### Notable Volume on the Birds of Canada

National Museum, Dept. of  
Mines, Ottawa, Issues  
Book on the Birds of the  
Dominion.

Characterizing it as the "black robin" and the worst enemy of some of our largest and most useful birds, P. A. Taverner, ornithologist of the National Museum of Canada and widely known Canadian authority on birds, shows no sentimental attachment for the crow in his "Birds of Canada" publish by the National Museum, Department of Mines, Ottawa. "The crow is about as black as it is painted and adaptive, it is well able to survive even should every man's hand be turned against it. The most strenuous efforts practicable will never imperil the species, and as for active methods of control, probably the least satisfactory and most expensive one is the County system".

Strikingly in contrast is his opinion of the robin. "This familiar harbinger of Spring, originally named by Englishmen in remembrance of old home scenes, has on its own merits, carved a place for itself in the affection of the North American people". Its worst enemy is probably the domestic cat. "A well-fed cat will not effect the destruction as one that has to earn its own living, but not even the best fatted and laziest cat can resist the stealthy stalk and rapid pounce when the occasion offers even though afterwards it refrains from eating its prey".

The English sparrow is denounced as one of the most undesirable importations from Europe. "In Canada this bird has multiplied beyond all reason and though its objectionable features have increased its commendable ones have not".

The Canada goose is described as one of the most intelligent and wildest of birds, which exhibits occasional bits of strategy that are astonishing. "Domestically the Canada goose is a model for man. Geese generally mate for life, mourn a lost mate and are not easily comforted. Both sexes assist in the responsibilities of the family life and if necessary share the supreme sacrifice in its behalf".

How migratory birds find their way is still only vaguely understood. "No sense with which we are familiar explains how some species return unerringly to lonely oceanic island over wastes of monotonous sea." The Arctic Tern, nesting from the Gulf of St. Lawrence to the polar regions and wintering as far south as the Antarctic continent, doubtless performs the greatest migratory journey.

"Birds of Canada" strikes a warning note in relation to the protection of wild life but today we are not so optimistic, and unless means are found to reduce the annual kill, or to materially increase production, the future of North American migratory game will afford deep concern to sincere conservationists and thoughtful sportsmen alike. The only factor that seems possible of direct or immediate control is the legal kill, but this, generally of sportsmen seem most reluctant to apply to the practical needs of the case."

Published to awaken and stimulate an interest, both aesthetic and practical, in a study of Canadian birds, "Birds of Canada" is a popularly written, exhaustive account of all kinds of birds known to occur in the Dominion, their distinguishing features, nestings, economic status, and distribution. Familiar names are used and technical terms are avoided whenever possible. A "Key to Birds of Canada", presented in the introductory pages, provides a ready means for the identification of unknown species.

A distinctive feature of "Birds of Canada" is the use of Canadian material throughout in its publication. Substantially bound in cloth and illustrated by some 90 coloured tones, and close to 500 sketches, the volume comprises 410 pages of text matter, and includes in addition, a glossary and a coloured map of Canada showing bird distribution. ### Semi-Weekly Review of News in General

Items of Interest from Far

Dr. G. L. Christie, president of the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph, describes as "all imagination" the story that some girls loitering on the campus at the college were set upon by students and roughly handled.

Word from Brussels is to the effect that the "Last Post" will be sounded daily at the Menin Gate of Ypres forever, through an endowment fund established by the British Legion.

While searching through documents and other papers in the desk at the home of the late Hon. W. D. Robbins, Ottawa, United States Minister to Canada, who died in New York some ten days ago, a \$1,250 diamond bracelet was found. The bracelet was one sent on approval at the time of the marriage of the Minister's daughter more than a year ago. The bracelet was apparently tossed into the desk and lost. The jewelry firm have it back now.

Dr. Arthur Beauchesne, clerk of the House of Commons, Tuesday, recommended summoning a Constituent Assembly at Winnipeg and vesting it with authority to write a new constitution for Canada subject to appropriate legislative jurisdiction.

The Ontario Hydro Commission spent \$5,234,000 more in 1934 than in 1929 to purchase power for the Niagara system and increased revenues by only \$878,972, according to Chairman T. Stewart Lyon's first annual report tabled in the Legislature.

Germany will protest officially to the powers on the League of Nations Council against the French resolution morally condemning German re-armament. Chancellor Adolf Hitler's newspaper, the Volkischer Beobachter, intimated.

In the Legislature on Monday in connection with the bill to amalgamate Windsor, Sandwich, Walkerville and other neighboring municipalities, Hon. David Croll, Minister of Public Welfare, made the statement that Walkerville was bankrupt and had defaulted in payment of some of its bonds and debentures. The mayor of Walkerville in a signed sworn statement given to the direct of Hon. Mr. Croll. Hon. Mr. Croll stands by his statement. Protest is being made against forcing the town of Walkerville into the merger. Premier Hepburn informed the Legislature that his Government's propos-

ed to take under immediate consideration the advisability of making a money grant to the aid of the Canadian Corps pilgrimage to Vimy Ridge in June and July of 1936.

A 19-year-old youth employed as a guard for a fumigating firm, was found dead at Toronto on Monday in the bathroom of a Lands' wine Avenue house on which his employer had been operating.

Some ten million dollars to be the basis for a fifty million dollar scheme will be appropriated by the Federal parliament for a housing problem, if the House of Commons approves the recommendations of the special committee set up to study the housing problem.

H. H. David A. Croll, Minister of Welfare and Municipal Affairs, warned the Ontario Legislature that the time would ultimately arrive when relief administration would have to be taken out of the hands of the municipalities and the two Governments, Provincial and Federal would assume the burden.

Torkey started delegates to the extraordinary League Council session in German disarmament by demanding the right to re-fortify the Dardanelles in Asia Minor if other defeated nations are allowed to return to arms equality. Germany in a note to Switzerland on Monday branded Barthold Jacob, a German subject, as "a traitor of the worst kind" and said it could not return him to Swiss jurisdiction, as Switzerland had asked.

Short-selling of Quebec power bonds was not due to a leak of information from the Government, but a very substantial selling took place as a result of the speeches made in the legislature and the attorney-general's series of radio broadcasts, according to the report of John M. Godfrey, securities commissioner, which was tabled in the Legislature at Toronto on Monday.

The House of Commons voted 75 to 35 to adjourn Wednesday after Leader Mackenzie King renewed his protest against a long Easter adjournment and a late general election.

Fembroke Standard.—When the Hepburn Government stopped using the press as a medium in which to warn motorists against reckless driving they made a mistake. Last year there were 500 deaths caused by motor accidents in Ontario, while about 10,000 were injured, some of them permanently crippled. The Conservative Government made good use of the press, cautioned the public about danger, warned the motorist against what he ought not to do. The press is still the medium which can, and should be used, for this purpose.

### Committee Rejects J. Rowlandson's Bill

Member for South Cochrane  
Would Remedy Some of  
the Bush Work Methods.

A despatch from Toronto on Monday of this week says that the bill presented by John Rowlandson (Liberal, Cochrane South) to prevent lumber operators for requiring men to handle logs of a size which he said should be handled by machine or horsepower was rejected by the labour committee of the Ontario Legislature. E. J. Anderson (Liberal, Welland) was elected chairman of the committee.

Mr. Rowlandson placed the length of the log at four feet. He said present logs cut for pulpwood were really four feet two inches in length and because the extra two inches were not taken into account the labour out of every 24 cords really cut one cord for nothing. Value of this extra cord was \$5.

"I want to try to eliminate the privilege of any company asking men to skid logs 12 to 16 feet long," said Mr. Rowlandson, speaking to the bill. He added that such lumber companies as the J. R. Booth Company never asked men to skid saw logs.

"Are these logs handled by derrick?" asked William Duckworth (Conservative, Toronto-Dovercourt). "They're not handled at all," said Mr. Rowlandson.

Harry J. Fine, Kirkland Lake lawyer, told the committee the logs were handled by man-power.

"Do you mean the companies compel a man to go in there and put out a log 16 feet long?" asked Mr. Duckworth. "Each man must do his own work," Mr. Fine replied.
