Woolworth's New Store of Handsome Appearance, Much Enlarged and Modernly Equipped.

When Woolworth's enlarged store is opened for business to-morrow morning, Timmins shoppers will have a much more convenient place in which to do their buying.

Widened aisles make it much easier to accommodate the large crowds that are usually to be found in the store and additional counters make merchandise more easily displayed and allow a greater variety of goods to be shown.

The marble lunch counter has been lengthened by 11 feet and a complete set of 18 padded back stools is on order to increase patrons' comfort.

Something the kiddies as well as the grown-ups will appreciate is the new candy counter, where dozens of different kinds of confections are attractively shown. Bronze display lights on the counter show off specials. At the jewelry counter new lighting fixtures make the larger stock more easily inspected. Ventilating fans change the air in the new store once every 14 minutes and a new ventilating system in the basement makes the staff rest rooms comfortable.

The building was formerly 108 feet long and 27 feet wide but is now 15 feet wider. The change was accomplished through joining two buildings and tearing out the connecting wall. Steel beams support the altered structure. The fronts of both buildings have been remodelled in a buff plaster that makes a pleasing exterior.
