## Seven Home Runs Hit Week-end Doubleheader

In the second game, a smooth working Moneta outfit took Hollinger's entry 12-7, and though the southenders held the lead all the way through, they were beginning to weaken badly toward the end and in the last inning Hollinger had three men across the plate.

Kirkpatrick was the heavy scorer for the winners in the first game, and his hitting was over par too. Thompson and Davis got three each and Neddow and Sparks trailed along with two each.

McIntyre's big inning was the first, when 11 men stood up to the plate and seven of them scored, though there was only one hit.

Schumacher played a steady game all the way, taking their runs one or two at a time. Their big time came in the fourth when five runs came in. Davis and Caverley both knocked out homers.
