George Odinak, a native of the Ukraine, whose knowledge of English is limited, was charged with having obtained credit in October, 1934, under false pretences. He had gone to a local merchant and brought \$18 worth of clothes, saying that he was employed at the Hollinger, and showing a brass check to "prove" it. It was later ascertained that he had not been at the mine at that time. BRITISH LOCOMOTIVE RAN ONE HUNDRED MILES PER HOUR

Despite the inroads of Deisel-propelled locomotives into the realms of speed: the London North Eastern Raflway engine, "Flying Scotsman" demonstrated that coal-burning locomotives are far from the discard, states F. J. Gemmell Smith, of London, in the Overseas section of Canadian National Railways Magazine for Febru-

Using a locomotive which had been in operation for 653,000 miles, with 44,000 miles travelled since its last overhaul, Driver Sparshatt and Fireman Webster of the L.N.E.R. hauled a train of three cars and a dynamometer car between King's Cross (London) and Leeds, 186 miles in 152 minutes, an average speed being made of 73.8 miles an hour. A speed of 100 miles an hour was reached during the run and maintained for 600 yards.
