Returned from Event at Dome Results in Sending Two Scouts, Two Cubs to See Chief Scout. Dome Mines, Ont., May 8th, 1936. Dome Mines Scouts and Wolf Cubs held a special display on Tuesday, May 7th, in the community hall. Programme consisted as follows:—First chapter of Kipling's Jungle Story, by Wolf Cubs. ### Miss Maimie Borland Again the President

Re-elected President Northern Ontario Women's Softball Association at North Bay on Saturday.

Miss Maimie Borland will again head the Northern Ontario Women's Softball Association, it was decided at the annual meeting in North Bay on Saturday. Miss Borland announced her intention of retiring from the game last year and on her appointment to the Ontario executive and as president of the Northern Association, she will still have lots to do with the game. Threats from Sudbury that a delegation would attend the annual and make some demands, did not materialize. The delegates who did attend expected a stormy session but the whole affair lasted only an hour. Two minor changes were made in the constitution:—membership fees were reduced from 35 cents to 20 cents per player; and applications for affiliation must be in by July 8th instead of July 15th. This latter change is a return to the rule of two years ago. The date was only changed to July 15th to allow high school students to organize into teams, but since examinations are now completed by the end of June, there is no necessity for the later date.

McCauley, Kirkland Lake, D. Cangiano, North Bay, H. Cohen, Cobalt, Gallagher, Sturgeon Falls, F. N. Allen is convener of the Southern group, which includes North Bay, Sudbury and Sault Ste. Marie; E. McCauley has the central group of Kirkland Lake and Noranda and A. Borland will look after the Porcupine group.

This year it looks as if North Bay will have quite a little group of its own, with a possibility of four teams entering, if the council will grant the use of the park at least one night a week. The Nickel Belt league in Sudbury will operate again, Kirkland Lake is indefinite. There are some financial matters there that need straightening out before the final decision is made. The suggestion that all-star teams be allowed to play off for Northern honours did not progress as far as being made into a motion. This year's teams in the playoffs will be those that play the season as a unit.

Sudbury representatives at the annual said they knew nothing of the "battle" that was supposed to come from the nickel belt. No nominations were received from that quarter at all, so whatever the trouble may have been, Sudbury is apparently content to let things remain as they are.

### To Open Summer Season At Pavilion on May 24th

The regular summer season at the Riverside pavilion will be opened with a special dance on May 24th. At this event one of the special features of the event will be another "battle of music" between local orchestras. Last year a similar musical battle attracted a great deal of interest.
