

McIntyre Hold South Porcupine Wins Game from Kirkland

Esseltine Starred in Notable Goal-Tending. Score of 6 to 1 did not Represent the Comparative Play of the Teams. South End has Able Team.

Kirkland Lake Millionaires turned paupers last night in their first appearance in the Porkies own hunting ground by taking it on the chin 6-1. On the chin is exactly where they did take it because those Millionaires never gave up. They played fast, hard-checking hockey all the way through but they could not out-guess Esseltine. That boy was puck-proof through two and a half periods and the shot which finally did sift past him was a well-earned goal.

The third period opened a bit faster than the second with the Millionaires out to do or die but the Porkies were playing for a shut-out and never ceased their relentless checking. Maki made it five to nothing on a beautiful rush and a perfect shot from inside the blue line which completely fooled Ames. Dent was chased and was no sooner back than he was penalized again but the Millionaires were cut-lucked on their attack. MacDonald registered the Millionaires' only goal on a nice rush which ended in a scrimmage and Esseltine didn't have a chance. Ames made a nice save on a rush by Cattarello and it was one of the best plays of the night.

Huggins scored the locals' last goal on a pretty play with about three minutes to go. What ensued was more of a parade than a hockey match. Dent and Thoms were sent to the box for mixing it up and Huggins soon followed leaving the Porkies two men short and the Millionaires one. But Cooke obligingly evened matters up when he drew for a trip. MacDonald was the next culprit but there was no room for him at the inn. After a general shifting of players and officials he was somehow squeezed in making five in the coop at one time. Kirkland Lake was playing two men to the Porkies three but it was a one ring circus with Ames the chief performer. Maki scored but it was disallowed as he was in the crease. Fortunately for all concerned the gong ended the game and the score was Porkies 6, Kirkland Lake 1. There were seven penalties in the third session making a total of eighteen for the game.

Esseltine took the laurel wreath for the Porkies, with Dunn, Taylor, Huggins and Cattarello sharing the honours. Outstanding for the Millionaires were A. MacDonald and K. MacDonald, Cooke and Thoms.

Kirkland and McIntyre Play to a Five-all Tie

McIntyre Deciding to Drop from the N.O.H.A. on Account of Loss of Players, Still Carrying on Exhibition Games to Give the Fans the Breaks.

They left an interesting Kirkland Lake-McIntyre game at a tied score of five all Saturday night here when the two gold camp teams met in an exhibition match. McIntyre's decision to drop out of the N.O.H.A. competition seemed in no way to affect the year-old rivalry between the two, and both teams went out to win. Kirkland Lake add two points to their league standing just the same.

It was fast hockey and for the most part clean, although one or two incidents didn't look so good. Just as the first period ended Len Godin of Kirkland Lake brought his stick down on Sid Polhill's head and drew a ten-minute penalty for the show of temper. Polhill was given a minor for carrying a high stick. Godin left the ice with a slash on his nose caused by Polhill's stick, but Polhill's head did not seem to be greatly injured by the blow. It looked from the sidelines as if Godin thought better of his motion to strike Polhill just as the stick was about to come in contact with the top of Polhill's head, otherwise the blow might have been a serious one.

McIntyre played both Malloy and Polhill, the men who were suspended from C.A.H.A. competition when they were refused branch to branch transfers, and their presence on the team certainly made a big difference, although the Vail-Campbell combination was the most effective from a scoring angle.

Campbell Scores First

From the drop of the puck the game looked good. Fasano for Kirkland made the first dangerous play of the evening and Cooke went down with him but skated in on top of Clarke and the puck was faced off at the side of the net. Campbell did the first scoring for the Macs in the first few minutes of play. Malloy had picked up the puck at his own blue line after Clarke had sent out a long clearing shot to him. Vail went down with him and made a pretty pass to Campbell at the goal mouth.

The Millionaires went all up after that but it was not until the period was more than half over that Kibbey McDonald evened things up. Fasano was down with him. Ames made one of his many sensational saves of the game when Campbell took the rebound from Vail's shot. Thoms had no trouble putting the Millionaires in the lead once he crashed through the Massecar-Knetchel defence. He drew Clarke well out of the net and made sure of his shot.

While the Millionaires were in this little rally, Cooke and Fasano played a nice smooth combination that took them into scoring position. Cooke waited until Fasano was well past the defence before passing him the puck. Then Kirkland Lake began to get a little careless. The game seemed to be on ice and although they got through three or four times, Kibbey McDonald's and Thoms' shots looked weaker than they should have been. Just before the period ended, the Polhill-Godin trouble broke out and there was a long delay while the officials decided what they should do about it. The crowd was strangely quiet after the first gasp of dismay went up as Godin deliberately raised his stick and brought it down on Polhill's head.

Macs Tie in Rally

The second opened with both teams short one but the Macs had an eight-minute advantage over the Millionaires as there was that much difference in time in the penalties given at the close of the first. The Macs pressed this edge as much as they could but failed to register. Then Porter got mixed up in the Millionaires net with Ames and drew a penalty for two in the crease to leave the Millionaires two short and

Englehart Cup Taken to Haileybury Last Week

One local curler asked the other day where the Englehart cup was at present. That is not exactly a safe question to answer off-hand. For example when the question was asked by the gentleman referred to above, the Englehart cup was at New Liskard, but a day or so afterwards Haileybury curlers went to Liskeard and succeeded in winning possession of the trophy. Again New Liskeard made efforts to regain possession of the trophy, two rinks from Liskeard playing two Haileybury rinks, but the latter were able to retain possession of the trophy, though no one can guess for how long it will be possible for them to defend this cup. The Englehart trophy is one of the coveted curling cups and every season there is great rivalry as to who may retain it. The Englehart cup is the oldest curling trophy in this part of the North. At the lower end it has been held as far south as North Bay, while in the upper end it has come as far north as Timmins. The trophy is battered and ancient now as a result of the many trips it has taken up and down the T. & N. O. The cup was donated in the first place by the late J. L. Englehart, who at the time was chairman of the T. & N. O. C. commission.

Canadian amateur hockey circles are threatened with a wide open split as a result of the touring player situation. Here are two of the boys whose travels may be the spark that will start the explosion. They are Goalie "Hawse" Marsh and Defenceman "Red" Farrell, both of last year's Hamilton Tigers. These lads went to the far east where Montreal's champion Hawks perform and caught on with St. John Beavers. The C.A.H.A. steadfastly refused transfers. The Maritime league with the exception of Halifax first went commercial, then reversed its decision, dropped its imports and rejoined the amateur ranks. Marsh and Farrell, along with other ineligible, travelled back to their home, but this pair tossed

ed a bombshell into the picture when they turned out with British Consols, a Toronto mercantile league team. This league has O.H.A. affiliations, therefore players competing against the banned stars risk automatic suspension by the O.H.A. and the C.A.H.A. Mercantile league officials claim they are an independent league and that Marsh and Farrell are legitimate performers in their loop since they played their first game one day before the residence deadline. Maritime clubs will probably maintain that should these players be allowed to perform against O.H.A. teams it is discrimination against the east. All in all it looks like plenty of headaches for President Gilroy of the C.A.H.A. who stood pat until the maritime situation was cleaned up.
