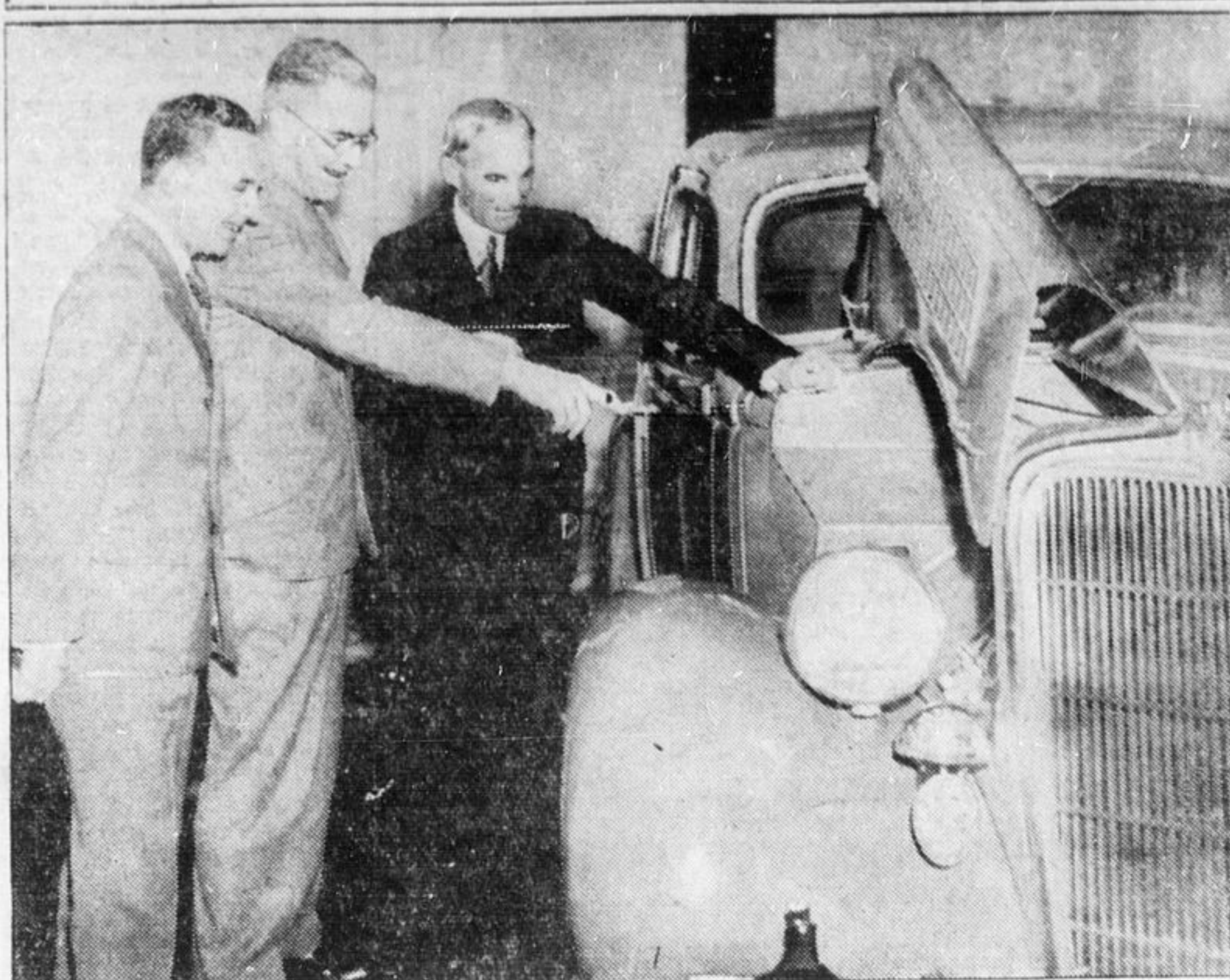

Firemen Have Many Calls Last Few Days

Most Calls are for Chimney Fires. One Call on Tuesday to Bakeshop where Damage of \$40 was Done.

It's been a busy few days for the Timmins fire department and the horses have been called into use owing to the breakdown of the small truck. Chimney fire and other small blazes have been attended to through the use of the police van equipped with an extinguisher.

The only fire in which actual damage was done was on Tuesday morning just after eleven o'clock. Informed by telephone that there was some trouble at a bake shop at 10 Wilson avenue, a fireman was despatched to see what it was all about. He found that the floor had caught fire due to the continual heat from a small boiler used in the shop. The loss of \$40 was covered by insurance.

Monday, 6.15 p.m., 6 Birch street north. At 11.00 p.m., 4 Cedar street north.

Tuesday, 5.45 p.m., 8 Gillies street.

Wednesday, 9.15 a.m., 15 Commercial avenue. At 10.55, 8 Columbus avenue. On Tuesday at 10.45 p.m. ashes burning at rear of the laundry of St. Mary's hospital gave hospital authorities some worry and a fireman was sent to see that no damage was done.

Only 350 Revolvers Have Been Registered in Town

Revolvers to the number of about 350 have been registered at the police office here to date but that is not the total of weapons of that type in the town, Chief Paul says.

Within a short time the police department of the town intend to begin prosecuting any who do not register their revolvers or pistols. The law under which registration is made necessary is a federal one and as such will probably be enforced to the limit. Any officer, municipal, provincial or do-

minion may lay charges under the new law.

Those who have not already registered their revolvers are actually committing an offence but if through oversight or neglect any who possess a weapon wishes to register it within the next few days, he may do so without fear of being held on the charge.

The registration of a gun is just as great a protection for the owner as it is a convenience for police officers, for a large number of the weapons are stolen annually in Canada. Thefts of registered weapons reported immediately to the police might lead to much faster recovery than would otherwise be possible.
