Plague of Shad Flies at the River Landing

Pests Seem to be Abating Now. Do not Bite or Sting, but are They a Nuisance?

Shad flies, fish flies, Lake Erie flies, or whatever you want to call them, have paid a real visit to Timmin. Down at the river the other night, they weren't quite so bad as they have been in North Bay, but the fluttering mass of large insects made it unpleasant being about where bright lights attracted them.

They fell by the thousands on the platforms at the carnival and they clustered by the hundred on lighted windows on Wilson Avenue.

Timmins has seldom, if ever before, seen such a mass of these prolific insects. They have no sting and apparently do no other harm than to cause inconvenience. They are very short-lived.

In Southern centres they have been known to plug the radiators of cars to such an extent that it was next to impossible to drive. Occasionally windshield of cars travelling near the water's edge become so plastered with them that vision is greatly hampered.

Each summer, they seem to find their way a little farther North in increasingly great numbers.

Western Relief Workers Decide to Return to Camps

Relief camp workers in Vancouver at a meeting Tuesday afternoon decided definitely to go back to the camps.

This supplemented a decision made Monday along similar lines but which provided that certain concessions should first be made concerning discrimination and blacklisting.

Advised by the British Columbia government there would be no further relief for those who did not go back and that discussion of administration of Dominion camps was outside its jurisdiction, the men made their confirming decision Tuesday to go back.

After the meeting they proceeded to Hamilton Hall to receive further relief. About 800 men arrived in Vancouver Sunday morning ending what was to have been a trek to Ottawa but which ended in a riot in Regina.

Hon. R. J. Manion Calls on All to Support the Law

Business men of Canada were called upon to co-operate with constituted authority to clear up "the errors of capitalism and democracy" and to prevent the country being overrun by demagogues and extremists, by Hon. R. J. Manion, minister of railways and canals, at Ottawa on Tuesday.

In an address to sections of the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association in session at Ottawa, the minister said all citizens who stand for British institutions and democratic liberties should do their part to nullify incipient Communism in Canada.

Amalgamation or unification of management of Canada's railways was not the solution of the railway problem, Dr. Manion said.

"So long as the traffic remains at half it was in the peak years, there is no possibility of the railways paying their way. The solution is in the increase of world trade and with that the increase in Canadian trade. No
