"This is a declaration of war against the United States," said those opposed to Senator Huey P. Long's bill that is aimed to seize control of federal relief money spent in the state of Louisiana. The legislature passed the bill.

CENSURE BY LEAGUE CAUSES FEELING IN GERMAN CITY

A strongly worded note is now on the way from Hitler to the British government, according to despatches to-day. Condemnation of Germany by the League of Nations for disregarding the rearmament clauses of the Treaty of Versailles has caused much feeling in Berlin.

CHORLEY HOUSE FOR SALE ANYTIME NOW, SAYS PREMIER

Government House in Toronto, known as Chorley Park, the official residence of the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, will be sold if the government receives a reasonable offer, said Premier Hepburn yesterday.

NEW WINDSOR SOON TO TAKE PLACE AMONG LARGE CITIES

Windsor, Walkerville, Sandwich and East Windsor will be welded into one large city as soon as Hon. David A. Croll's bill receives royal assent. The new Windsor will have a population of more than 100,000.

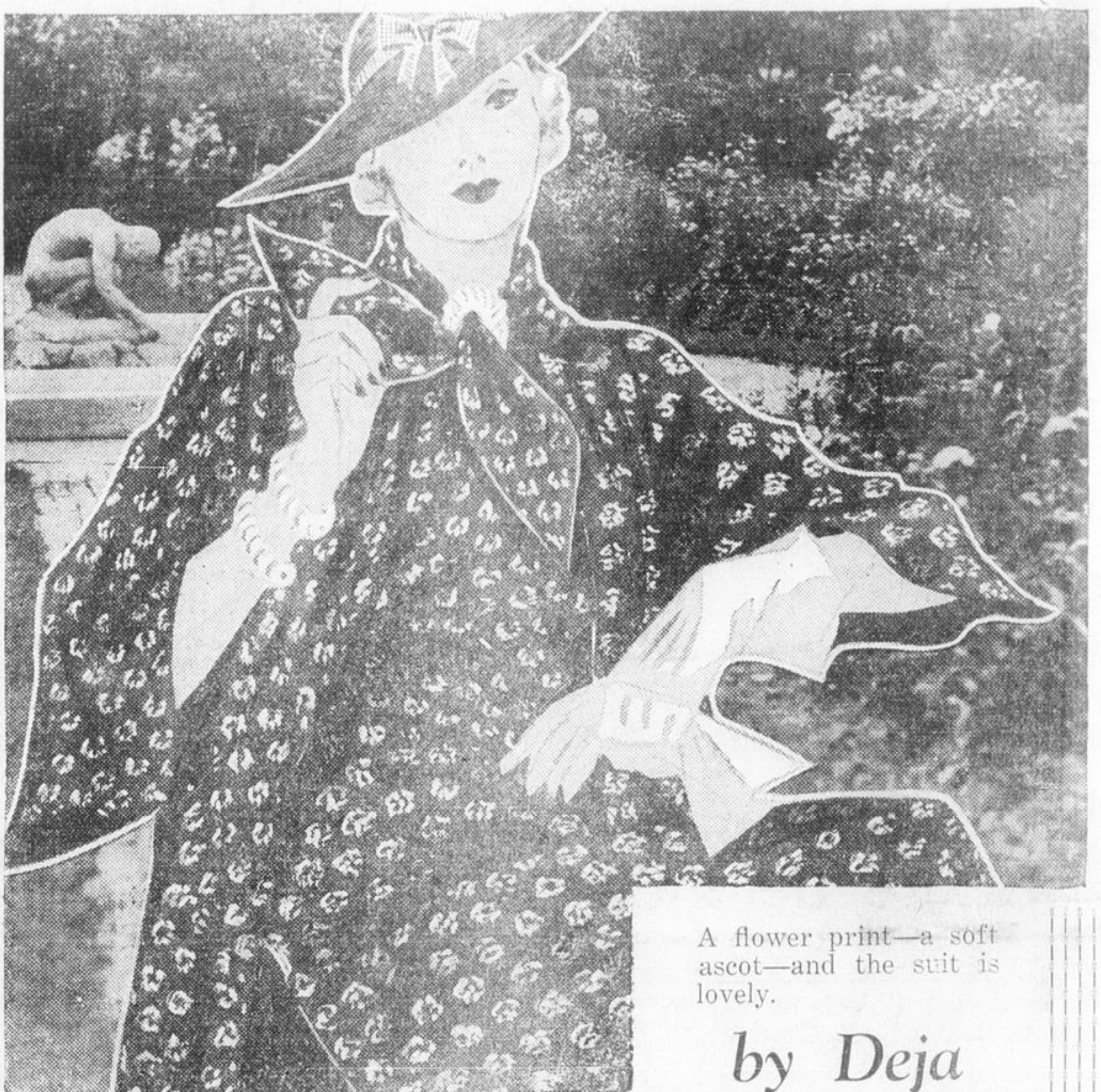
