

McIntyre and Timmins Play Here Wednesday Night

BATTLE OF BLUE BLOODS

First Hockey Match at South Porcupine

N. O. H. A. Senior Series Started on Wednesday. South Porcupine Won with Score 5 to 1.

Through a series of misfortunes the following report of the hockey match at South End as forwarded by The Advance correspondent at South Porcupine failed to reach here in time for publication in Thursday's issue. It was eventually located but reached here too late for use. The report, however, is given herewith as a matter of record, and for its own special interest.

The 1935 hockey season was opened at the local arena last night when the Porkies defeated the Timmins Gold Diggers 5-1. Only the spectacular goal tending of Langford saved the Gold Diggers from a worse beating. The game was fast but was featured throughout by slashing, neither team showing much finesse.

The first period had scarcely started when Walsh drew a penalty for a trip and with Timmins a man short Maki took the puck from the face-off to beat Langford for the first goal in two minutes and twenty-five seconds of play. With Walsh back on, Trembley drew for tripping and Cattarello placed another behind Langford for the local's second goal. Dunn visited the box leaving the Porkies a man short and though Timmins pressed hard they failed to score. Timmins was again a man short when Kennedy was chased for tripping and Maki on a pass from Briden put the locals three goals up, each of the goals being scored while the Gold Diggers had a man in the penalty box.

In the second period Lortie beat Esseltine for Timmins' only counter after seven minutes of play. When scored for the locals five minutes later. Bad feeling which was rampant most of the night broke loose when Trembley whacked Taylor over the nose dropping him. It was the bell for a fist fight which waged loud and long when the smoke of battle cleared Trembley was doing a five-minute penalty but somehow disappeared for the remainder of the game. Three other penalties were meted out, Maki, Smith and Miller collecting for minor infractions.

Both teams lagged in the final frame and play was listless. Thomas scored the only goal on a fluke, the puck sliding in off Lortie's stick at fourteen minutes of play. Dunn and Briden collected the only two penalties.

While it is early in the season to judge a team both teams as they progress should be potentially strong. On the evening's play Langford starred for Timmins while Esseltine and Dunn were the locals' best.

South Porcupine—Goal, Esseltine; defence, Smith Taylor and Dunn; centre, Huggins; wings, Maki and Briden; alternates, Thomas, Cattarello and Woon. Referee—James Fell.

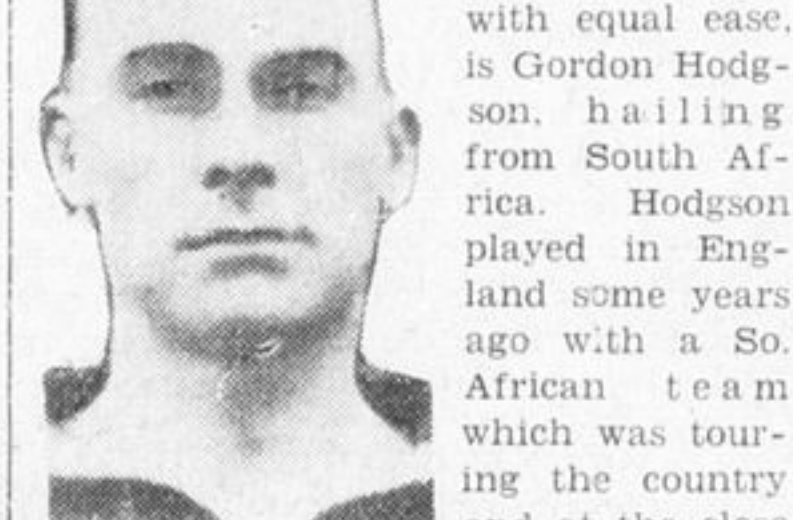
EARL ROBINSON

Penalties Feature 8-5 Win for Strong Porkies

McIntyre Look Good in First Appearance Friday Night at South Porcupine. Fast Hockey Until Beginning of Third Period When Conditions Slow Pace.

McIntyre hockey team made their debut in the N.O.H.A. in the Porcupine arena last night before a fair crowd of enthusiastic spectators. The Macs looked good but the Porkies were better. The fans were treated to everything from bloodshed to thirteen flashing red lights, no less, eight of the flickers for the locals and five collected by the Macs.

The bloodshed occurred in the second period when Dunn was accidentally struck on the nose and was forced to retire temporarily for repairs. Despite twelve penalties, only two of the thirteen goals scored occurred while either team was a man short.

Start With Fast Pace

Starting at a fast pace both teams pressed hard and end to end rushes were the feature. Maki drew the first penalty for a trip and with the Porkies a man short McIntyre sent up a four man attack which failed to beat Esseltine. With Maki back on, Sparky Vail relieved him in the cooler and the Porkies went on the attack, everybody getting a shot on Clark with Maki getting the first counter on a nice shot which completely fooled Clark and on which he didn't have a change.

The Porkies still pressed hard but Clark made some nice saves. With Vail back, Woon drew for tripping, leaving the locals short handed but a second later Lemon evened the teams by going for a rest and no damage was done. Stevie Knechtel on a beautiful rush tied the score for McIntyre on one of the nicest plays of the night.

Not to outshine Proulx and Michaelson came through on a beautiful play, Proulx getting the counter and Michaelson the assist closing the scoring at 2-1 for the first chapter.

Second, Porkies Big Period

In the second period the locals went on a scoring bee. Briden backhanding one behind Clarke on a pass from Huggins. Michaelson then counted a nice one and while Campbell was in clink Briden scored again. Maki and Massacre, an ex-Porky player, were told to settle their differences in the box when they showed an unfriendly spirit toward each other. While they were off Taylor, who had been threatening Clark all night, scored and almost from the face-off Auger rushed down to put the disc behind Esseltine for McIntyre's second counter. In a scramble in front of the McIntyre net Clark was hurt but resumed his citadel tending none the worse. Smith and Michaelson teamed for a nice goal, "Goat" carrying the puck down the ice and passing to Michaelson who made the score 7-2 for the locals. Macs then turned on the heat and went after a couple, Vail getting one and Campbell the other unassisted and the period ended Porcupine 7, McIntyre 4.

Condition Not So Good

The third period slackened a bit, neither team being at mid-season condition. Huggins received the first penalty and also featured in the second when he and Hill were chased for mixing it up a bit. The locals and the Macs each scored once, Maki counting on a pretty pass from Huggins and Vail for McIntyre. Hill collected the only other penalty for dumping "Goat" Smith into the goal post.

It would be hard to pick the stars of the Porcupine team. They were all good. Briden was probably the most effective forward with Taylor showing well when the Porkies were short-handed. Dunn was outstanding on defence. Knechtel, Vail and Campbell were the McIntyre best.

The game was capably handled by "Bowler" Burton and L. Kelly.

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LARGE PURSES OFFERED IN WINTER STAKE RACES

Both the Cuban and the Mexican stakes are renewals of events run successfully in previous years, but neither was looked for this season. The Santa Anita Handicap is expected to draw a great field to the California track, which is starting its inaugural meeting on Dec. 25th.

Though Sydor was found by police to be operating the outfit, the property on which the seizure was made belongs to Burgess.

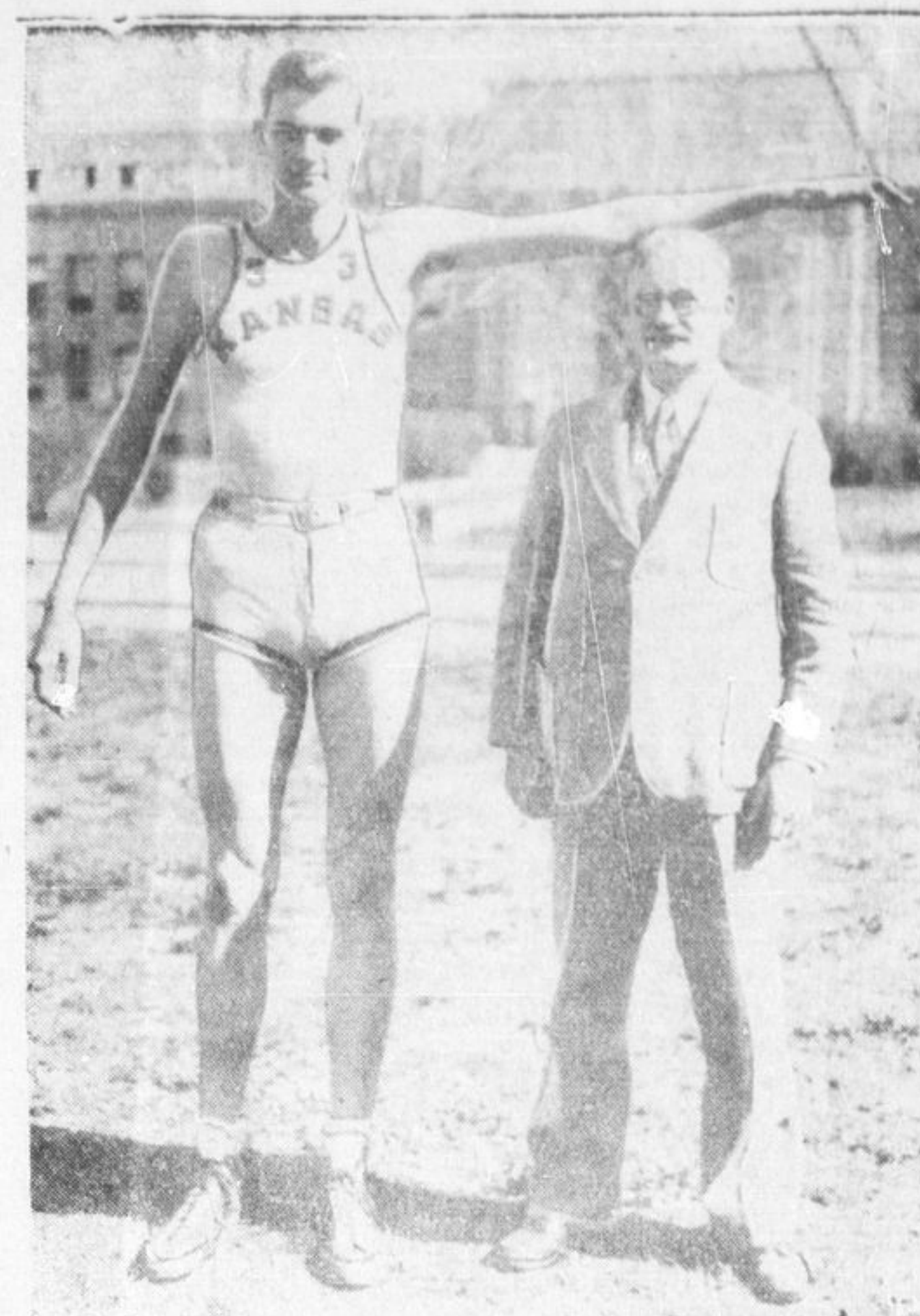

It is said that the apparatus was capable of producing about a gallon and a half of spirits per hour.

R.C.M.P. Constable E. W. Shaw headed the raiding party and he was assisted by Ontario Provincial Constables J. W. Preterius and L. A. Trengena.

Both Sydor and Burgess were taken into custody.

Northern Group to Have Forty-four Hockey Games

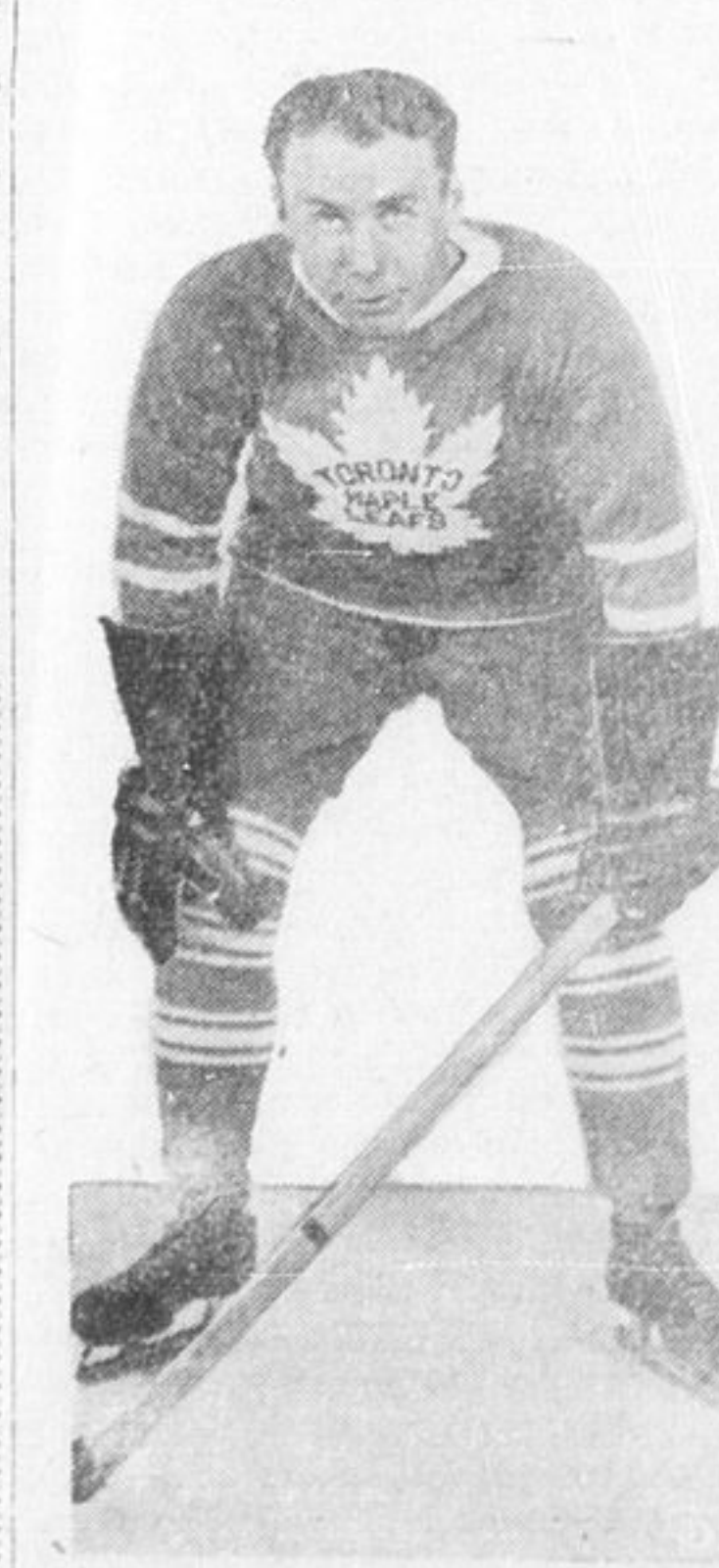
Full Programme of Hockey Matches for This Season. Eight Home Games at Timmins and Another Eight for McIntyre, a Total of 16, with More Possible.

For the 1934-1935 N.O.H.A. hockey season there will be at least 44 matches played in the Northern group. Each of the five teams in the group have eight games on home ice. As McIntyre is using Timmins ice for its home games, this means that Timmins will have 16 games; here in the season. In addition to the 40 games on the schedule, the first and second teams on the season's schedule play-off, home and home games. The winner of the group of five then has to play Kapuskasing, home and home games again likely. This makes the total of 44 games for the season.
