DISMISSAL OF THE CROWN TIMBER AGENT AT SUBBURY

J. G. McCaw, for 25 years with the Ontario Forestry Branch, and for many years crown timber agent at Sudbury, was dismissed on Saturday last by the Ontario Government, the reason given being that the office of crown timber agent is being merged in the Forestry Branch. It is generally believed that this is only an excuse and that under another readjustment someone else will be given Mr. McCaw's position. District Forester P. McEwen, of Sudbury, was appointed recently to that position. Mr. McCaw, who is let out in the manner noted, is 67 years old and has given the best years of his life to public service.

Elected Member of Board of Directors of Duparquet

J. Dalbe Viau, well-known architect, of Montreal, has been elected a member of the board of directors of Duparquet Mining Company, Limited, replacing E. Duessault. Mr. Viau is well and favourably known in business and political circles. He was mayor of the city of Lachine from 1925 to 1933 and contested the Jacques Cartier constituency on behalf of the Conservative party in the provincial elections in 1931. In addition to his interest in his own firm of Viau & Venne, he has been a director of L'Alliance Nationale since 1912.

HUNDRED AND TWENTY-TWO RESCUED FROM DUTCH BOAT

Mistake of One Letter Halts British Parliament

Great Britain's principal legislative machine, the House of Commons, came to an abrupt halt on Monday, its gears gummed up by the tiny letter "n," where there should have been an "m."

The legislators, in the midst of their first day of debate on unemployment assistance regulations were sniping at each other and the Government because the House had to accept the draft of a bill as submitted without amendment, or else reject it. The keen-eyed Laborite, Tom Smith, spotted the words "other than," where obviously "other than" was meant. Opposition members stoutly resisted the Government's contention that it was a clerical error. Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin, Lord President of the Council, finally acceded to adjournment and promised to bring in a clean copy on Tuesday.

SENTENCED AT COBALT FOR FRAUDULENT MANIPULATION

N. W. Nixon, of Winnipeg, entered a plea of guilty at Cobalt police court the other day when he was charged with issuing a fraudulent document, namely a cheque purporting to be from the Barry Hollinger Mine. Nixon gave the cheque in payment of three days' lodging at the Fraser House. Later he was said to have tried the same stunt at another hotel. He was also charged with obtaining lodging under false pretences, also at the Fraser House. The magistrate sentenced him to three months on the one count and thirty days on the other, the sentences to run concurrently.

PROTEST CHANGES IN THE OLD AGE PENSION BOARDS

Protests against proposed changes in the administration of old age pensions were voiced at Toronto on Tuesday at a meeting of 100 representatives of municipal pension boards. A delegation waited on Hon. David Croll Tuesday afternoon. "Things were not satisfactory under the Conservative government, where pensions were recommended over the heads of the boards," declared T. H. Marshall, of Belleville, "but now we find under the Liberal administration that the situation is 50 times worse." B. Stinson, of Northumberland-Durham, declared that he had issued a questionnaire to municipalities and answers indicated that general opinion is opposed to the changes in administration.

BOSTON A. A. WILL STAGE 46TH INDOOR MEET, FEB. 9

The Boston Athletic Association will conduct its forty-sixth annual indoor track and field games at the Boston Garden on Feb. 9. The special scratch events will be the Hunter mile, the Williams two-mile, the Briggs 50-yard dash, the 45-yard high hurdles, the 1,000-yard special, the 600-yard special, the pole vault and the running high jump.

There also will be an intercollegiate two-mile relay and an inter-collegiate one-mile freshman race in addition to the many match team relay races that have always dotted the programme.

Mario Poloni, who slept over the store, was aroused by the smoke, and came down only to find that the fire had been put out. There is no clue to the perpetrators of the offence, which is being investigated by the police.

Brother of Frank K. Ebbitt Died in Montreal Monday

The many friends in Timmins and district of Frank K. Ebbitt, of Iroquois Falls, will extend sincere sympathy to him in the death of his brother, Ernest Robert Ebbitt, who passed away at Montreal on Monday, Dec. 17th.
The late Ernest Robert Ebbitt was a widely-known grain and freight broker and was highly esteemed by wide circles of friends. He died at Montreal on Monday after an illness extending over several months. At the time of death the late Mr. Ebbitt was 64 years old. Born in Montreal, Mr. Ebbitt was in the wholesale grocery business until 10 years ago, when he established himself in brokerage activities. He was a member of the Montreal Board of Trade, the Montreal Corn Exchange, and a life member of the Montreal Amateur Athletic Association.

MORE THAN THIRTY BOMBS EXPLODE IN HAVANA, CUBA

More than 30 bombs exploded in Havana between midnight and midnight on Monday night, terrorizing residents in many parts of the city. At least two persons were wounded in the explosions, which put the city in a high state of excitement.

Seizure near Havana of a supply of dynamite on four passenger buses en route from Santiago to Havana, the arrest of 90 bus passengers and the manoeuvring of groups of police gave rise to reports that anti-Government forces were about to strike against Colonel Fulgencio Batista.

An army officer's report of secret activities of members of the A.B.C. Society added to the revolution talk. The officer said he arrested three members of the A.B.C. leaving Havana by highway and that they carried messages in cipher.

Wednesday's reports from Havana suggested that things were quieting down and that talk of revolution activities were decreasing.

ST. LOUIS CARDINALS ARE PAYING 10 P.C. DIVIDEND

The world champion St. Louis Cardinals have declared and paid a 10 per cent. dividend on both common and preferred stock which totals approximately \$100,000.

President Sam Breadon's share of the meion is about \$75,000 as he holds 72 per cent. of the stock in the National league club.

TEMPERATURE TWO DEGREES BELOW AT 8 THIS MORNING

At eight o'clock this morning the temperature as recorded at Hollinger was 2 degrees below zero. Yesterday's maximum was 8 above and yesterday's minimum 4 above.

Born in Osgoode 54 years ago he was the son of the late Bernard Brennan and Ann McEvoy.

He was married at Notre Dame de Lourdes church, Cyrville, Ont., fifteen years ago. The late Mr. Brennan died on Monday, Dec. 10th, at Timmins, following an illness of more than a year's duration.

SUSPENSION OF STEWART LIFTED BY N.H.L. PRESIDENT

Suspension of Nels Stewart, husky centre star of Boston Bruins, following an attack on Deed Klein of New York Americans in Madison Square Gardens in a game last week, was lifted on Tuesday by Frank Calder, president of the National hockey league.

Lifting of the suspension made Stewart eligible to resume his position with the Bruins when they played New York Rangers in Boston.

Stewart was suspended by the league president Saturday following the incident in the game at New York last Thursday night. Stewart and Klein, Americans left wing, were waved off the ice after a cross-checking duel. Stewart was cut on the head by Klein's stick. Referee Odie Cleghorn and Eusebe Daigneault gave Klein a major penalty and Stewart a minor. Stewart struck Klein with his stick on the way to the penalty box, reports of the game said, and both were given match penalties for the mixup. Klein emerged from the fracas with a dislocated shoulder and a head wound calling for eight stitches.

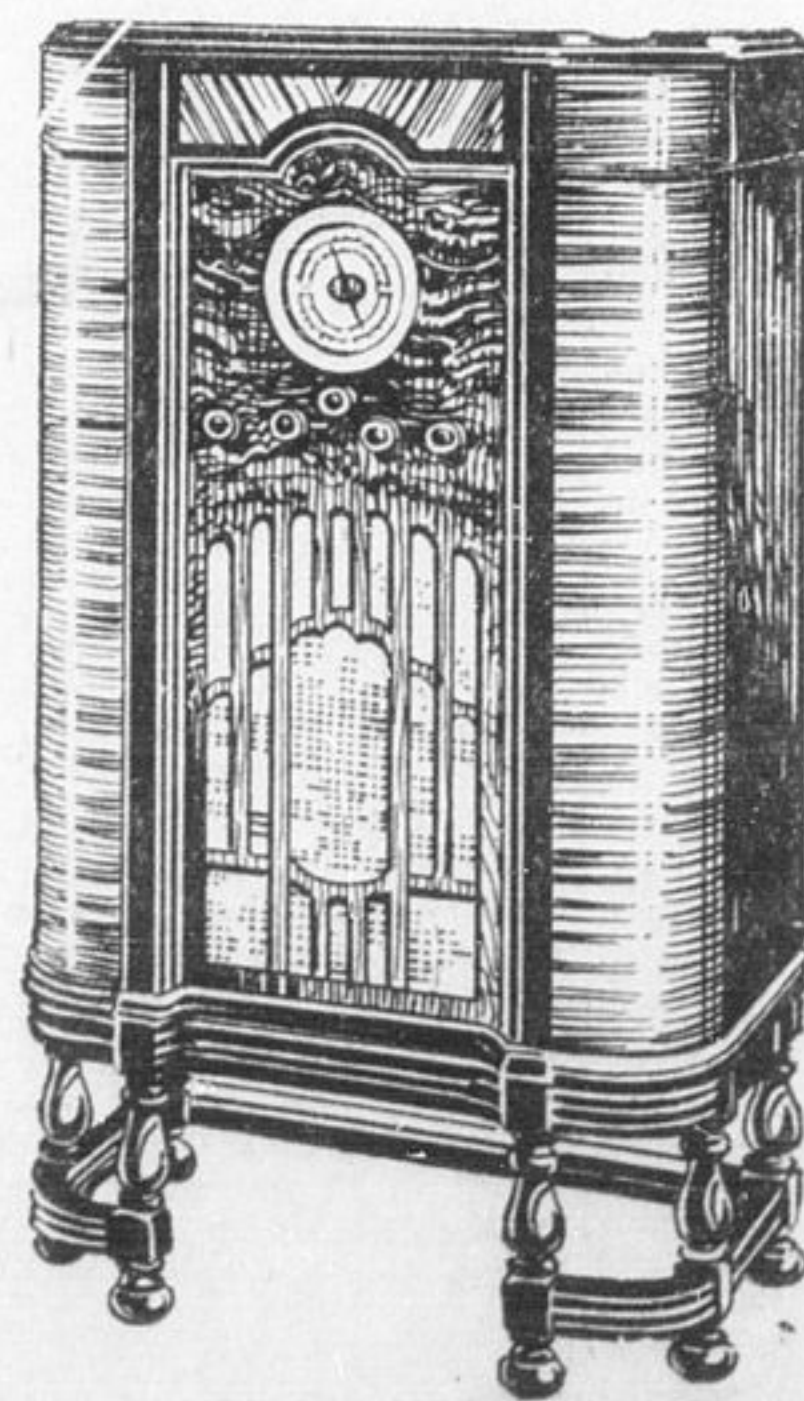
