Artificial Ice Rink in Copper Cliff Now

Twenty-five Hundred at Formal Opening Last Week. First Artificial Ice Rink to Open in the North Country.

The first artificial ice rink in Northern Ontario, and the only one in this country to date, was formally opened at Copper Cliff last week, when Donald MacAskill, general manager of the International Nickel Co., in the unavoidable absence of the president of that company, R. C. Stanley, who was confined to his home in New York through illness, made the formal address that declared the new arena open. In his address, Mr. MacAskill said: "I have much pleasure, therefore, in declaring this stadium formally opened, and in dedicating its use to our employees, to the citizens of the district, and particularly to the growing generation of boys and girls."

The new artificial ice rink at Copper Cliff will be known as the "Stanley Stadium," in honour of the president of the International Nickel Co. There were 2,500 enthusiastic spectators present at the opening. The formal opening of the stadium embraced a featured programme, the proceeds of which will augment the subscription raised by the Rop. Silver Benefit Fund committee. The programme included a hockey game between the British Consols of Toronto and a picked team representing the Nickel Belt League, which was won by the latter 4-1; speed and exhibition skating by Miss Florence Hurd, Alex Hurd and Frank Stack, outstanding Canadian ice stars from Kirkland Lake. Mayor E. A. Collins, of Copper Cliff, opened the proceedings with the presentations of \$2,500 to Ron Silver, star

defence player of the Froot team who lost an eye in the opening exhibition game on Dec. 20th, 1934.

Dies from Injuries from Propeller of Airplane

Paul Sherwood is dead at the Youville hospital at Noranda as a result of injuries received when he walked into the propeller of a Dominion Skyways plane at their Rouyn airport on Tuesday morning of last week. Sherwood had his skull badly fractured in the accident and though he lingered for about four days after the injury, there was never any expectation of his recovery so seriously he was hurt. The wonder is that he lived so long after sustaining such serious injuries. From the information coming from Rouyn it would appear that Sherwood came by plane from the Bussiere mine, where he was working. When the plane landed at Rouyn he was instructed to alight from the passenger's door at the rear of the pilot's seat. Instead, it appears that he crawled over the pilot's seat and left by the pilot's door. He walked too close to the plane and was struck by the propeller, which was "idling." His head was split open and the skull badly fractured. Sherwood was a Norwegian but had been in Canada for several years, working at the mines in Northwestern Quebec.

Annual Meeting of the DeSantis Gold Mines Co.

The annual meeting of the DeSantis Gold Mines Co. was held on January 15th. The business was chiefly of routine nature. The old board of directors was re-elected, including Peter DeSantis, Jos. V. Friel, Bigio Ferreri, Luigi Deluca, Giuseppe Guistini, Frank Prest and Theo Schultze. On the previous board Mr. DeSantis was president, Mr. Friel, vice-president, and Mr. Guistini was secretary-treasurer; there is no report of any change among these officials.

Work is proceeding actively at the company's Porcupine property. At the meeting it was stated that a crew of 22 men are employed, with one diamond drill in operation, and one drill working two shifts. Completion of financial arrangements was reported, and it was announced that W. B. Dunbar, of the Hollinger geological staff, was acting in an advisory capacity. DeSantis Gold Mining Company Ltd is capitalized at 4,000,000 shares of \$1 par, of which 3,076,229 shares are outstanding. The head office is at Timmins.

The score at the end of the third period was two all and South Porcupine scored the winning goal in a ten minute extra session.

Refused to Pass \$500,000 Payment on Abitibi Canyon

A despatch from Toronto last week says that four days before the administration of Premier George S. Henry, of Ontario, resigned, that government passed an order-in-council providing for the payment on account of \$500,000 to the Dominion Construction Company as part of the construction costs of the Abitibi Canyon project, according to a statement made by Premier Hepburn.

This order, passed on July 6, was not approved by Hon. H. A. Bruce, lieutenant-governor, who said the amount was too large to be paid at such a late hour in the life of the administration. Mr. Hepburn read newspapermen, the lieutenant-governors comment. It did not question the bona fides of the indebtedness, but refused to approve the order because "it was too large an account to be paid at so late an hour in the life of the administration."

"The Dominion Construction Company, during the course of building the Abitibi, realized the Ontario Power Service Corporation was headed for bankruptcy, and asked government assurance it would pay for the work done," Mr. Hepburn said, adding, "Mr. Henry verbally agreed to compensate the company if it continued the work." The premier produced a letter written by Mr. Henry to the late J. R. Cooke, chairman of the Ontario Hydro Commission, in which Mr. Henry said cessation of the work would be disastrous and he said he would see the company got "fair treatment."

An amount approximating \$3,000,000 was involved in the Dominion Construction Company's claim, Mr. Hepburn said, and this \$500,000 payment and the matter will be discussed by the cabinet. "As near as we can gather," Mr. Hepburn said, "there is no legal claim against the government." He said the Company should have taken steps to protect the account when the Ontario Power Service Corporation went bankrupt.

Hector Authier Chosen Deputy Speaker at Quebec

Hector Authier, Liberal member of the Quebec Legislative Assembly for Abitibi, was chosen Deputy Speaker of the Legislative Assembly, replacing Hon. Irene Vautrin. Mr. Vautrin vacated the Deputy Speakership on his appointment as Minister of Colonization. Maurice Duplessis, Opposition leader, in congratulating Mr. Authier on his appointment, asked the Government why they had not appointed Mr. Authier Deputy Minister of Colonization. He mentioned that Mr. Authier, who represented a colonization district, would have been a good choice for the position. The new Deputy Speaker is a former Montreal newspaperman, and is known to many in Timmins and district.

Arrested on Theft Charge After Coming out of Jail

Leo Lafontaine of Kapuskasing, recently released from the district jail at Halleybury after serving a month sentence on conviction of causing wilful damage, is again in the toils, this time facing a charge of theft. A day or two after his release he was arrested by Provincial Constable Brandy and was found to be in possession of a roll of money, amounting to about \$40 and a bag of groceries. He was making his way from New Liskeard to Halleybury when he asked the constable, who was in plain clothes at the time, if he could direct him to a taxi and it is thought that he intended bringing the eatables to some of his friends in the jail. The money, it was discovered belonged to one George Perron, of New Liskeard with whom Lafontaine is said to have been fraternising after release from the bastille.

Timmins High School got away to a good start in the Northern Secondary Schools Association hockey league on Friday night when they trimmed Schumacher eight goals to one.

It was a fast clean game in which very few penalties were handed out and those for trips that might have been accidental. Timmins were out-weighted and the Schumacher forwards played a better passing game but the Delmonte-Charlebois defence for T.H.S. kept the hard working Schumacher forwards safely away from the net. How well this worked out is shown by the fact that Everard in the Timmins net was shot at seven times while the Schumacher goalie had to deal with 26 flying pucks.

Timmins' first string line, Therriault, Budzak and Sarmiento, did most of the scoring for the blue and white but they played a solo rush game as did Delmonte who notched two of the winners' goals. The second string line, Hatton, Gauthier and Lake, though they only tallied once in the second period on Lake's well-earned try, played better combination.

Schumacher made two tallies throughout the game that looked dangerous. The first came late in the second and just after Sarmiento had scored Timmins' sixth goal. It was then that Heath scored Schumacher's lone counter and gave the Tisdale town hope of

going into the third strong. The rally did continue into the third period but Timmins were able to hold off any more scoring.

Budzak and Delmonte headed the honours list for T.H.S. with two goals each. Therriault, Lake, Sarmiento and Charlebois had one each.

Timmins' next game is in Iroquois Falls on Friday of this week and their next home game is when they meet South Porcupine on Feb. 1st. Schumacher go into action against South Porcupine this Saturday.
