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### Expenditure in the North May be Curbed

Government Said to be Alarmed at Expenditures in North for December, and Plan to Reduce Costs at Present.

According to word from Toronto over the week-end it would appear that the necessary expenditures on the North during recent weeks have alarmed the members of the government and there is said to be a general call for a reduction. Just how this reduction may be accomplished is another matter, but information from Toronto suggests that the government is liable to proceed as it has done before and simply slash the expenditures regardless of the reactions or the consequences. People in the North will not be concerned over the effect of such a policy on the popularity of the government as they will be in regard to the situation that will be created for the unfortunate in this country who need the work that has been carried out under previous programmes.

In any case the information from To-

ronto is to the effect that the brakes are being placed on expenditures in the North and that some works planned to be done will not be carried out.

According to one dispatch from Toronto, it is said that rumor reports that during the months of December last, for instance, expenditures under Northern Development, exceeded expenditures in December, 1934, by more than \$1,000,000, and that the lay-out of monies for January may register an even more marked increase.

For some time the department of health is said to have had under consideration a plan of providing for northern physicians, doing relief work, more adequate remuneration for their services than they are now able to command. This plan was reported yesterday to have been dropped in view of the retrenchment which cabinet is said to have advised.

### That Body of Yours

 The Successful Treatment of Mental Cases

A hundred years ago or less, insane asylums were places where "crazy" people were locked up in cages like wild beasts. The result was that they generally behaved like that.

The modern psychiatric hospital is a place where people who are mentally (and frequently also physically) ill are studied and treated, and often cured the same as other sick folk.

The object of all the studies and efforts which are now being made is to "do something" for these unfortunates—"to get them well," or at least well enough to return to their homes where they can be cared for by the family physician.

### Mine Stocks Suffer by Gold Clause Case

Trading on Toronto Stock Exchange Affected Last Month by the Question before U.S. Courts.

January transactions on the mining section of the Toronto Stock Exchange increased both in volume and values over the previous month. Total sales for January were 12,782,163, having a value of \$12,168,137 which compared with 10,207,048 shares with a value of \$9,541,993 in December.

Heavier trading in the senior golds accounted for the greater gain in sales values, this group being particularly affected by the gold clause case before the Supreme Court of the United States. This question of American constitutionality was the factor around which the whole market action of January revolved.

Some days before it was brought to the attention of the industrial markets, the mining section felt the deterring influence of the appeal to the judiciary, for while the industrials broke sharply on the 15th of the month, the golds commenced to discount the news on the 20th.

Prior to this date the mining section had shown comparative strength, particularly in the secondaries. Daily volume ruled high and individual company reports were generally favourable, but the even tenor was broken on the 10th by sharply declining prices which culminated on the 15th in a severe shakeout. In the decline interlisted senior golds bore the brunt of heavy New York pressure and local action in the group became general.

After the shock a disposition to regard the gold question in a calmer manner prevailed and the board showed certain signs of recovery but failed to make up for all the ground lost.

The month's action is portrayed by the exchange index of 20 representative golds. Opening the period at 116.18 the index moved some 2 points higher before showing uncertainty on the 10th when it slipped off to 117.06. On the 14th the figure stood at 112.64 dropping sharply the next day more than 3 points. Recovery in the next week raised the index almost to its opening level but this was followed by small daily declines which dropped it to the month's low of 107.41 with strength in the last few sessions carrying the index to 110.32.

Most active stocks in the senior golds were Teck-Hughes with 82,406 shares; Wright-Hargreaves 65,601; Hollinger 50,869 and in the secondary golds God's Lake with 441,020; Pickle Crow 396,984 and Central Patricia 383,290.

Silvers and base metals followed a generally similar course to the golds but swings were less wide.

During the month 183 issues appeared for trading, the ratio of declines to advances being 2 to 1. Individual items recorded on the floor amounted to 34,460 as compared with 28,924 in December.

In addition to their mental ailments these people are subject to the same physical diseases as afflict any other group of the population and must be treated as they arise. Not infrequently (perhaps in all cases) some physical disorder is the underlying cause of the mental upset. These must be sought for and removed as far as possible.

I am quoting Dr. John T. Nerancy of Elgin, Illinois, in an address on Glimpses of Modern Psychiatry.

He says further: "At the Elgin State hospital we have about 4,300 patients all the time. We receive about 200 new cases every month and send home 150. All patients are treated individually and receive such medical treatment as is needed besides the treatment for the mental condition in the form of work and recreation. All women, who are fit to receive such attention, are given "beauty shop" treatments frequently in order to maintain or develop their self respect.

You will notice that the underlying idea is that these patients are treated as if they were normal, not "crazy," every physical defect is corrected or helped as much as possible; and opportunity for work and play is provided.

This treatment raises their morale or self respect and as they find that their physical needs and physical ailments receive prompt and courteous attention, they are more willing to freely discuss their mental problems with the physicians, and they are thus able to "unwind the tangled skein." That this treatment is successful is shown by the fact that for every 20 that go in, 15 are able to return to their homes.

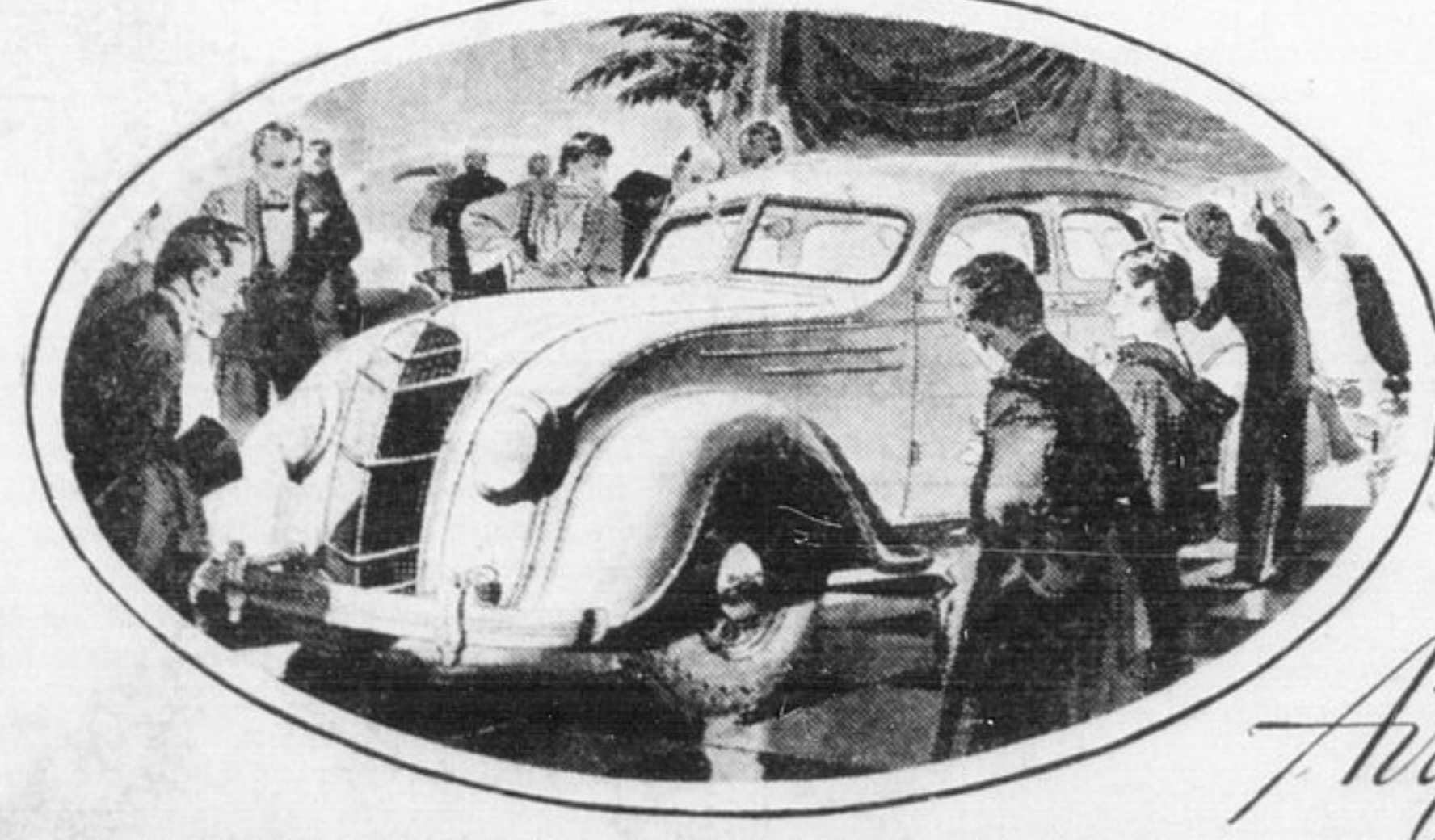
