

Police Had 856 Cases in Eight Months Last Year

Record Shows Good Work of Police Dept. for the Year. Effort Centred on Protecting Public Safety and Morals. Interesting Report by Chief R. Paul.

The annual report of the chief constable of the town of Timmins for last year, as submitted by Chief Paul to the town council is a very interesting document and should be considered by all citizens of the town. It shows that the police department is doing excellent work for the benefit of the town. The records prove that the work of the department has been successful in guarding the safety of the public and the morals of the town. Most thoughtful people will be pleased to see the effort made to protect the safety of the public by enforcement of the regulations of the Highway Traffic Act, the said regulations being designed with the purpose of guarding the public safety. Equally pleasing is the earnest and effective means taken by the police force to help legitimate business by curbing the illegitimate and immoral.

The report of Chief Paul for the eight months ending Dec. 31st is well worthy of careful perusal. It is given herewith in full:—

Timmins, Ont., January 7th, 1935
To the Mayor and Councillors of the Town of Timmins.

Gentlemen:—I have the honour to submit herewith my report as chief constable for the period from May 1st, 1934, to December 31st, 1934, the period during which I have held office. For the period covering the earlier part of

the year the records available are not complete and so this period is omitted. The statistics given herewith cover fully the work of the police department from May to December, 1934. Special mention however may well be made to some special features of the work.

For the safety of the public, special effort was made to enforce the Highway Traffic Act regulations, and determined and continued thought given to eliminating the "drunk in charge of a car."

There has been a comprehensive patrol system instituted to protect the stores and residences of the town. In view of the size of the town and the general conditions, together with the large number of transients coming to town, there have been comparatively few burglaries and thefts. All the crimes of this kind, with one minor exception, have been cleared up and the guilty brought to court.

The department has given its very best efforts to guarding the public morals and protecting women and girls. There have been some rather sensational cases in this line in the past few months, and the department hopes to be able to avert similar conditions in the future by watchfulness and earnest work in preventing the growth of immoral conditions.

May I say that it is my earnest desire and that of every man on the force to keep the town orderly, clean and decent, and above all to afford the very maximum of protection and safety to all good citizens. This was the moving force in the recent clean-up of disorderly houses and other un-avory places. This work is still in progress and will be carried on for the advantage of the town to the best of my ability.

It may be noted that the total of stolen property in the town for the period reached \$3,722.57, and of this property to the value of \$3,088.77 was recovered.

During the period 115 children reported lost were restored to their homes. In this connection may I express my appreciation for the kindness and interest of Mrs. Condie of the Children's Shelter and also to Mr. Carson, superintendent of the Children's Aid Society for his notable work in the juvenile cases coming to police attention.

To Re-instate Health Officers for North

Announcement at North Bay Taken to Mean that North will Again have District Health Officers.

Re-instatement of district officers of health in Northern Ontario is being considered by the Ontario Government with the expectation of becoming a reality in a short time, Hon. Dr. J. A. Faulkner, Minister of Health, informed The Nugget when at North Bay last week-end. He and Dr. W. A. Dafeo, Toronto, were the guests of Dr. A. R. Dafeo, Callander.

The honourable minister further announced that it had been decided to extend the services of the North Bay Provincial Laboratory to the extent of maintaining night and day services. At the same time he deplored the condition of the laboratory building and expressed the hope that North Bay city council would remodel the building to suit requirements.

The increased laboratory service will mean additional staff and added facilities. The motive is to ensure service for Northern physicians on a 24-hour basis so that prompt attention can be given when the necessity arises.

Temporary Measure

Explaining the purpose of the government to re-establish government medical service in the North, Dr. Faulkner said that this service has already been temporarily provided in authorization to private practitioners to act in emergencies. All that a doctor need do is to apply to the department at Toronto for the necessary authority.

When plans now under consideration are completed, it is expected that district medical officers of health will be restored in the North and so stationed that every locality will be assured of prompt service.

Emphasizing the importance of laboratory service to physicians of the North, Dr. Faulkner instanced that the increase in specimens handled had been 50,000 in the past year. The cost to the government may be measured by the fact that the analyzing of each sample costs 37 cents. This was formerly near 50 cents.

Henceforth, the North Bay laboratory will be operated on a 24-hour schedule and the customary two-weeks' holiday period in the summer months will be abolished. The aim is to ensure that a never-failing service will be provided Northern physicians, Dr. Faulkner explained.
