Sixty-two Chimney Fires Since Sept. 6

Below will be found the report of the fire department from Sept. 6th. 19 1934, to Dec. 30th, 1934, as submitted 3. to the town council and read at the meeting of council yesterday. The report covers the portion of last year in which Fire Chief P. Jeffrey was in charge of the department. During the Mayor and Council period there were 94 calls, none of the fires proving serious. Ten of the calls were false alarms. The total loss in the fires in the period is given by Fire Chief Jeffrey at \$1,624.35, with insurance of nearly nine times that amount carried on the buildings concerned.
