fire Chief Fred Thompson that it started in the furnace room and from there spread throughout the building.

The loss of \$100,000 is estimated as including \$50,000 for C.G.E. stocks and equipment, \$15,000 for liquor store

stocks, etc., and \$45,000 for the building with probably \$7,000 to be salvaged in liquor stocks in the cellar of the liquor store. It was the worst fire in New Liskeard for some years.

### EXPERT WHO DEVELOPED NEW TYPES OF GLADIOLI DEAD.

Archibald Gilchrist, one of the oldest and most prominent horticulturalists of the province died at Guelph last week after a brief illness. Born in Lanarkshire, Scotland, Mr. Gilchrist was in his 92nd year. He was responsible for the development of many new and beautiful varieties of gladioli including the

Lady Byng, Baltimore Oriole, the Passenger Pigeon, Blue Bird, Glove Robin and others. From 1912 to 1920 he had an unbeaten record in the gladioli classes at the Canadian National Exhibition. He was the last surviving member of his family.

### Why Section 98 Criminal Code Seems Necessary

Tim Buck is out of prison now and making speeches. Section 98 is coming in for further discussion. Ottawa Journal doubts the wisdom of it, because the chief effect of imprisonment "is to make these people heroes and martyrs in the eyes of their deluded followers." Against that contention it is interesting to see the view of The Canadian Unionist. Since the Communist Party of Canada was driven underground three years ago, the Labor paper states, its revolutionary propaganda has been carried on by many subsidiary bodies whose initials are more familiar than their names. Fattest morsel in this alphabet soup is ULFTA, the Ukrainian Labor-Farmer Temple Association with 48 branches in Ontario and secretaries of which held a meeting in Toronto on August 18 and 19 last. The Canadian Unionist vouches for the accuracy of the report which it summarizes. The first part deals with plans to gain control of the lumber camps in Northern Ontario.

"In case of a strike we will wait two weeks. Then if the companies reject our demand, trusted members only must be instructed to make every effort to damage properties by breaking up camps, setting fire to them, and damaging food for scabs by pouring oil or gasoline on it. After three or four weeks of this, if the strike still continues, poison must be placed on all food and scabs to be beaten up."

A Windsor delegate recommended that the miners' local send L.W.L.U. a few cases of dynamite to be used to blow up camps and other buildings in case of a prolonged strike."

Another man contributed the following to the minutes of the organization for the edification of Moccaw.

"Our aim must be and is to spread U.S. and Canadian strikes to other cities and then in due time to declare a general walkout on the whole continent—in order to crush capitalism to its destruction we are determined to build up our organization and with one blow to crush them as the Russians did.—The solution of this crisis is in civil war..... No matter what the government will do to remedy this situation our aim is to overthrow the government and to establish the Soviet."

In conclusion, it was decided to hold the next annual meeting of ULFTA secretaries in Hamilton on September 4th, 1935. A delegate from the North remarked:

"I hope that we will meet again next year in Hamilton, unless we are fighting shoulder to shoulder against capitalism behind barricades in the streets."
