North Lignite May be Profitably Mined

Dr. Speakman says North has Hundred Million Tons and Industry is Feasible.

"Technically and economically speaking the coal mining project is feasible." These are the words quoted in despatches as being used by Dr. H. B. Speakman, director of the Ontario Research Foundation, in an address to a Toronto service club. Northern Ontario has a deposit of lignite coal, Dr. Speakman said, totalling 100,000,000 tons, which can be mined and placed on the market at a saving of \$2.00 a ton over United States coal. He added that knowledge of these coal deposits and the possibilities for development were the direct result of research carried on by the Ontario Research Foundation.

It will be remembered that Dr. Speakman addressed the Timmins board of trade in December last year and dealt at some length with the possibilities of the development of the lignite deposits of the area north of Cochrane. Dr. Speakman made it plain here that the lignite resources of the North were well worth development and offered an opportunity of much importance for the establishment of a new industry. All here will be pleased to note that he is informing the South of the possibilities of the country north of Cochrane.

Military Funeral Given George Kelly

Death of Well-Known Cobalt Resident who Served in the British and Canadian Forces in the War.

According to despatches to hand from Cobalt, military honours were paid on Tuesday afternoon at the funeral of George Kelly, old resident of the Cobalt district and a veteran of both the Imperial army and the C. E. F. who died on Sunday in the Municipal hospital at Cobalt following a brief illness. Comrades of the Cobalt Post of the Canadian Legion attended the funeral, at which the services were conducted by Rev. Canon F. H. Hincks rector of St. Paul's Anglican church, Haileybury. Burial was made in Mount Pleasant cemetery at Haileybury.

Mr. Kelly, who was 67 years of age and a native of Sligo, Ireland, came to Northern Ontario from Western Canada at the time of the Larder Lake "rush" nearly 30 years ago, and had lived in the Temiskaming district since with the exception of the years spent overseas during the World War. He was in Gowganda for a time, and after the war lived in Haileybury until the fire of October 1922 when he removed to Cobalt. For some time he was with the O'Brien mine at the Cross Lake property at Cobalt.

Mr. Kelly entered the heavy cavalry arm of the British army service as a youth of 17 years, later going to India with the 16th Lancers. He saw service in two frontier wars there, and after went through the Boer War, where his regiment was attached to General French's famous "flying column." Later, he was on patrol duty in South Africa when trouble developed between Germans and the natives in the former German Southwest Africa. He attained the rank of sergeant and left the army after having served 18 years with the Imperial forces.

On his discharge, Mr. Kelly came to Canada, but when the Great War outbreak came, went to Valcartier camp to enlist for service being one of the first men from Cobalt district to join up. He was assigned to the 15th battalion. Mr. Kelly remained in Europe throughout the war, being discharged in 1920, when he came back to Temiskaming. He had no relatives in this country, but two sisters reside in the Old Land.

CANADA'S GOLD OUTPUT INCREASED DURING YEAR

Gold produced in Canada in 1934 amounted to 2,964,826 ounces, compared with 2,949,309 ounces in the previous year, the Dominion Statistics reported to-day. Production in December was 261,137 ounces against 248,639 in December, 1933.

Ontario led the provinces in the December production with 184,849 ounces. Quebec produced 38,010 ounces, British Columbia 22,952, Manitoba and Saskatchewan 13,587, Yukon 1,516, Nova Scotia 469, and Alberta 11 ounces.

At the average price of \$34.57 per ounce for gold in December the Canadian output was worth \$9,035,699.

Gold from jewelry and scrap received at the royal mint during 1934 amounted to 116,862 ounces, an increase of 39.6 over the 83,689 ounces received in 1933.

WOMAN RIVER GOLD MINES DRILLING IN MATACHEWAN

Woman River Gold Mines is carrying on a diamond drill campaign at its property in the Matachewan gold area. The drill is said to have intersected a well mineralized quartz vein at a depth of 75 feet, and later reports state that the drill still is in ore at 85 feet. Another hole cut a quartz vein at 37 feet depth showing a width of three feet with high grade continuing to 40 feet depth. It is stated that the drill core shows visible gold. It is planned to continue the present hole to 150 feet depth and if results continue favourable shaft sinking and underground development will be proceeded with.

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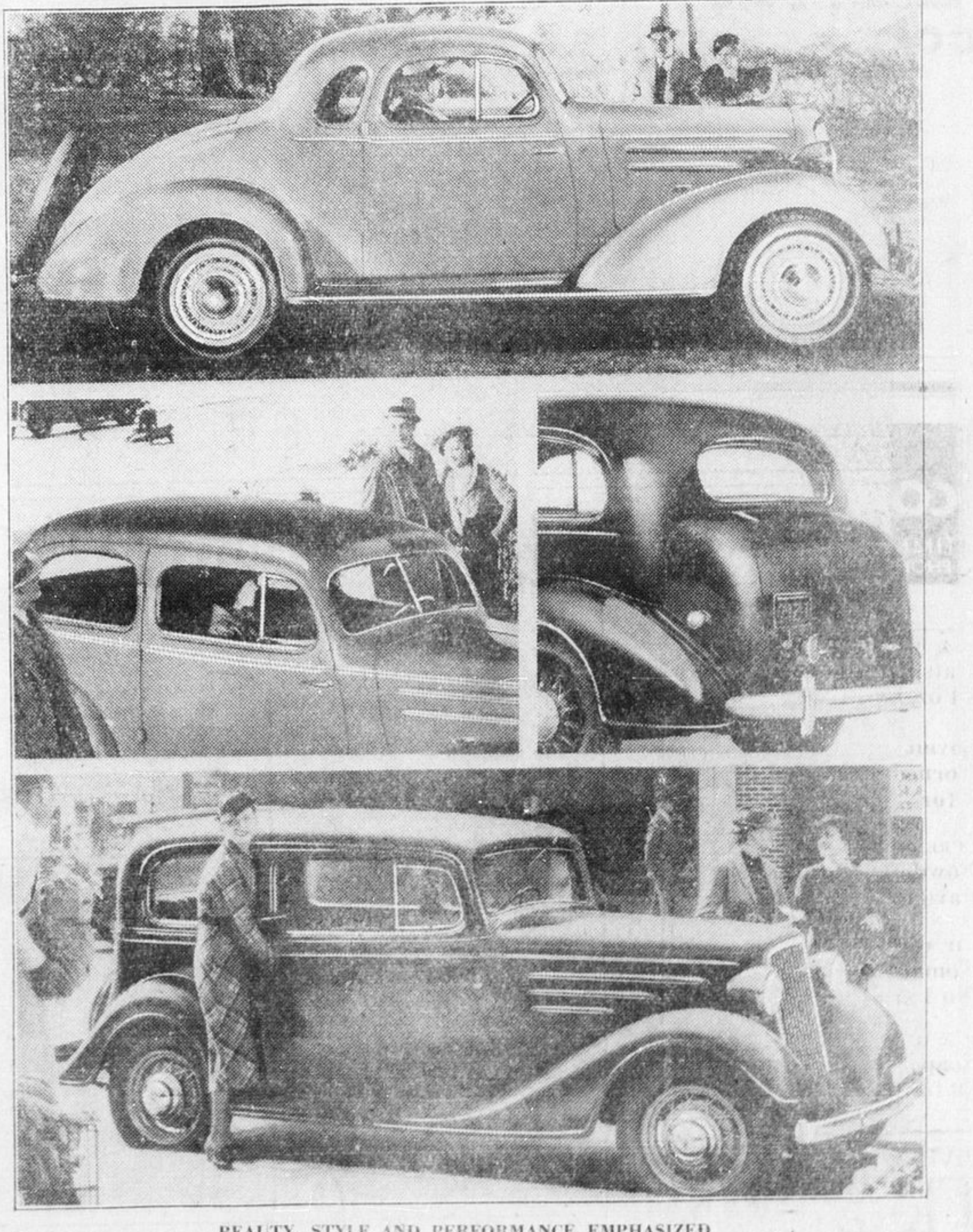

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1935 Chevrolets Master and Standard Announced



BEAUTY, STYLE AND PERFORMANCE EMPHASIZED

New 1935 Master and Standard models have just been announced by Chevrolet. The Master models depart distinctly from previous Chevrolets in body design and the solid-steel Turret-Top body by Fisher is one of the striking improvements.

Above is shown, the Chevrolet Master 2-passenger coupe. Centre panels show, on the right, the beautifully streamlined rear-quarter of the new bodies; and on the left, a view of the solid-steel Turret-Top

roof. Below is shown, Chevrolet Standard Coach, which achieves virtually the same performance as the Master. There are six models in the Standard line and ten in the Master line.
