Avoid Monotony In Preparing Of Meals

Variety in Menus Is a Big Help in Keeping up Interest in Daily Meals

Combinations of foods are very much like apt phrases which are so good that they are overworked. When we find the same phrase cropping up again and again in talking or writing we should take warning and express ourselves with more variety or we shall be uninteresting and boring to our friends. This is true about menus as well. Meals become monotonous if some of our favorite foods are always teamed, such as lamb and peas, frankfurters and sauerkraut, pear and cream cheese salad, and so on.

Of course there are always exceptions to any rule. Certain things go together so well that we think of them almost as one and have no wish to do anything about separating them. For most of us, combinations like biscuits and honey, ham and eggs, liver and bacon, apple pie and cheese, are good even though served very often.

Sometimes a variety to keep meals interesting can be secured by changing the recipe for one of the foods in the combination. For instance, you may have a family which expects scalloped tomatoes whenever there is fish for dinner. We all find cooking more interesting if we can vary our recipes occasionally and the following one for scalloped tomatoes gives variety with time-saving. The family will like the subtle flavour which the toasted and seasoned corn flakes furnish.

Scalloped Tomatoes
 1 1/2 cups corn flakes
 2 tablespoons butter (melted)
 1 No. 2 can tomatoes
 1 small onion (sliced)
 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
 1/2 teaspoon pepper
 1 teaspoon sugar

Put a layer of corn flakes in the bottom of a baking pan. Add one-half of the butter. Add tomatoes seasoned with the other ingredients. Cover with corn flakes and add the rest of the butter. Bake in a moderate oven (400 deg. F.) for about 20 minutes. Yield: 6 servings.

Word from Toronto is to the effect that Hon. W. C. Nixon, Minister of Game and Fisheries, has refused to accede to the request from a number to have the bass season start on Jun 29th. The reason for the request is to allow fishing trips for the week-end, July 1st this year falling on a Monday. Hon. Mr. Nixon is quoted as saying that the proposal is not practical as permission would have to be secured from the Dominion Government for the change of date. So, the bass season will not open this year until July 1st.

Old Prospector Hit and Killed on Road

David St. Eloi, 70 Years Old, Found Dead on Road Near Kirkland Lake Last Week

Very careful search is being made in the Kirkland Lake and Swastika areas for traces or clues that will lead to the discovery of the identity of the auto driver who struck David St. Eloi on Tuesday last on the Kirkland Lake-Swastika section of the Ferguson highway. So far the police have secured a few leads that may result in an arrest, but the work of tracing the culprit has been a difficult one. However, it seems certain that sooner or later the guilty person will be discovered by a process of elimination, it being understood that every car on the road during certain hours of the days is being carefully investigated. St. Eloi, was one of the well-known prospectors of the Swastika section, was a man 70 years of age or more. Apparently he was walking along the road when the car struck him, fractured his skull and causing other injuries that resulted in his death.

An inquest was held on Wednesday evening of last week and the verdict of the jury was to the effect that death was due to a fractured skull probably caused by the impact of a motor car driven by a person at present unknown. One of the jurors seemed to be of opinion that the hit-and-run vehicle was probably a truck, basing his opinion on the injuries sustained by the victim of the accident.

An interesting point has developed from the investigation into the death. In checking up on the garages it was noted that garages do not usually keep records of damaged cars or cars with blood on them, often accepting the story by the motorist instead of simply noting the facts in an official record. The garages reply to this point by saying that as those involved in accidents have to report to the police, it would imply mean duplication for garages to report such accidents. The police answer to this to point out that one section of the highway traffic act makes it obligatory on garages to report cars coming in with damaged fenders, blood stains or other signs suggesting they have been involved in serious accidents. Failure to report to the police makes the garage people liable to fine or imprisonment or both.
