

Armies in the Balkans



RADIOPHOTO SHOWS HUNGARIAN REFUGEES



Rushed here from the border town of Kelevia in Hungary, where it was made, to London by air, and thence across Atlantic by radio, this graphic picture has come to tell the dramatic story of the enforced exodus of Hungarian nationals from Yugoslavia. Thus far, 2,000 miserable refugees have trekked across the border line between the two countries, and 22,000 more were subject to the official edict of Yugoslavia that denied haven to Hungarians within its boundaries. It was one of the important causes of the recent crisis in the Balkans, and as the Magyar folk were travelling to their homeland the spectre of war again hovered over Europe.—Central Press Canadian Telephoto.
