The visitor's part of the vehicle is commodious, without being overly comfortable. A dozen or so patrons could be accommodated in a pinch. A single large door at the rear gives ample room to get wayward citizens into the body in almost any position or condition. Curved metal bars on either side and a wide step at the rear make it possible to guard the exit while

The new patrol wagon was ordered by the council about two months ago, after tenders had been received.

His morning sermon was addressed to them In the evening he spoke on repentance and remission of sins, a subject appropriate to the Ascensiontide season. He used as his text Christ's last words on earth and in dealing with their significance, pointed out that true repentance did not involve only a fear of consequence but should come as a realization that sin was evil and as such could not be permitted to exist. Bishop Anderson will remain in Timmins until after the synod on Wednesday and Thursday.


