### Maimie Borland Retires from Office but will Help to Keep League Strong Again this Season. Entries Announced for 1935 Series in Porcupine.

The Porcupine Ladies' Softball Association got away to an enthusiastic beginning on Monday night when players, managers and coaches met at the town hall for the annual. A complete new set of officers was elected and most of the nominations were contested. It certainly was not any cut-and-dried affair, as most annuals are. Both the girls and men present showed they had the best interests of the game at heart when the discussion on some points was prolonged.

Mrs. B. M. Thompson is the new honorary president; Miss Olive Hawse, president; Miss Annie Lukor, vice-president; and Miss Irene Salley, secretary-treasurer. Miss Maimie Borland announced her intention of retiring from office as president before the meeting proper opened. She said that since she is president of the Northern Ontario Women's Softball Association and a vice-president of the Ontario body, she did not feel that she could carry on the work of the governing associations as efficiently if she were connected with the local league. She did offer her assistance to the league, however, and although she will not

play ball this year, she indicated that she would help as much as possible to see the old C.F. Hall team reorganized and supported properly.

**W.S.A. to Play Again**  
Johnny Denisavitch represented the W.S.A. at the meeting as manager of the girls' team. He said that they would be back in again strong as ever. Louis Roumaldi will be coach this year. The brothers Greer came for Excelsiors of Schumacher, Denham as manager and Harvey as coach. Their team is a sure entry too.

South Porcupine had no representative present but it was stated by some that the Workers' Sports Association there would have an entry this year. Teams must have their applications for affiliation in to North Bay by July 8th this year, instead of July 15th. Managers and coaches will be busy from now on signing up their quota of 15 players. The registration fee has been reduced from 35 cents a player to 20 cents per player.

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### Elect Schumacher Man Vice-President

#### Annual Meeting of Eastern Ontario Baseball Association at Ottawa on Saturday Last.

According to despatches from Ottawa this week, W. R. "Bill" Elliott, of Renfrew, was re-elected president of the Eastern Ontario Amateur Baseball Association at the annual meeting of that body held on Saturday at the Y.M.C.A.

With only the St. Lawrence League represented, officials were unable to transact business of any major importance and the meeting lasted little more than half an hour, during which time nine transfers for players were approved for this season, all officers from 1934 were returned for another year and W. A. R. McLean, of Ottawa, was appointed to handle the affairs of the Junior E.O.A.B.A. in the capacity of president.

After the minutes for the semi-annual meeting last fall had been read by the secretary, Ed. Anderson, of Renfrew, the transfers of nine players in the St. Lawrence circuit last season came up for discussion. All transfers were approved but a motion was passed that Elwood "Ace" Lee, now performing with the Colonials, would have to secure his release from Toronto, the city he was originally headed for before lining up with one of the Ottawa clubs.

**Must Secure Release**  
Lee played with Carleton Place last summer and asked for a transfer to Toronto to compete with one of the teams there in the Ontario Amateur Baseball Association. It was granted by the E.O.A.B.A. but officials at the meeting on Saturday, although they had no objections to Lee lining up with the Colonials here, thought it would be necessary to have him secure his release from the Queen City before he could take part in a scheduled game in the St. Lawrence loop.

Smith Falls Railroaders, champions of the St. Lawrence League and winners of the Journal Trophy, emblematic of the E.O.A.B.A. honours, competed against Fred Mines, northern winners, last year in the playoffs. It was decided at the meeting to have the E.O.A.B.A. and Ontario champions meet this year in the playoffs if geographically possible. In 1933 Carleton Place carried off the St. Lawrence title and went to Toronto to meet the Ontario group representatives, but last season it was done away with owing to heavy travelling expenses and Smith Falls went in against the Northern squad.

**To Head Junior E.O.A.B.A.**  
W. A. R. "Bill" McLean, an active worker in the interests of junior baseball in Ottawa for the past number of years, was appointed as president of the Junior E.O.A.B.A. for this season with Fred Ayoub, also of Ottawa, acting as secretary-treasurer. In order to help carry on junior baseball in the eastern section of the province, a motion was passed whereby all teams in the St. Lawrence Senior League will contribute 50 cents from each game towards helping to defray expenses in the Junior loop.

Howard Leigh, of Carleton Place, and Ed. Sutherland, of Smiths Falls, were the only two representatives for the St. Lawrence League. W. A. R. McLean, along with F. A. J. Davies, of

Carleton Place, represented the Junior E.O.A.B.A.

A motion to give Ed. Anderson, secretary-treasurer, an honorarium for this year was unanimously carried.

SIZE MATTERS LITTLE IN GOLF

I just had a round with Sidney Levinson of Great Neck, Long Island. I would say that he stands about five feet, possibly a shade less.

He has played less than five years. He can smack wood shots well enough to keep up with any of the pros. His drives were never less than 240 yards straight down the middle. It was a pleasure to see him perform, for I've always maintained that size means little if you have the right swing. Levinson stands quite erect and takes a full windup of body and arms. His wrists are free to bend with the action of club and arms, with the result that he is able to whip the club down with a speed of a pro.

His short game is excellent so that he always gets around in the middle seventies with a good chance of being down close to seventy. Good golf requires skill, not strength.

### Professional Hockey Player Awarded Claim

A despatch from Toronto during the week-end said that Mr. Justice A. C. Kingstone, in Ontario Supreme Court, awarded Albert Hughes, professional hockey player, \$4,550, full amount of his claim against Frank "Doc" Wainwright. Hughes claimed the money was due him for obtaining the St. Louis franchise in the American Hockey Association for Wainwright and forming a team.

The hockey player charged he was promised \$5,000 by Wainwright if successful in negotiations for the franchise and forming a team. He said he received only \$450 with \$50 weekly for play during the 1933-34 season. Wainwright said he had paid \$3,500

to date and had not gained ownership of the franchise but a permit to operate the team. He said he was vice-president of the association and received 60 per cent. of the proceeds.

In connection with St. Louis reports he had been ousted as head of the St. Louis flyers, Wainwright said he had not received any official notification. "As" Hughes learned his hockey at Cullingswood and played on more than one intermediate O.H.A. championship team. He turned professional many years ago and is one of the oldest players in the game. He was with St. Louis for years in the minor league and made it pay good money, better, in fact, than most of the big league stars were getting at the same time.
