Many New Features in 1935 Chevrolet

New Master and Standard Models Strongly Emphasize Beauty and Style. Other Features in Models

Strongly emphasizing beauty and style and featuring high-powered performance with economy, are announced for 1935 by Chevrolet. The 1935 Standard Chevrolets are on display at dealer showrooms for the first time today, and Master models will be available soon. Dealers are now in possession of full details.

Virtually the same performance is incorporated in the 1935 Standard as in the Master. The latter, however, departs distinctly from previous Chevrolets in striking advances of body design and trim. The engines, incorporating many improvements over the 1934 Master, are of the same size and design in both models, while in the chassis the chief difference is the presence in the Master of Chevrolet enclosed kneecap suspension, now entering its second year, improved in construction and operation.

Visually, the New Master retains only the characteristic outlines of the radiator, and the trade-mark on hub caps and radiator emblem, to indicate that it is of Chevrolet design. The V-radiator is narrower and more sloping, the unit fenders are highly contoured, while the windshield not only slopes back steeply but also is slightly V-shaped, causing the forepart of the car to flow smoothly into the body which is beautifully streamlined. By utilizing the newly-developed all-steel roof construction, Chevrolet has attained a new sleekness, its crowned roof sweeping from windshield to the graceful rear in a continuous curve, an effect heightened by absence of roof panels and mouldings and by the continuity of body colour over the entire top.

Every detail of the Master is new, starting with the front bumper and including the radiator grille, the ornament that supplants the radiator cap now under the hood, the horizontal hood louvers, the running board pattern, streamlined door handles, spare tire mounting (concealed in some models), tail lamp and rear bumper. The

wheelbase of the new Master is increased to 113 in. and greater body space has been achieved by moving the engine forward. The appearance of great length has been enhanced by lowering the floor level one inch.

All trunk models have integral trunks embodied in the rear panels, with compartments for the spare wheel. On De Luxe models pressed steel wheels with short rounded spokes are regular equipment. Wire wheels with large hub caps are used on regular models.

In the lower-priced line of Standard models, larger bodies, a new engine with 23 per cent more horsepower, an improved chassis frame, and numerous other new features give improved performance, better economy, and greater comfort and safety.

Bodies possess many new convenience and appearance features.

The Valentine dance given by the Canadian Legion last night in the Hollinger hall was attended by a large number of people and was a fine success.

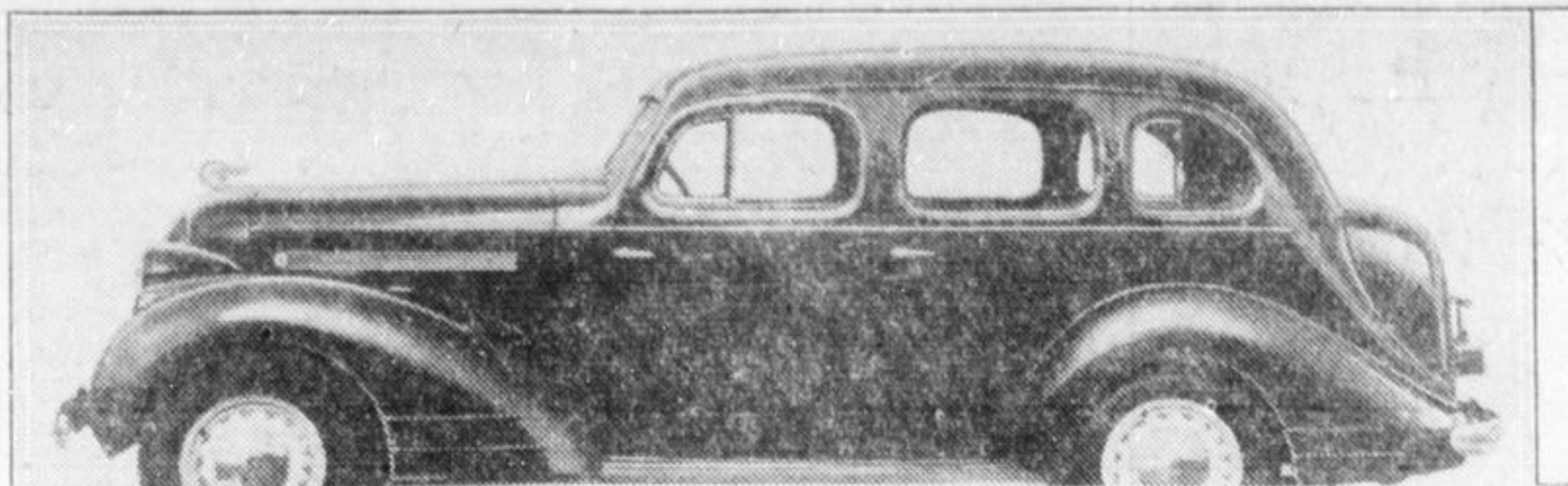
Chas. Pierce, who left Timmins recently on a trip to Palestine, sailed from New York yesterday. He will probably be away more than two months.

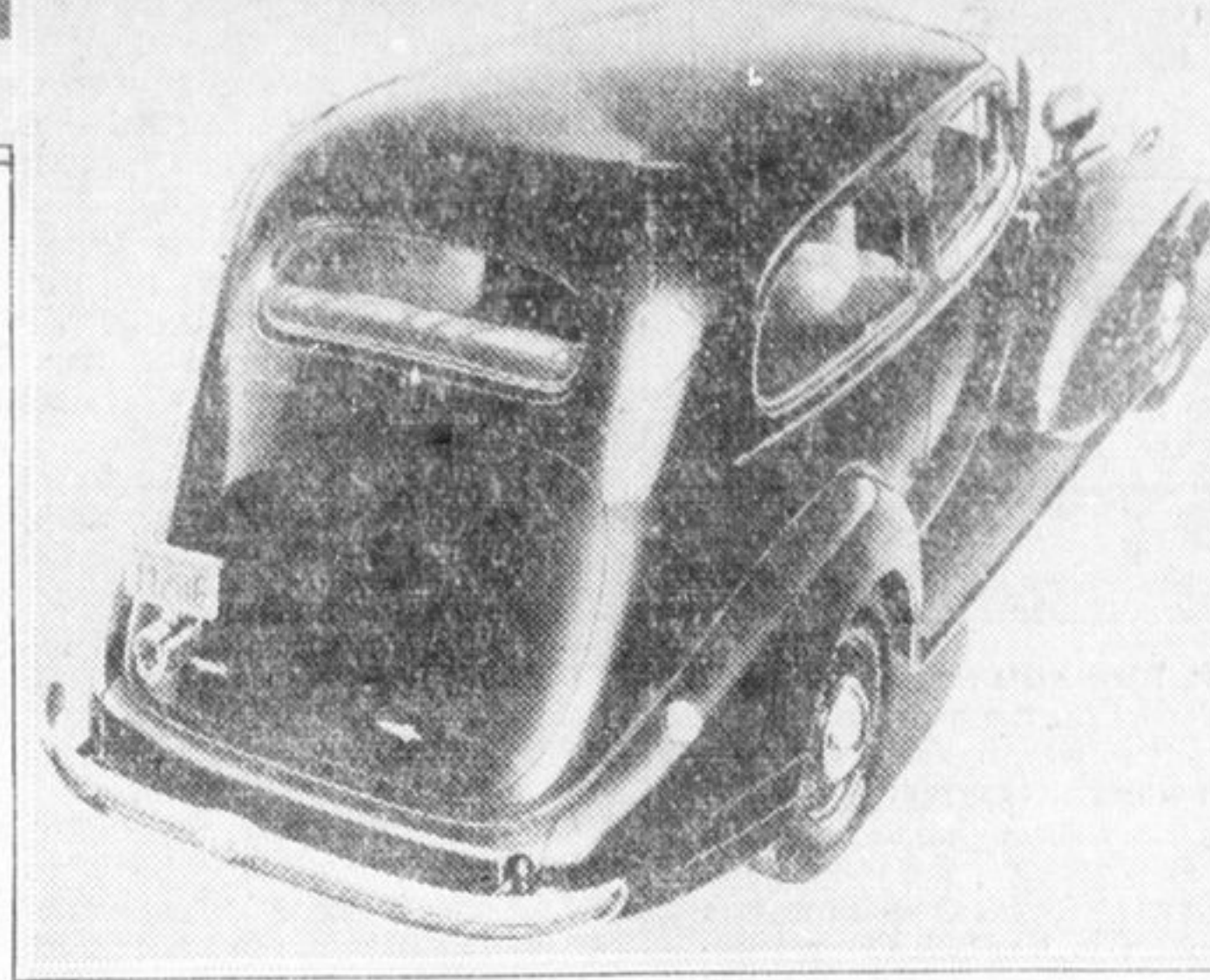

Callander Houses and Town Hall Burn

Dr. Dafoe's Residence is Saved by Change of the Wind. Relief Wood Lost in Flames. Other Damage

Fire broke out in the library in the town hall at Callander on Tuesday morning and gutted the two-storey structure. Fanned by a strong south-east wind the flames swept on and also wiped out three frame houses, which adjoined the hall.

The records of the town were saved, while the occupants of the houses were able to save their furniture.

Those who lost their homes were Charles Nolan, Charles Harvey, and Mrs. Church, a 75-year-old woman, who lives alone. Messrs Nolan and Harvey carried insurance, but it is said Mrs. Church's property was uninsured.

One hundred cords of firewood piled behind the town hall fell prey to the flames. The wood was destined for the 200 families of the town who are in relief. This loss will be serious, as the wood was dry. Relief Officer Lyle Evans, who discovered the fire, said that the families on relief had green wood, but it would be almost impossible to procure dry firewood now.

Directly opposite the town hall is the office and residence of Dr. A. R. Dafoe, though the direction of the wind saved the doctor's home.

The fire temporarily interrupted the power service in the town, as several of the wires were down. Also affected by the interruption was the Dafoe hospital for the Dionne quintuplets. However, workmen of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission this afternoon restored the power service to normal.

The town hall, which also served as courthouse, library and jail, was built in 1918.

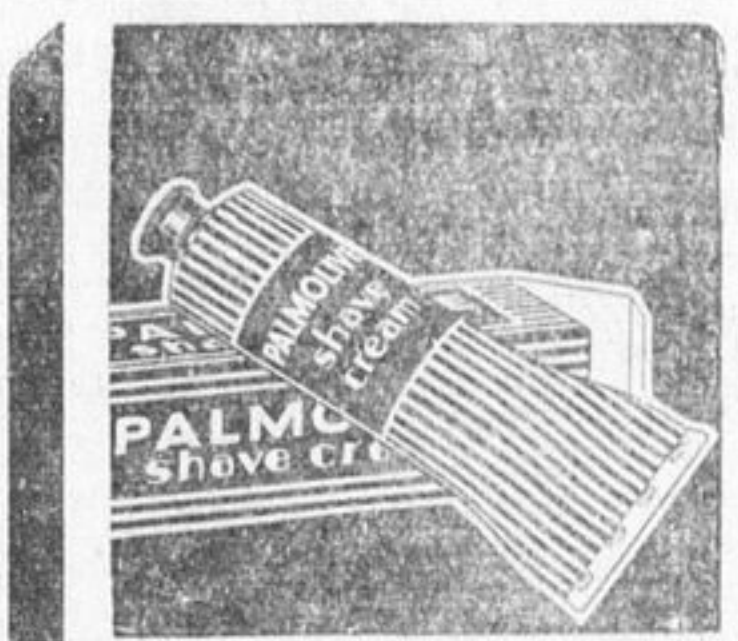
HARRY MARCEAU LIBERAL CANDIDATE IN NIPISSING

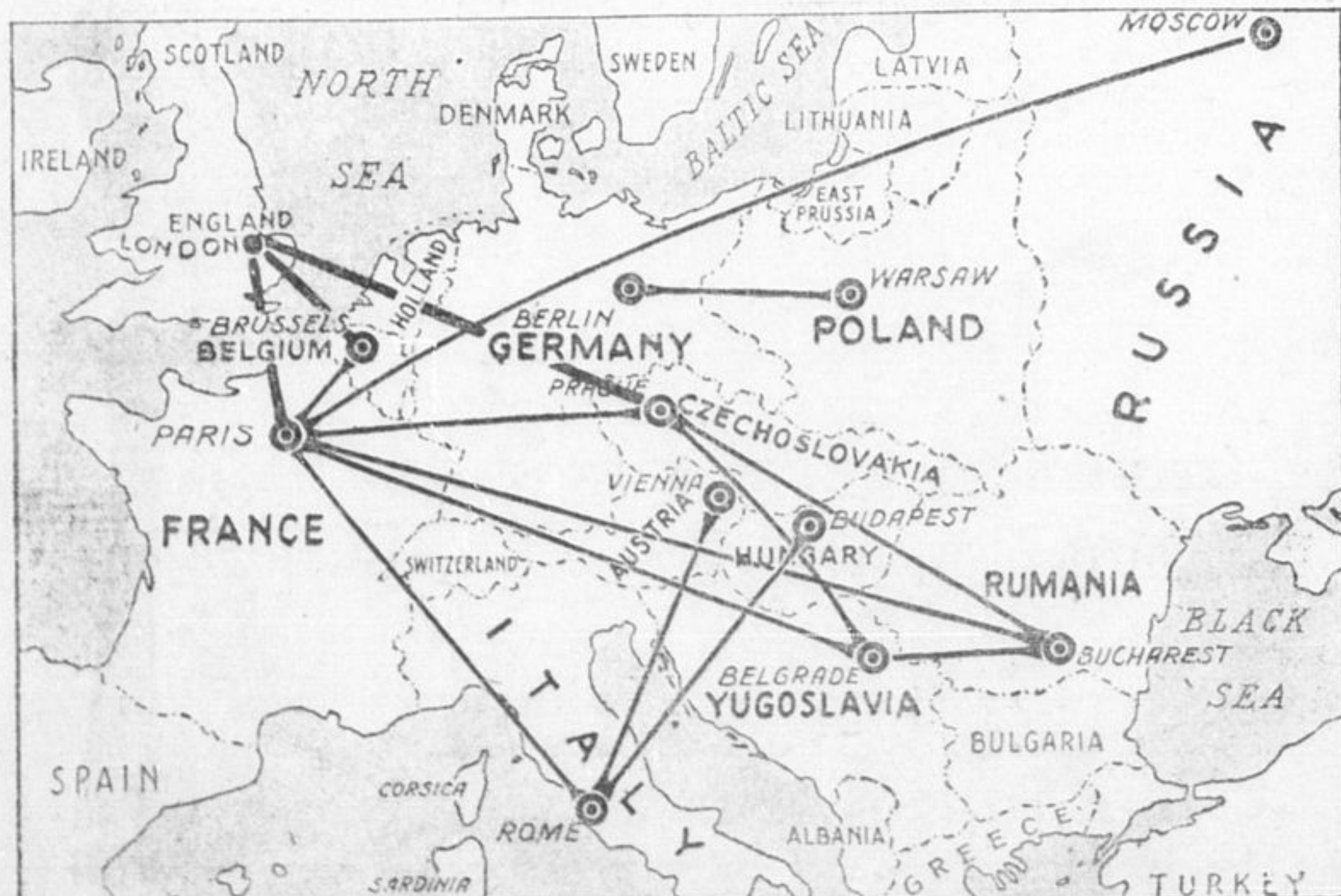

London Pacts to Link All European Nations?



The Franco-British conference held at No. 10 Downing St., London, is seen by observers as a possible prelude to an "armed" peace of Europe dominated by combined air forces of Britain and France. The proposals made by and to Simon and Laval, British and French foreign ministers, respectively, add to the long list of European peace, non-aggression and military alliances signed during the past year or two. The map indicates the network of these pacts which lead to some confusing results. Britain, for instance, forms no pact with Moscow, but does with France, who has an unofficial military alliance with the Soviet. Thus Britain and Russia are, in effect, linked by the French agreement.
