

McIntyre Meets Noranda Again in Week-End Series

McIntyre Takes Three Goal Lead to Noranda

Win 5-2 in Dominion Cup Game With Copper Miners. Tommy Searle Gets Three of Local Team's Counters and Nagi, Noranda, Scores Twice. Wet Field No Help.

The victorious McIntyre will need the three-goal lead they took from Noranda on Saturday night when they visit the copper town this week-end for the second of the home and home series in Dominion Cup playdowns. Final score was 5-2.

A greasy field that got more and more slippery as the rain pelted down didn't make the Noranda team's big job any easier. It was a tough assignment for the copper miners because it was their first game as a team, and the town's second year in N.O.F.A. competition.

Searle Gets Three

Tommy Searle, speedy Mac centre, was the big scorer of the day since he got three of the victors' goals. Mair and Reg, Dunstan getting the other two of the Macs' five total. Nagi, centre for Noranda, got both his team's counters.

The game was fast right from the first whistle, and even though the lads did a lot of slipping and sliding about on the turf, it was soccer that was well worth watching. About two hundred fans stayed on the stands all through the pelting rain, and about three hundred more took refuge in the baseball stand when Jupiter Pluvius got too wrathful. The sun came out early in the second half, but even then it didn't stop raining for another five or ten minutes and the fans were treated to the sight of a beautiful double rainbow, and the pot of gold was really at its foot—the McIntyre refinery.

Mair Scores First

Mair scored the Macs' first goal early in the first period when he crashed through from centre field. He was followed a few minutes later by Searle, who made a long pass of Rodgers' goal. Nagi gave the red-shirted copper miners some hope when he made the score 2-1, and the team picked up noticeably. Dunc MacDonald, at right back for Noranda, did some splendid defensive work and seemed to be able to outrun the best of the McIntyre forwards, given a fair chance.

McAdam Right On

McAdam played a good game at McIntyre's full back line and messed up some of Nagi's best attempts. The Dunstan brothers made a number of their famous short passing plays but couldn't make one stick until the last half.

Caisley, at outside right, very nearly put Noranda even with the Macs when McHenry passed one out to him. Brockbank made a real save. After that the Macs put on the pressure a bit and Rodgers got in close. His shot went to the side of the net and was so hard that it broke some of the cord. Searle gave his team a 3-1 lead when he went in alone and drove hard past Subden. McIntyre were intent on increasing their lead but Binnie cleared nicely several times.

Noranda Within One Again
Nagi scored the first goal of the second half after about fifteen minutes of play, but Noranda couldn't keep up the pace the Macs set after that, and the goal by Searle on Ed Dunstan's centre was followed closely by Reg, Dunstan from Brother Ed. In the latter goal, Reg, was on the ground when Ed, centred, but he shoved his foot forward for a tricky play that caught Subden off guard.

Caisley had one of the few Noranda scoring opportunities in the last part of the game when he took a neat pass from McHenry. He was travelling too fast and his low shot went, sizzling across the mouth of the net.

Several Macs Missing
Rodgers had several chances in the second half, but his shots were usually high. The Dunstan brothers combination was broken up for the first time, only Ed appearing on the line-up. Others of the team that hopes to make Dominion Cup honours are being held in reserve or are recovering from slight injuries received in the Noranda game.

Gaw made one save in the second that won the approval of the fans when Searle kicked a low one after taking a pass from Ed, Dunstan. Neither team found it at all easy to control the ball throughout the game due to the uneven ground and the greater tendency the ball had to bound on the hard surface. McIntyre's field is a particularly dead one and since most of the recent games have been played there, the players were at sea in some ways.
