Highway Traffic Officers Check Glaring Headlights

The North Bay Nugget this week says:—Following a check-up on headlights of automobiles traveling the Ferguson highway Saturday night, conducted by Provincial Traffic Officer Wesley McCord and Provincial Constables N. C. Small and William Noyes, headlight beams were declared too high and in many cases too glaring. The three provincial officers were stationed almost a mile south of the gates. Motorists were waved into a side road where the beams of their headlights were inspected. Licenses were also checked. Constable McCord stated these headlight inspections will be continued, with the object of eliminating danger and accidents caused by blinding lights. Automobile owners whose headlight beams are declared too high or glaring are requested to have them adjusted.

Contract for Diversion Awarded by the T. & N. O.

A contract has been awarded by the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway to R. Walsh, Temagami, for clearing and grading on the south side of Gull Lake, in Lebel Township, district of Temiskaming, in preparation for a track diversion scheme on the Nipissing Central Railway. It was announced at North Bay some days ago by General Manager A. H. Cavanagh.

A part of the road's summer programme, the track diversion plan is not a long one, but is designed to eliminate a wooden trestle which in the past has caused officials some concern, as it has been burned out several times by bush fires.

The work of clearing and grading will be gotten under way at once, the contract to be completed late in the summer, and the diversion ready for traffic in the early fall months.

Unique Occasion at Ottawa This Week

Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Shragge and Miss Monica Present at Remarkable Canada-wide Tribute to Mrs. A. J. Freiman, O.B.E.

Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Shragge and their daughter Monica, have just returned from Ottawa where they were the guests of Mrs. Shragge's sister, Mrs. A. J. Freiman, O.B.E.

While in Ottawa Mr. and Mrs. Shragge attended the garden party given by their Excellencies the Governor-General and the Countess of Bessborough in celebration of the King's birthday, June 3rd.

They were also present at the Lillian Freiman Birthday Party, Canadian Hadassah's tribute to its president, on the occasion of her fiftieth birthday, on June 2nd, at the Chateau Laurier. In addition to being an eloquent show of the organization's feeling for Mrs. Freiman, the banquet also marked the fulfilment of a pledge by which Hadassah members said they would raise \$50,000 by that date to be presented to Mrs. Freiman for application to the building fund of the Jewish National Homeland in Palestine.

Fund Oversubscribed—The fund was actually oversubscribed and the cheque presented to Mrs. Freiman was made out for \$53,540.25. Guests at the banquet, to the number of more than 1,000 came from Hadassah groups from Halifax to Vancouver.

Miss Monica Shragge was one of the 16 little girls who drew a brilliantly decorated float bearing a huge birthday cake into the banquet hall. The cake itself weighed 650 pounds and was emblazoned with Mrs. Freiman's initials in Hebrew characters of blue and white. It was four feet in diameter and around the edge were fifty golden candlesticks, each representing a \$1,000 donation by an Hadassah chapter.

As the great cake was brought forward, the Adath Jeshurun Synagogue choir sang a famous Jewish anthem that may become the national song of the new Palestine.

Unique Occasion

The chairman for the evening, Rev. Dr. Herman Abramowitz, extended to both Mr. and Mrs. Freiman, greetings on their birthdays, since they both fall on the same day. The evening's function, said the chairman, was marked by unique features in that it was not only to celebrate the birthday of the beloved leaders of Hadassah, but to witness an event unprecedented in Canadian Jewish history. Other leaders had been honoured, he said, but they had been honoured by single communities or single groups whereas on this occasion Mrs. Freiman was the centre of a spontaneous outburst of love and affection on the part of Jewish communities from Halifax to Vancouver. Mrs. Freiman, he said, had achievements to her credit and a record of service to Jewish and non-Jewish peoples which made her one of the best known figures in Canada and led to her being honoured by His Majesty the King. She brought back scores of war orphans and gave them a fair start in Canada. Her goodness to war veterans has become a byword amongst them and she has put many young people on the road to good living.

Following Dr. Abramowitz's address, the ceremony of lighting the candles on the cake by officers of the chapters who had contributed was held. Mrs. H. Freiman, Mrs. J. Freiman's mother, lighted that for the Hamilton chapter. Mrs. Louis Miller, of Montreal, did the actual presentation of the cheque, as national treasurer of Hadassah. She spoke of the work of the 4,000 members of chapters in Canada throughout the past year.

Second Presentation Made

Mrs. Abraham Raginsky made a second presentation to Mrs. Freiman in the form of an illuminated volume with covers of carved Palestine wood, bearing the signatures of all the members of Hadassah in Canada.

Mrs. Freiman in reply said in part: "I shall never forget your expressions of kindness. You say I have built this organization. Oh, no! It is you in this room and not me alone. I have only tried to help you and you have worked faithfully. I wish to tell you also that my husband has guided me in every move I have made. I was the working man and he was my guiding star."

A. J. Freiman, as head of the Zionist organization in Canada, remarked that Zionism and Hadassah are intimately interwoven in Canada and that both are movements of the spirit.

"It is our privilege to know about the work in Palestine," he said, "and to do our share in building it up. I am proud and happy over your kindness and your attitude to Mrs. Freiman and myself, and I take it as a tribute to the cause which we have the honour to represent."

Many Speakers Heard

The toast to Mrs. Freiman was proposed by Louis Fitch, K.C., and other speakers were Mrs. D. P. Gootlieb, Western Division of Hadassah; Abraham Klein from Canadian Young Judea; Samuel Schwisberg from the Zionist order Habonim; Borouch Zuckerman from the Histadruth; Abraham Levin; Mrs. David Dunkleman, Harry Rosenberg and Mrs. H. Singer.

A garden party had been held the same afternoon at "Mizpah," Mr. and Mrs. Freiman's home on the Gatineau, which was attended by 1,200 guests.

John Birch, Nipissing Jct. Celebrates 112th Birthday

John Birch, Nipissing Junction, near North Bay, celebrated his 112th birthday on Tuesday of this week. He is said to be the oldest white man in Canada. He was born in Sebastopol, Russia, in 1823, and is a veteran of the Crimean and Franco-Prussian wars. He came to Canada at the age of 43, settling first at Pembroke, where he became a British subject by naturalization. About 1890 he moved to Nipissing Junction and took up farming there, living in the district ever since. He is in good health, " hale and hearty," he says. Only once has he had any serious illness, an attack of influenza keeping him in bed for some months in 1922.

One of the outstanding qualities of the old gentleman is his keen humour and he has had a lot more fun with the newspapers than the quintuplets are likely to have.

The only explanation he offers for his longevity is "I guess they have no room for me in heaven. God will send for me when there is room and I'll be glad to go. I've been long enough in this world," he added.

To illustrate the accuracy of his eyesight, the grand old man threaded a needle promptly. He has never worn glasses. Although he does not remember much of the Russian language he still recites his prayers in the mother tongue.

Mr. Birch admits that he has smoked a pipe since he was nine years' old, with no apparent ill effects. He has never tried cigarettes or other forms of tobacco.

Mr. Birch has five daughters, Mrs. Balcolm, Mrs. J. Morissey, Nipissing Junction; Mrs. S. Clayton, Sudbury; Mrs. J. Giroux, North Bay; and Mrs. J. Smith, deceased; and three sons, Adam and Joseph, Nipissing Junction; and Anthony, whose address is unknown to the family. He has 28 grandchildren and one great grandchild.
