Mining is Outstanding Factor in Canada's Life

In the industrial world of Canada, mining continues to be the most acive factor.

The figures supplied by the Department of Labour, of which Hon. W. A. Gordon is minister, show, for April, mineral production stood at 156.4 in the index of physical volume of business, while manufacturing stood at 94.0 and construction at 37.9. The index is based on 100 in 1926.

Mining is the one major occupation in Canada which has improved its status from pre-depression days, if is excepted the manufacture of electric power. Index for manufacture of electric power in April was 195.9, and it is not a primary btu a complementary occupation.
