Re-organized Porkies Win from Holly 6 to 2

Errors Costly to Locals on First Trip to New South Porcupine Diamond. Both Teams Hit Well, but Spratt Not Well Backed Up.

Errors lost Hollinger the Friday game at Dome when the Porkies had a 6-2 victory. Both teams were batting just about the same and both pitchers were playing nice ball, but Spratt in the Hollinger box didn't get the support he should have. The Porkies, somewhat reorganized from their last appearance, put on a good show and will undoubtedly give the Macs a better game next time they meet.

Senese hurled for the Porkies and although he allowed eight hits, he walked only one and didn't lose his nerve when Holly had men on bases. In the third inning, he got into a bad hole when Dorey, Monaghan and Chambers hit one after the other, loading the bags. Dominico was the only out previous to that. Senese struck out Coleman and forced a short tap from Wagar to Wagner on short for the third put-out.

Just One "Discussion"

Some discussion arose in the eighth inning, Hollinger at bat, when Wagar socked out a double but was touched out at third. Hollinger claimed that the ball was picked up by a boy spectator and tossed into the field, to make it possible for Shultz to throw to Bradley for the out. The umpires refused to allow the protest, claiming the ball was properly fielded.

Jemmett at first was the only new player on either team, and he played a nice game, handling twelve put-outs at first and registering one hit. Spratt, Hollinger pitcher, is showing definite improvement.

Hollinger's two tallies came in the eighth. Monaghan singled and Chambers showed that he's a batter as well as a pitcher when he drove out a triple. Chambers scored on Wagar's disputed double.

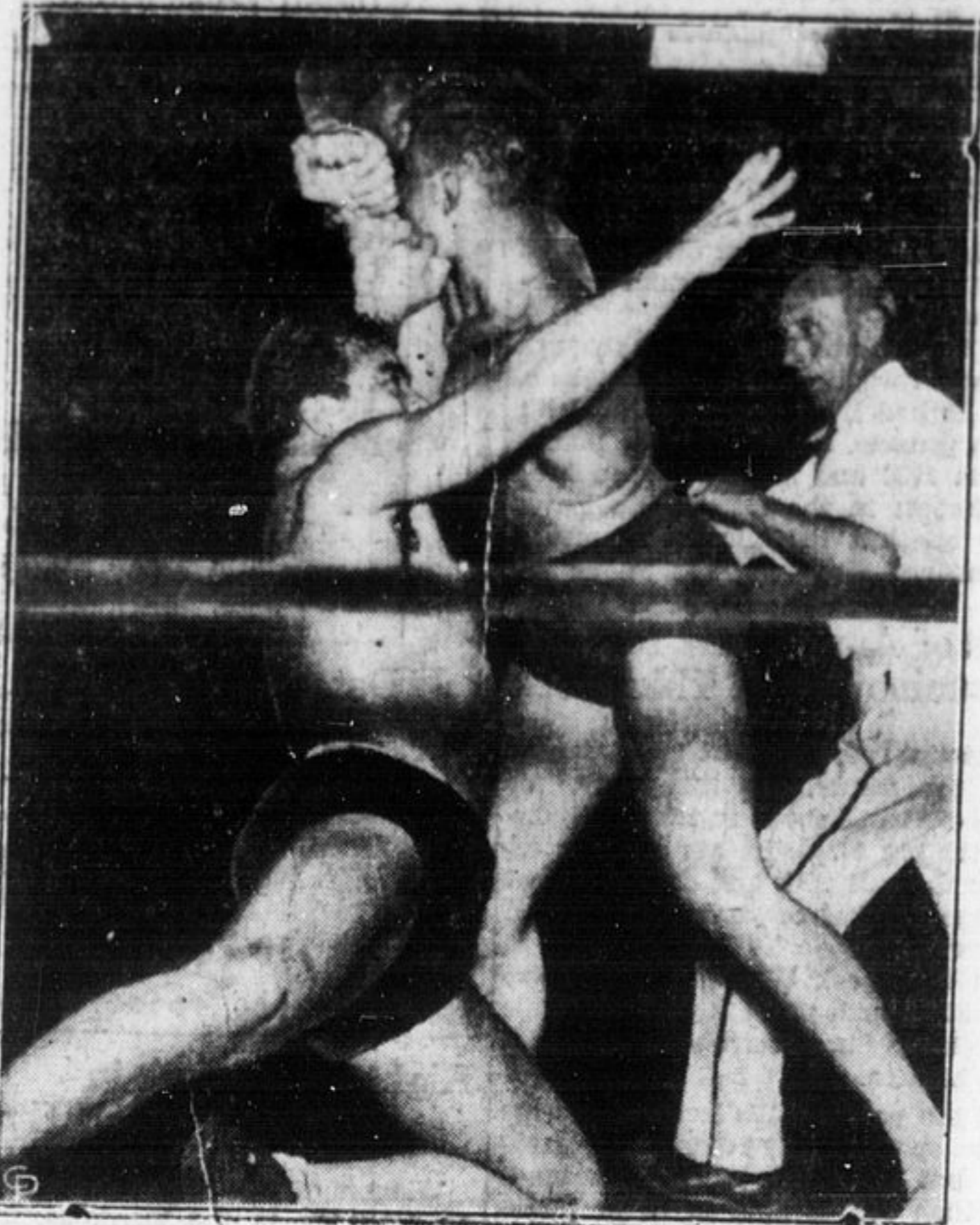
