Pays Tribute to the Hospital and Nurses

Infinite Care and Patience Shown by Sisters and Nurses to all in Their Care

Timmins, Ont., June 30th, 1935.
To the Editor of The Advance, Timmins
Dear Sir:—I was reading your article of a week ago on the man who admired the garden of St. Mary's hospital and of the man who wondered how much

the water cost.

That made me think that doctors, sisters and nurses are born and not made; at least, that seems to be the case from my several experiences.

During the war I found myself inside of several hospitals at one time and another. First, it was wounds; then sickness through the wounds; then it was more wounds. In three years of soldiering I believe I spent six months in different hospitals and during that time I saw a few doctors, sisters, orderlies, who were far from perfect in their work. The remainder of the doctors, sisters, nurses, orderlies, and even the ward maids, should have had ser-

vants to wait on them, their patience and their energy seemed to be unending. Maybe, it is because I always have a desire to be somewhere else, other than the place where I happen to be at the time, but whatever the cause, I never see anyone connected with hospital work without wondering at their wonderful patience.

A few weeks ago I had a sick spell of some kind. Whatever it was, I have never had it before and I hope I shall never have it again. However, after trying to fight it off for two weeks, it got the best of me, and the doctor ordered me to bed. Once I was in bed I found myself too weak to get out again and the doctor ordered me to the hospital. There I remember being bathed by the orderly. Nurses took my temperature and counted the beat of my pulse. They plastered my back and chest and brought me medicine at all hours of the day and night. The Sisters and nurses made my bed, while I was lying in it, without putting me to the least inconvenience and without the slightest discomfort on my part.

Night and morning a Sister came and knelt down in the corridor and prayed for everyone. If I had been the Lord Mayor of London I could not have been treated with more respect and kindness.

I would like it possible to show the town and everyone else who cares to read, with what respect I hold the doctors, Sisters and nurses of St. Mary's hospital, and also the visitors who helped us pass a pleasant hour. I remain,
