The small daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Cowden underwent an operation in St. Mary's hospital this week.

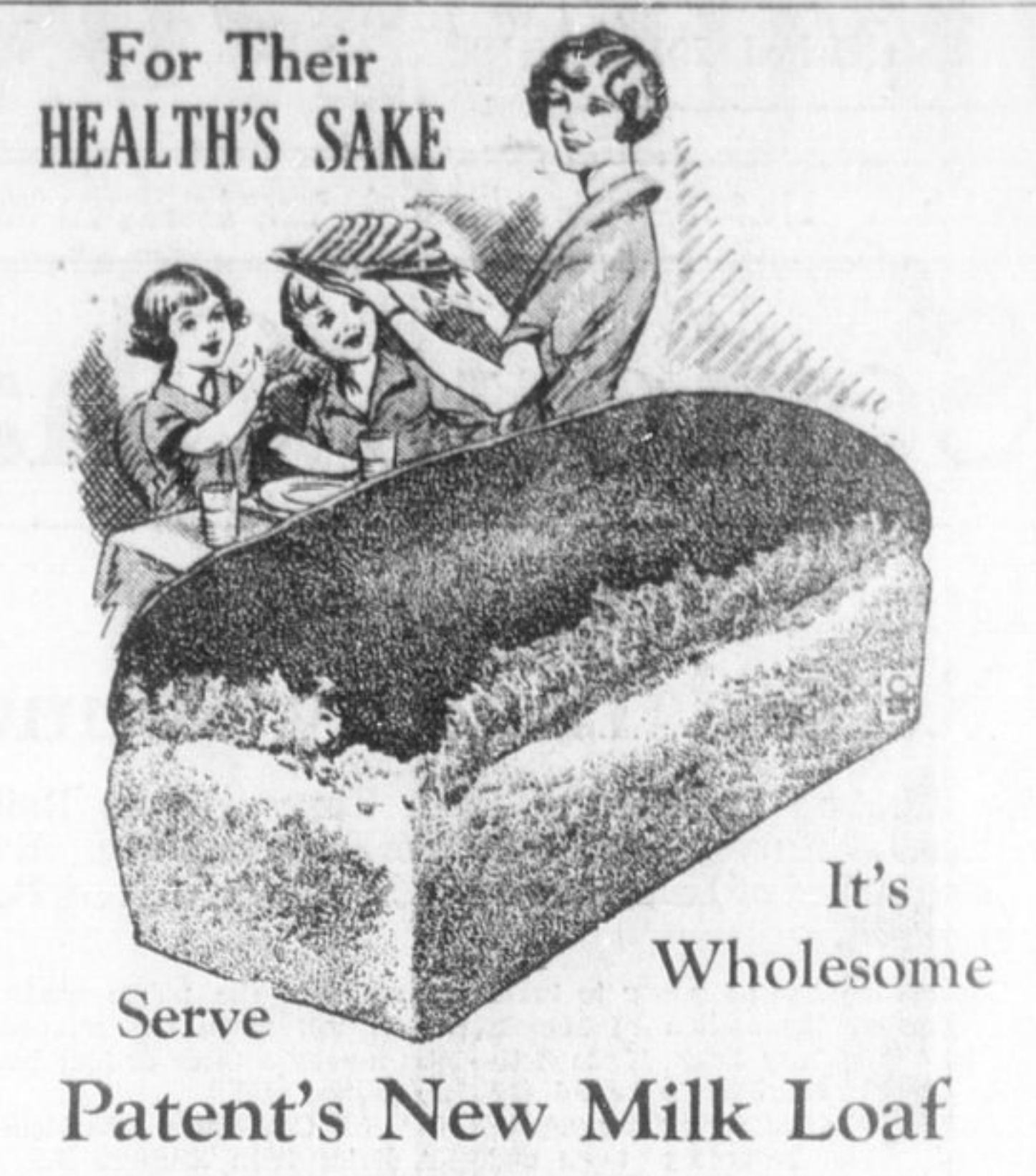
