

League Leaders Add Win-Falls Team Drops Another

Weird Ball Game Sees Holly Lose to Macs 9-6

Macs Get Four-Run Lead by Bunting Hollinger Team Off Their Feet, but Callery Blows in Eighth and Holly Gets Lead as Three Runs Forced.

The weirdest baseball game of the season was played at McIntyre park on Tuesday evening when the Macs won 9-6. The game had everything except a home run. A man was thrown out of the game for arguing with the umpire; Hollinger made six runs with only five hits, and in one inning made five runs with only one hit; once during the game Hollinger went completely through the batting order in an inning; McIntyre did the same thing in another; yet altogether both teams showed that they were capable of playing good baseball at times. There were seven innings in which Holly didn't score a run and there were five in which the Macs couldn't tally.

Bunts Worry Hollinger
The Macs started out bunting Hollinger off their feet. Before the so-called game settled down to playing ball, four runs had crossed the plate and it began to look like an easy McIntyre victory. But in the eighth, Callery went bad, walked four and hit two batters, allowing Hollinger to get a one-run lead. In the half of the eighth, the Macs began to hit properly, made four runs and held the Hollinger scoreless in the ninth.

In the first, Malloy got on base when Lyles fumbled his bunt. Hahn was safe on another. Cybulski struck out, but Angrignon bunted to fill the bags. Malloy came in on a wild pitch while Osborne was striking out. Quinn walked, loading the bases again. Gilbert walked and Hahn was forced in. MacDonald singled and Angrignon and Quinn scored. Callery was hit by a pitched ball but was left on base as Malloy went out, Rouldaldi to Dorey.

Dorey Triples in Sixth
The score stayed at 4-0 for the next four minutes, with only two Hollinger men getting on base. Dorey led off in the sixth with a triple to centre field bleachers. Monaghan drove one out to centre field that scored Dorey. Smith walked, made second on Coleman's single, and a double steal put the runners on second and third. Wagor put one out to Malloy at left field but the ball was fielded too quickly for either base runner to score. Callery fanned Rouldaldi.

The Macs added one in the sixth when Cybulski made the circuit after Malloy and Hahn had gone out at first. Angrignon's drive was fumbled at second, Osborne's single loaded the bases, and Quinn's safety scored Cybulski. O'Donnell fanned Gilbert.

The Awful Eighth
The awful eighth saw Callery go bad. He had been pitching nice ball for seven innings but got wilder and wilder from the beginning of the seventh. Smith was the first to walk. Coleman's grounder was picked up by Quinn who threw to Cybulski for the first out. Wagor walked, and the bases were loaded as Rouldaldi was hit by a pitched ball. Chambers stroled, forcing in Smith. Lortie hit a grounder to Quinn, who saw Wagor attempting to come in. He threw to MacDonald and Wagor was called out. O'Donnell had two strikes and three balls on him when a finger was hit by a pitched ball. He had tried to step away from the pitch, and his bat came forward as he stepped away. Umpire Sculley allowed him first base. Rouldaldi was forced in on the play. Dorey walked, forcing in Chambers.

Wood Put In
It was then that Callery was pulled and Inky Woods put in. Monaghan stepped up and cracked the first pitched ball to score Lyles. While Smith was at bat, Wood threw a wild one and O'Donnell started home. The ball went to the backstop and Adamson went after it. Wood came in to the plate to take Adamson's throw-in but Umpire Sculley called O'Donnell safe on a slide. The McIntyre men appeared to think that O'Donnell was out and Wood questioned the decision. Quinn came in from second base to join the squabble and the umpire ruled him off the diamond. When things were all straightened away again, Knechtel went in at second for Quinn. Though Smith walked to fill the bases again, Coleman struck out, and Hollinger was left at the heavy end of a 6-5 score.

Macs Get Five Hits in Eighth
In the eighth, the Macs gave up their bunting tactics and really began to find Lefty O'Donnell. Cybulski was out at first, but Angrignon singled, stole second and brought in the tieing run as Osborn drove out one of his also available on Wednesday and Saturdays to left field. Osborn beat Thursday afternoons.

throw-in on Knechtel's grounder. Gilbert had a nice single that put Knechtel on third. Adamson knocked one down to Monaghan at second to force out Gilbert but Knechtel was held at third. Wood's single scored Knechtel and Malloy drove in Adamson for the final run. Hahn was out at first on a pick-up by Monaghan.

Although Chambers hit in the ninth, he was left on base as three team mates were out on flies.

Fielding Good in Spots
Cybulski made the prize catch of the game. It was on a foul fly from Chambers in the seventh that went far back of first base. Cybulski got back quickly and reached over his shoulder to take it. Malloy, in the third, came in from deep centre field to take a fly from Dorey that looked like a sure Texas leaguer.

Hollinger's double play in the second inning saved a run. Hahn had bunted, made second on a passed ball and stole third. Cybulski had been out when Dorey picked up a foul fly. Angrignon hit one out to Monaghan at second, who threw to Dorey for the out. Hahn was caught at the plate as Dorey pegged in to Wagor.

Monaghan made another nice play in the fourth when he had to go far back of second to catch Angrignon's fly. O'Donnell and Dorey made somersault pick-ups.

Attempted Steals Costly to Papermakers Yesterday at South End. Porkies Score Seven Runs in Second Innings in Easy Victory.

After winning a game against Hollinger last week, Abitibi went into the loss column again yesterday evening when Porcupine took them at South End, 11-3, in a wild and woolly game. Second innings were best for both teams. Though the Porkies got one in the first, the papermakers made three in the second and began to look like just as good a team as the newcomers to the T.B.L. But in the second the balloon went up. Altogether, seven Porcupine runs crossed the plate as eleven men faced Laroque. Most of the runs were made on short, deadly hits, but the two errors that were made in the one inning didn't help things along at all.

Porkies Use Two Pitchers
Abitibi couldn't score again, but the Porkies added one in each of the fourth, sixth and eighth. After that bad second, Laroque, who pitched the whole game for Abitibi, settled down to fair hurling. The Porkies put in Cox to relieve Senese in the fifth and Cox allowed only three hits for the rest of the game. Laroque failed to register a strike-out during the evening, while between Cox and Senese eight men were fanned, five of them by Senese.

Abitibi lost most of their scoring chances after the second by attempting to steal bases. It's a bad habit with base-runners from the paper town but they never seem to get over it. The Porkies picked off five men on attempted steals.

The day itself wasn't so good for baseball on the South Porcupine diamond. A high wind from the South blew dust all over the place whenever a player moved, and a scarcity of drinking water kept the players a little too dry for comfort.
