South Porcupine Trims Timmins Actually 14-2

Goal-tender Responsible for the Big Score Against Timmins. Crowd Small on Account of Weather, but They All Stayed.

Fourteen to two was the score piled up when South Porcupine met and conquered Timmins seniors here last night. The game wasn't bad until half-way through the last period when the management of the Timmins team was forced to withdraw Goalie Langford from the game. Walsh took his place in the net, without pads, and did as good a job of net minding as was possible under the circumstances.

The Timmins lads took their whipping gracefully and fought hard until the final bell. They were disheartened, of course, but kept on fighting as long as they could.

The ice was so hard in the thirty below zero weather that skates slipped over the surface and there were plenty of tumbles that could not be avoided and crashes into the boards at the end when players found their skates would not cut the ice.

ford drew another penalty for tripping McCann and again Walsh went in to mind the net. This time he had more work to do and he did make some splendid saves. He dove at the puck when it came straight at him and he caught it on the fly when he had to drop his stick to protect himself. Just after Langford came on again Catarello found the right top corner of the net and started the Porkies' parade. Far Maki scored when Langford was far from the goal, the Gold Diggers took him out of the play and Walsh stood guard for the remaining half of the period.

It was just a matter of time then. The Gold Diggers had only three substitutes and with Walsh in goal it meant they had only two to alternate. The Porkies pressed their attack unmercifully and the game ended with the score at 14 to 2.

A scant 175 people saw the game but most of them stayed all the way through to see the last Porkie goal pounded home.

Looked Like Game at First

In the first half of the first period it looked as if Timmins were going to be able to hold their own with the Porkies for once this season. Kennedy, Arundel and Walsh made smart combination plays that took them in past the Porkies defence but they couldn't get one past Esseltine. Tremblay, Burns and Morel played some more nice passing plays but couldn't get to first base with them against the Dunn-Taylor defence.

Kennedy Scores in Second

Just after the second period began Arundel at centre ice kicked the puck over to Kennedy on the wing and Kennedy shot a long hard one from just inside the blue line that Esseltine didn't see until it was in the net. That gave the Gold Diggers more than a little hope and they put on a spurt. Miller and McCann crashed into the boards together and Miller was knocked out for a few minutes but was soon back in the game. Maki got back the Porkies' two goal lead after a mix-up at the Timmins net following Taylor's shot. Lortie and Tremblay did some nice passing but couldn't beat Esseltine when they did get through. Lortie rushed again and Briden tripped him as he had an open net to shoot into. He drew a three minute penalty and Timmins out on the power. Still Esseltine kept them out. A few minutes later while Thomas was off Timmins moved in again. Taylor broke away and scored on a long shot. Langford got a warning for coming out of his net and bodying McCann in the corner when McCann was in alone. Maki made it five to one after a scramble in front of the posts. Just before the bell rang Lortie went through the Porkies' defence alone and scored Timmins second and last goal.

Welfare Bill Heavy Says Officer of T. Eaton Co.

Total disbursements by the T. Eaton Co. last year for "welfare" retiring allowance, insurance premiums, pensions for widows of employees, recreation activities and so on, amounted to \$1,250,000. Frank Bethel, superintendent of Eaton's factories, told the Royal Commission inquiring into mass buying at Ottawa on Monday. Welfare money—which meant wages paid to employees when they were laid off sick, hospital expenses and nurses' salaries brought this amount up to \$125,000.

Bethel told the commission that 5.7 per cent. of factory employees had been with Eaton's for 25 years or over; 14.5 per cent. for 20 years; 26.2 per cent. for 15 years; 41.5 per cent. for 10 years and 63.8 per cent. for five years.

The witness had no knowledge of the driving and speeding up methods said to have been practiced in Factory F-8.

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Jos. A. Allaire Dies on Monday Morning

Had Been Resident of Timmins 23 years. Funeral took Place on Wednesday Morning.

The death on Monday morning of Joseph Alphonse Allaire removed from Timmins another of the town's older residents. Although he was only 40 years of age, Mr. Allaire, had been here for the past 23 years.

On Jan. 12th he was taken to the hospital in a serious condition, part of which is said to have been due to a turkey bone which had lodged in his stomach on Jan. 6th. As a result of his two years' service overseas with the Canadian troops his right leg was in an infected condition and it is believed that the combined spread of the old wound's infection and the damage done by the turkey bone combined to cause his death.

He was born in Buckingham, Quebec, and married Emelie Potvin of that place 15 years ago. He came to the north as a young man and was in Cobalt for some time before coming to Timmins. He was employed by the Hollinger as a blacksmith for 15 years and during the past five has been with Marboan Mines. He has been unable to work since last August.

His wife, three sons, Armand, 14, years old, Raoul, 13 and Leo, 11, a daughter, Evelyn, aged four, three brothers, Hector in Haldenbury, Victor, who lives at the home 72 Mountjoy Street and Wilfred of Detroit; and one sister Ophelie (Mrs. M. H. Spencer) of Timmins, survive him.

The funeral service was held from the home on Wednesday morning and was attended by a large number of his friends and relatives. The pallbearers were his brother Victor, Rosario Allaire, Henry Potvin, Lucien Spencer, and Edmund and Ivan Laneville. Burial was at the Roman Catholic cemetery.

Mr. Allaire's passing came as a shock to the many residents of Timmins and district who knew him and held him in high regard.

Plan New Company to Work Three Porcupine Groups

Keora Mines Ltd., will hold its annual and special general meetings Jan. 31 when shareholders will be asked to ratify an agreement between Keora Mines, South Keora Mines, North Whitney Gold Syndicate and Minefinders Limited, says The Mail and Empire Monday.

Under the terms of the agreement permission is granted to Minefinders to carry on geological and other investigations upon the properties of the various companies concerned for a period of 90 days. In the event that Minefinders elects to proceed with further development of the properties in the Porcupine area, a new company will be formed with a capital stock of 3,000,000 shares at \$1 par, to which the three companies will convey their properties for 1,500,000 fully paid shares, subject to deduction of 15,000 shares to make provision for a commission of 10 per cent. as when earned leaving 1,350,000 shares for distribution among the three companies. All of the 1,500,000 shares will be held in escrow for a period of 18 months or such shorter term as may be agreed upon.

Minefinders will firmly underwrite and agree to pay for 250,000 shares of treasury stock at 20 cents per share to give the company \$50,000. In addition Minefinders shall have an option upon 1,150,000 shares of the new company at an average price of 36 cents per share to produce a further sum of \$425,000, making the total treasury \$475,000. After the underwriting and option, 600,000 shares of stock will remain in the new company's treasury.

Keora shareholders will be asked to pass a by-law authorizing directors to carry out the terms of the agreement, and on the release of the escrow shares the company will surrender its charter, and its assets consisting of 420,000 shares of the new company, being approximately one-third of the 1,350,000 shares to be divided among the three companies, will be distributed to Keora shareholders.

Similar proposals will be submitted to shareholders of South Keora Mines at its meeting on Jan. 31. South Keora however, will have 700,000 shares in the new company to distribute among its shareholders, which is approximately one-half of the total shares to be issued for properties.

Search Now Made for D. Delaney, Bushman

Was Ill and Attempted to Walk to Camp 35 Miles Away. Has Been Missing Since Jan. 2.

Missing since Jan. 2nd, inquiries are being made as to the whereabouts of David Delaney, a woodsman of between 50 and 60 years of age.

He came to Timmins from McRae's lumber camp on the Whitefish river in December under a doctor's care and after some time in St. Mary's hospital he was allowed to leave.

He told friends of his intention to walk to McRae's a distance of between 35 and 40 miles, though it is said he was in no condition to make the trip. He left here on Jan. 1st. He was seen on Jan. 2nd in Connaught but since then he has not been heard from. He never reached the McRae camp.

It is thought that he may have become exhausted before completing the long hike and if he did, the possibilities of finding any trace of him during the next few months are very slim.

If anyone knows anything in regard to the whereabouts of Mr. Delaney or can give any information that may be helpful in tracing him they will be doing a good turn and relieving the anxiety of friends by communicating with the provincial police at Timmins.

Good Values Obtained in Samples from Duparquet

An assay received to-day from the Dominion Department of Mines revealed a value of \$10.85 a ton in a 1,100 pound ore sample which Duparquet Mining Company recently shipped to Ottawa. The half ton of ore was blasted from trenches 7 and 8 in the new discovery area of the property where surface work and diamond drilling have already revealed commercial ore bodies similar to those obtained at the Beattie Gold Mines, a nearby property. The commercial values obtained in such a large assay bear out the earlier promise of the company's development work in its new discovery area.

Duparquet also announces a discovery of gold in the sedimentary area which embraces a large portion of its properties. Values up to \$14.35 a ton have been obtained there at a depth of 399 feet. This discovery is the more important as it is probably the first time that gold in commercial quantities has appeared in the sedimentary rocks of the Beattie-Galatea area.

Securities Commissioner Lists Shady Salesmen

Pursuing the campaign against shady stock salesmen, J. M. Godfrey, Ontario Securities Commissioner, has compiled a list of those engaged in irregular practices in this province and will forward it to the Securities Commissioners of other provinces.

Mr. Godfrey, announcing this additional step in the campaign, said he will also send the list to the United States Securities Commission at Washington and to the attorney-general of New York State.

On Saturday Mr. Godfrey conferred with Hon. W. J. Major, Manitoba Attorney-General, concerning the problems in checking the abuses in handling securities and arranged a conference for this week with W. R. Cottingham, Manitoba securities commissioner.

Death of William Warrell at Cochrane Last Week

Cochrane lost a well-known and respected citizen on Thursday of last week in the person of William Warrell. The funeral was held on Saturday afternoon, Jan. 19th, from the United Church and interment was made in the Cochrane cemetery.

The late Wm. Warrell had been a resident of Cochrane for the past twenty-two years, previous to that being engaged in the lumber business with headquarters in North Bay. In 1912 he moved to Cochrane where he went into business there. He is survived by one son, LaSelle Warrell, of Cochrane, four daughters, Mrs. J. B. Smith, London, Ont., Mrs. Lorne Roberts, Simcoe, Ont., Mrs. David McVicar, Cochrane, and Miss Edith Warrell, Port Arthur.

Hear President of The International

Clear Reception of Kiwanis Address Heard by Members of the Timmins Club on Monday. Other Kiwanis Notes.

The new president of the Kiwanis club, Arch Gillies, officially took over office at the meeting of the club on Monday at noon. Dr. S. L. Honey on behalf of the members, welcomed Mr. Gillies to his new position in a particularly witty and instructive address. Kiwanian Robert Dye presented Mr. Gillies with the Kiwanis president's button.

The address of W. J. Carrington, International Kiwanis president, over the Columbia network, was the feature of the Monday meeting. A short wave radio, supplied by Kiwanian Percy Meisley brought in the broadcast so that it was clearly heard. Albert Orr installed the machine for the occasion.

Mr. Carrington drew attention to the great good accomplished in the past by the Kiwanis club since its birth 20 years ago. The organization now has 1900 branches and 85,000 members. One of the most important jobs has been the helping of children to be better prepared for life's battles and in seeing them safely through the years that might bring malnutrition and evil.

The speaker related some of the bad points of the present relief system as practised on the continent and stated that a great deal of harm had been done by some of the bad points of the system, particularly in the destruction of individual initiative.

He also outlined plans for the future, designed to protect the social life of Canada and the United States and combat communism as well as the evils resulting from the distribution of relief.

BOMB FOUND IN OFFICE BUILDING AT CLEVELAND

What appears to be an attempt to blow up one of Cleveland's highest office structures, the Terminal Tower building, 55 storeys high, was uncovered on Tuesday afternoon when a bomb in which eight sticks of dynamite were included, was found on the sixth story of the building. A partly burned fuse was attached to the bomb and apparently it was only good fortune that prevented serious damage and likely loss of life.
