TEN YEARS AGO IN TIMMINS From data in the Porcupine Advance Files.

It was a colorful and beautiful affair in which a large number of Timmins boys and girls took part. Death of Mother of Porcupine Citizen

Reginald Stevens, of the Dome, Bereaved by Death of his Mother Last Week.

A despatch from Morewood, Ont., appearing in The Ottawa Journal on Monday, reads as follows:— "Impressive tribute was paid the memory of Mrs. Robert Stevens by friends and relatives, who filled the church, at the service Thursday afternoon from the family residence near Cannamore, to Morewood United Church. Mrs. Stevens died on Monday evening. "Mrs. Stevens was the former Mary Christina Summers, daughter of the late James Summers, and his wife, Eliza Hughes. She was born on November 6, 1863, in the Summer's Settlement, south of Winchester. "She first married Ezra Countryman, a former deputy reeve, of Winchester Township, who died in 1920. Later she married Robert Stevens, of Finch Township, who survives. Mrs. Stevens was a member of the United Church and of the Women's Association, and had been an active worker in her church and community. "The service at the church, which was conducted by the minister, Rev. G. H. Smith, was at 2 o'clock. Rev. Alex. Nimmo, of Morewood Presbyterian Church, assisted, and a short address was also given by Rev. R. W. Armstrong, of Merrickville, a former pastor. "The choir, with Mrs. G. H. Smith at the organ, sang two request hymns, "Lead Kindly Light" and "Sweet Hour of Prayer." "Chief mourners and survivors, in addition to her husband, were: two daughters, Mrs. DeWitt Forbes, of Massena, N.Y., Mrs. Stewart Stoving, Tamworth, Ont.; three sons, Dr. J. G. Countryman, Saskatoon, Sask., Gordon and Reginald of Dome Mines, South Porcupine; two half-brothers, Gordon Summers, Toronto, Ezra Summers, of Bracebridge, Ont. "Her only sister, Carrie, wife of the late Andrew Broder, member of the Legislative Assembly and of the Dominion Government from Dundas County, died in 1894. "Other relatives and friends attending were: Mr. and Mrs. William Broder, Ottawa; Mr. and Mrs. R. G. Stevens, Mr. and Mrs. James Colquhoun, Archie Colquhoun, all of Dundee, Que.; Edward V. Hon. W. A. Gordon as Ontario Leader?

Minister from the North at Ottawa Mentioned as Suitable Leader for Provincial Party.

Despatches from Toronto last week suggest that Hon. W. A. Gordon's name is freely and frequently mentioned as an ideal choice for leader of the Ontario Conservative party. Here is the way one despatch puts it:— "With the first session of the 19th Legislature out of the way, Ontario Conservatives are already preparing plans and discussing the convention which will choose a permanent leader. "When the din and turmoil of pro-rogation died down, the talk among the handful of opposition members turned to convention arrangements. In the past week, W. H. Ireland, president of the Ontario Conservative Association, has held several conferences with the Conservative members and details for the coming annual meeting are understood to have been completed. "While there was a disposition among members of the executive to hold the convention which will choose the new leader of the Conservative party at the same time as the annual meeting and banquet, this is now said to have been abandoned. "The convention will not be held until the fall, in time to select the new leader before Premier Hepburn calls the special autumn session of the legislature which he promises immediately after the Dominion general election. "A new and hitherto unmentioned candidate for the Ontario leadership loomed this week when a group of influential Conservatives from the North Country are said to have felt out the feeling of local members toward making Hon. Wesley A. Gordon, minister of labor in the Dominion Government, their choice. "They are said to have pressed Mr. Gordon's name upon the local powers in the party as the logical nominee to lead the Ontario Tories out of its present discouraged sphere. They claimed that Mr. Gordon, the fighting minister of labor at Ottawa, is the only man on the horizon who could battle Premier Hepburn out of the government fortress and drive the Liberals back into the opposition when they face the province within the next few years. "Among the rank and file of Conservatives there is said to be a strong feeling that the new leader should be chosen from outside those who led the party into the debacle of last June. "In this particular, Mr. Gordon would be an ideal choice, they contend. He is very popular among all classes of Conservatives, particularly those in Northern Ontario. He has kept clear of the cabinet differences at Ottawa, and the Bennett-Stevens incident. In this regard he is equally well regarded by both those who back Mr. Bennett and those who are sympathetic towards Mr. Stevens. "Well Known in Province "Of the possible recruits from the Dominion Conservative party, Mr. Gordon is by far the best known in all parts of the province, with the possible exception of Hon. Dr. R. J. Manly, minister of railways, but it is generally accepted that there is little chance of the latter deserting the federal arena for the smaller confines of provincial politics. "Other names mentioned as potential timber from Ottawa are Earl Rowe, M.P., Simcoe, and J. Earl Lawson, M.P., Conservative organizer in the coming general election. Mr. Rowe has been a prolific speaker in many parts of Ontario during the past six months, but it is generally believed that he would not stand much of a chance should Hon. Wesley Gordon allow his name to go before the convention. "Among the contenders at present in the provincial arena are the four ex-cabinet ministers in the last Conservative government, George S. Henry would still command a large following at a convention. In the session just closed, he is acknowledged to have been the outstanding debater among the Conservatives, and on the whole to have made a creditable showing. "It is expected, however, that before the convention to choose a leader is held, Mr. Henry will have been named a Senator in one of the several vacancies existing in the upper chamber at the present time. "Toronto Backs Price "W. H. Price, former attorney-general, has been generally credited with making several bids in the past for the leadership and will undoubtedly do so again. Mr. Price's principal following is in Toronto, but the possibility of Toronto dominating a general convention is most unlikely. "Another thing which it is believed would mitigate against Mr. Price's chances of success is the fact that his strong newspaper backing in the city may concentrate on a dark horse. It is pretty generally accepted that W. A. Stewart, former mayor of Toronto, is being groomed for the Conservative leadership by those who supported him in his civic campaigns. "Mr. Stewart is without legislative experience of any kind, and unless his supporters can find outside support for him it is doubtful if he would make any notable bid for the leadership at the convention. The fact that the Toronto vote might be split with Col. Price go-

110,000 Lives in 30 Years Toll of Japanese Quakes

Sunday's disastrous earthquake in Formosa brought to more than 111,000 the number of deaths officially listed as caused by earthquakes in Japan in the last 30 years. Unofficial estimates, which may be more accurate than the government figures, place the number at more than a quarter of a million. Tidal waves, accompanying many of the earthquakes, killed additional thousands. Official records show that earthquakes have devastated these islands for more than 1500 years. Principal quakes of the past 30 years, officially tabulated for name, place, and number of deaths, follow:— 1906—March 17, Kagi, Formosa, 1, 258. 1909—Aug. 14, Omi, 41. 1914—March 15, Akita, 90. 1925—Sept. 1, Sagami Bay (Epicentre), Tokio, Yokohama, and outlying districts, 99,331. 1924—Jan. 15, Sagami, 14. 1925—May 23, Northern part of Tajima, 470. 1927—March 7, northwest part of Tango, 3,020. 1930—Nov. 26, northern part of Izu, 260. 1931—Sept. 21, western part of Saitama, 16. 1933—March 3, Sanriku district with tidal wave, 3,010. 1935—April 21, Formosa, unofficial estimates, 2,711.

Jury Reports Death as Accidental One No Precautions Omitted in Work in which Frederico Marini Lost his Life. No Blame Attached.

The coroner's jury gathered at the town hall on Thursday afternoon last to inquire into the manner by which Frederico Marini met his death on Monday, April 15th, found that no blame could be attached to anyone. It had been an unavoidable accident, Coroner H. E. Montgomery was in charge of the inquest and W. Yates represented the Crown. Witnesses who had seen the whole affair were questioned and all the testimony pointed to the fact that all due precautions had been taken. The story as told to the jury was that a piece of frozen earth had fallen away from the edge of an excavation. Some of the men working below it had got out of the way when a warning was shouted. Marini started away but apparently stumbled. A piece of frozen earth weighing about 200 pounds struck him about the abdomen and as a result of the internal injuries inflicted, he died within a very short time. The reason for the sudden breaking away of the part of the sandy wall of the excavation could not be given. It had appeared to be of the same substance as the frozen material of which the surface already broken had consisted.
