**The Canadian Legion in the Porcupine**

**Room for a Debate**  
Since my appointment to the newly-formed committee of the Canadian Legion, on which I have the honour to serve, there has been much discussion among the local members. One said, "This policy is all wrong; the Legion should not but in against a political party; it should refrain altogether from anything of a political nature." Quite right in one sense, but it is perfectly in order when the political party policy is one to overthrow all law and order, and create chaos among all persons. The clear-thinking people of Canada, looked to the men and boys of the Dominion, during the years of 1914-1918 to protect them from a similar condition—this being the defence of the British Empire from the iron-handed rule and domination of Germany. They along with the rest of the Allied forces succeeded in their efforts. In the after years that have followed, we have seen vast changes but always have the people looked to the returned soldiers to show the way. They have had their own problems, but through the lesson learned in the days they were overseas they have had relief in peaceful way from most of the things of which they complained. To-day another problem is creeping into the Dominion. High officials of the government recognize the condition, and are seeking solutions to combat the menace. It is not so much for the sake of the elder people, but in an effort to save the young children that the present efforts to curb the communist doctrine is being put forth.

The Canadian Legion is one medium to which the people of Canada look for assistance in this measure. What a sorrowful country this would be if those who favour rule by the communist plan were to be able to have their way. Leading writers who have visited the Soviet country tell stories of hardship and suffering under the communist system. Do we want the same condition in this country? As an adopted Canadian, I do not think any person would care to think that their children should be the victims of this system. Of course there is much room for debate as to whether the Canadian Legion is the proper body to commence the education of the people to suppress all efforts of communist propaganda and activities. There is also room for debate on the question, if the Legion does not take some action upon whom can the people of Canada look to leadership in the matter. The newly-formed committee of the Canadian Legion in Ontario has pledged itself to help in curbing the activities of those who wish to run the country, under conditions which to say the least would take from all the British freedom they now enjoy. There is to be reviews from other centres sent to all branch members and these are far as possible will be given publicity. Efforts in centres where the "Friendship Council" among the foreign people is not at present under way will be advised as to the good which this can accomplish. As reviewed from all angles upon the question, there does not seem to be any other organization in the country which can show the way.

**Decoration Day, Sunday, June 2nd**  
Members of the Timmins branch of the Canadian Legion are reminded of the above date and event. There has been a plot of ground given over to the branch for burial purposes of returned soldiers. **Whereabouts Wanted**  
The following is published on behalf of the Canadian Legion in its efforts to assist some person or persons in securing some property. This may be read by someone who may know the party sought. It is as follows:—Mr. Kenneth Armstrong of P. O. Box 3526, Cleveland, Ohio, is seeking the whereabouts of a woman who has fallen heir to some property. He is unable to give the family name or any other definite particulars. The only information which he is able to supply is that this woman was married to a disabled Canadian War Veteran and they are believed to have a couple of children, and lived on a farm near some lake in Ontario. He also indicated that they lived for some time in a small town a short way out of Hamilton. This woman was visited by her brother named James or Victor, in 1928 or the early part of 1929, and he paid a \$2,000 mortgage on her property. The family at one time lived in Bellingham, Washington, and later were believed to have lived on the Idaho-Canadian border. This woman would be about 44 years of age.

**More Vimy News**  
In a special communication from the president of the Ont. Prov. Command, Jules Ferry, the following is given herewith for special action. It reads:—"I have just received from Ben Allen, Dominion Organizer of the Vimy Pilgrimage, comparative figures, showing the registrations by Provinces of ex-service men who at present intend taking part in the Pilgrimage, and regret to say that comparatively speaking, Ontario is at the bottom of the list. I am well aware of the fact that it is not possible for the majority of us to say definitely at this stage whether we can take part in the Pilgrimage, but there are many who definitely do not intend to take part, there are others who have a great desire to go across, but it will take some months yet before they can be sure of being in the position of knowing what they can do. Then there are many more who have made up their minds to go, and these

men should register, either under the savings plan or by letter. This lack of information tends to cause a state of confusion at headquarters and if this is allowed to continue, it may mean a great disappointment to hundreds of intending pilgrims when they make application at the last moment, only to find that there is no accommodation because boats have to be provided for months in advance."  
Capt. Jules Ferry suggests that a member of each branch be appointed and called the "Vimy Ridge Pilgrimage Man." The idea being that all intending taking in the trip should register with him. Periodic check ups could then be made locally and all information detailed through this party.
