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Radio Starts Debate at North Bay Council Meeting

The North Bay Nugget last week says: "Alderman J. B. Croghan and R. H. Thomson flared anew at city council's Tuesday night session, as Alderman Croghan unmercifully flayed the actions of the chairman of the finance committee on at least two things. "Some time ago the Cochrane Board of Trade forwarded a resolution to council for concurrence, asking that the Canadian Radio Commission establish a high-powered Northern outlet, to serve adequately the radio needs of Northern Ontario. "At the meeting in which it was read, the letter was referred to the Contingent Committee of city council, for 'consideration and report.' At Tuesday night's session, one clause of the contingent committee's report stated: 'We are quite satisfied with service by the North Bay station,' and recommended the letter be filed. "Alderman Croghan took exception to this statement, asking by what authority the North Bay radio situation had been injected into a matter which concerned the entire Northern part of the province and Northwestern Quebec.

Alderman Croghan emphasized the fact that citizens of Kirkland Lake and Cochrane were behind the request for a Northern Ontario commission station, and that North Bay's station did not serve those points. He asked Alderman Palmer, chairman of the committee making the report, for the reason behind such a statement. "Alderman Palmer stated that the committee had gone over all angles of the situation and that he regretted that Alderman Croghan had not attended the meeting. It was the opinion of the committee, Alderman Palmer stated, that anything from North Bay with regard to a situation existing in Cochrane was futile, having regard to existing radio broadcasting facilities in the North. "There is no use knocking what we already have and taking a chance on losing it. Our local station gives fair service—look at the 42 exchange programmes now being put on—advertising this city all over the United States. The committee felt that definite action on the resolution was inadvisable," Alderman Palmer stated. "Giving as his reason for re-opening an old subject, Alderman Croghan said he had dropped in at the Contingent Committee meeting and had signed the

report, but had taken exception to the clause dealing with the Cochrane resolution. "The owner of CPCH has put the alderman on the spot, talking about losing what we already have," Alderman Croghan charged. "It has been said of this radio station that it dispenses more interference than good entertainment and when a petition to have the wave length altered was being circulated, the man who sponsored the petition was threatened with loss of his job. "In 1930 when the move to build the local station was on foot, council were asked to support the station's request for a license, and did so. Now one of the interested parties sits on this council and refuses to support a move for a high-powered station," Alderman Croghan charged. "The alderman in question has made no statements on the matter," Acting Mayor Seth Bush interrupted. "Yes, he has made such statements," Alderman Croghan replied warmly, "and I base my argument on the fact that in 1930 he asked this council to support a move to build a radio station in North Bay, and now refuses to support a movement to have a high-powered station erected for the North. The people of the North are certainly not getting the radio service that they are entitled to." Alderman Croghan submitted a resolution supporting the Cochrane request, and before the vote was taken, Alderman Seth Bush, acting mayor, stated that the resolution had been submitted to several Northern Ontario centres and had been turned down. When the vote was taken, Alderman Croghan was the only supporter of his amendment.

Arfida Lauzon Dies at Hospital Friday

Had Been Ill for More than a Year. Came to the Porcupine Camp in 1922. Well Known Here.

Arfida Lauzon, formerly a diamond driller, died at St. Mary's hospital on Friday after a long illness which made it impossible for him to work since more than a year ago. Funeral services were held yesterday from St. Anthony's Church to the Timmins Roman Catholic cemetery. Mr. Lauzon was just over 40 years of age, and though born in Buckingham, Que., he had lived more than half his life in Ontario. He came to the Porcupine in 1922 and has since then been well known in the district. He leaves many relatives in Timmins to mourn his passing.

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Great Britain Blocked in Work of Conciliation

Cables from London, England, this morning, relayed from Toronto, say that Great Britain has been brought to at least a temporary halt in its efforts to prevent Italy from waging war on Abyssinia. Both Italy and France are said to have rebuffed the British suggestions and efforts at compromise. Italy and Abyssinia appear to be determined to go on with the war and France and the United States are not apparently very determined to stop the war. The United States has not heeded the appeal from Abyssinia to give aid to that country and the U.S.A. has also refused to invoke the Briand-Kellogg anti-war treaty. Accordingly Great Britain is left without further ideas for the moment as a peace-maker and conciliator. However, Britain may be depended upon to keep on trying to keep the nations at peace. It is to be hoped that Britain is not itself entangled into war trying to preserve the peace of the world.

Sudbury had No Marriage Licenses for Several Days

There was a peculiar situation in Sudbury last week when for several days it was not possible to secure a marriage license in that city. The town clerk, H. P. McKeown, who is the official issuer of marriage licenses, was taken ill suddenly and there was no one with authority to dish out the permits to wed. Under such circumstances it is surprising how many people want to get married who were never married before. Few of them take kindly to the thought of waiting until a sick man recovers. It is interesting to conjecture whether or not a girl or a man will have a case against the city of Sudbury for damages or otherwise in case the party of the other part changes his or her mind about getting a license when licenses are available. In any event Sudbury was all excited about the idea that people were clamoring for marriage licenses and there were none such to be obtained. Eventually a meeting of the council was called and a motion passed authorizing Mrs. Morden Birbeck, for several years assistant to Mr. McKeown to issue the licenses.
