

# Macs Still Best but Hollinger Ball Team Improves

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## Holly Team Better, But Lose 4-2 to Macs Friday

### Eddie Angrignon Gets Homer in Sixth With None On, Chambers and Wood Pitch Steady Ball, but Hollinger Errors More Costly Than McIntyre.

With Inky Wood on the mound for McIntyre and Lloyd Chambers hurling for Hollinger, both of them for the full nine innings, the best ball game of the season to date, played Friday night at the Timmins park, gave the Macs another win. The score was 4-2, but the ninth had a whirlwind finish when Hollinger had two on base with only one down.

Neither Wood nor Chambers were in top form, but both pitched nice steady ball. Not once did either lose control of the game, and as far as their records for the game go, they were just about even. Wood had six strikeouts to Chambers' five; Wood walked two and Chambers three. Wood allowed five hits to Chambers' seven.

Though the Macs had four errors to Holly's one, Hollinger came in worse spots and were responsible for the scoring of two runs. The Macs' four only cost them one run.

It was a fast game and set up a record for the season for time, one hour and 40 minutes. A fair crowd saw it and gave just as much applause to the visitors as to the home team.

**Angrignon Gets Homer**  
Eddie Angrignon, the Macs' heavy centre fielder, got the big hit of the day in the sixth inning. With one man down and nobody on bases, he cracked one out to centre field that landed on the top step of the football bleachers. Smith started up the bleachers after it, but the ball trickled down and Smitty had to do some gymnastics to recover it at all. In the meantime Angrignon had made the circuit. On the Timmins diamond, hits go for what can be made of them, so Eddie's is in the book as a homer. Another foot on the length of the drive would have carried the ball over the fence.

The Macs made the first run of the game in the third, after they had been held to one hit in two innings by Chambers. Adamson, up first in the third, drove one into the bleachers that should have netted him a triple, but he was held at second. Wood flied out to Donovan in right field, but Adamson was still held at his base. The runner made third as Malloy went out, Roumaldi to Dorey. Hann's single scored

**Two On But No Runs**  
Holly tried hard to even up in the last of the ninth, but couldn't quite make the grade. Osborn caught a foul fly from Coleman. Wagar hit and made second as Chambers got on base when Cybulski made his first error of the season by dropping a grounder. The runners were left on base as Spratt and Roumaldi went out at first on plays from Osborn and Quinn.

The only double play of the day was in McIntyre's first. Malloy had gone out as Dorey picked up his grounder and touched the bag. Hann walked and took second as Cybulski went out. Monaghan to Dorey. Dorey snapped the ball across in time to get Hann attempting third.

## Dome Footballers Win Over Macs in Clean Game

### Score 2-1 at P.D.F.L. Under Way Again. Macs Have Ball for Most of Time but Fail at Net. Baxter, Dome Goalie, in Good Form.

Dome took another step up the ladder in the Porcupine District Football league on Saturday evening when they defeated McIntyre 2-1 in a fast, clean game at the McIntyre field.

Though the Macs had possession of the ball for the greater part of the time, Baxter in the Dome net played a sterling game and was responsible for save after save. Barnes and Foster the Dome backs were right on the spot, most of the time and checked all McIntyre attempts hard.

McIntyre had the edge on corners but failed to make one of them; good. Reg. Dunstan scored the first goal for the Macs about five minutes into the game. Bill Rodgers started the play that ended in front of the net when Gibb sent a short pass to Dunstan.

Joe White tied the score in another five minutes when Galbraith sent a perfect one over from a corner.

### The Broken Near End

It was very close to the end of the game when the tie was broken. For a long time it looked as if McIntyre would be the team that would be up before full time was called. Just a few minutes before the end, Bill White came down the field after repeated attempts to break through, passed to Chambers who avoided his check and went in on top of the goal. He drew Brockbank out, then shot hard. It was a well-earned goal.

After that, the Macs put on all the pressure they could muster. Even the halves got in close to the goal and Jimmy Dawson had a good try. Rodgers took a number of pot shots from his wing but was high. The Dunstan brothers made a corner and Ed's centre was picked up by Reg. and Baxter took a waist high shot neatly. The Macs could do almost anything they liked except score.

During the few minutes at the end, there was plenty of aerial work. The ball went up and down the field from the Dome halves to the McIntyre halves, was headed from one to another and the tactics probably saved the game for the Dome.

### Slippery Turf

**These Slow Britishers**  
You heard a lot about the 500-mile race at Indianapolis early this summer. But did you hear about the one at Bonneville, Salt Flats, Utah, that was run on the pavement-like white salt of a little inland lake? All it rated in the metropolitan papers was a little paragraph that went something like this: "United States supremacy in automotive speed passed to England to-day as three sons of John Bull hurried their big, gray bullet racer across Lake Bonneville's salt beds here for a new 24 hours endurance record. Led by John Cobb, London broker, the daredevil trio travelled 3,231.2 miles at an average speed of 134.5 miles per hour, eclipsing the 127.2 miles per hour average set in 1934 single-handed by Ab Jenkins, Salt Lake driver."

A distance equal to the breadth of the continent in 24 hours by motor car is some test for the car itself. But what about the British drivers who arrived in America with no fuss or furor, did their job and packed up for home again. And they're not professional drivers, at that, as Cobb's occupation indicates. They call it sport "over there."

**Used-27 Softballs**  
The men's softball league only has 22 more games to be played. Secretary Les Thompson figured the other day. The league isn't in the hole yet and won't be for a little while. The entry fee to the league for each team brought in a considerable amount of revenue, but the week-end games were expected to realize enough to keep the thing well ahead all the summer through. Miserable weather has been responsible for the biggest drop. If it doesn't rain hard enough to stop the games, it drives the crowd away. No people—no dimes. The league is getting better all the time and play is definitely improving over what it was like when it started out in June. Probably none of the teams would go far in an Ontario championship match, but that isn't the idea of the thing. The object is to provide good clean sport for a maximum number of softballers. That's being accomplished.

To date, the league has used 27 softballs, says the secretary. That and the paying of a small sum to umpires, runs away with a lot of money in a thirty-game schedule. The league is probably one of the few in the country that runs a schedule and a half. Every team meets every other team three times.

Eddie Angrignon's homer wasn't any surprise. He's been hitting heavily and regularly all season. Osborn had a bad day. He's had at least one triple in the last three games the Macs have played. But he couldn't find Chambers.

C. C. Auchincloss of Roslyn, L.I., is my most loyal and successful pupil. C. C. has played golf for 35 years. His intelligent application of my instructions enabled him to put aside habits of long standing. In the first six months he worked with me he shot in the 70's no less than seven times to win a bet made with some of his friends. Auchincloss won the bankers' tournament in 1934 and 1935 over the difficult National course at Southampton, L.I. The field included a former national amateur champion.

I mention these things because most players, in getting this far, would consider themselves pretty good. Auchincloss continues to improve his swing. Like most players, he was under the impression that he should putse at the top of his backswing. In trying to do so he would tighten up and spoil his downswing. At this point he makes sure to keep in motion. This makes it easy for him to whip the clubhead down with the necessary speed.

Sparks and Walsh each allowed 14 hits; Sparks gave one walk and Walsh three; and Sparks struck out eight to Walsh's seven.

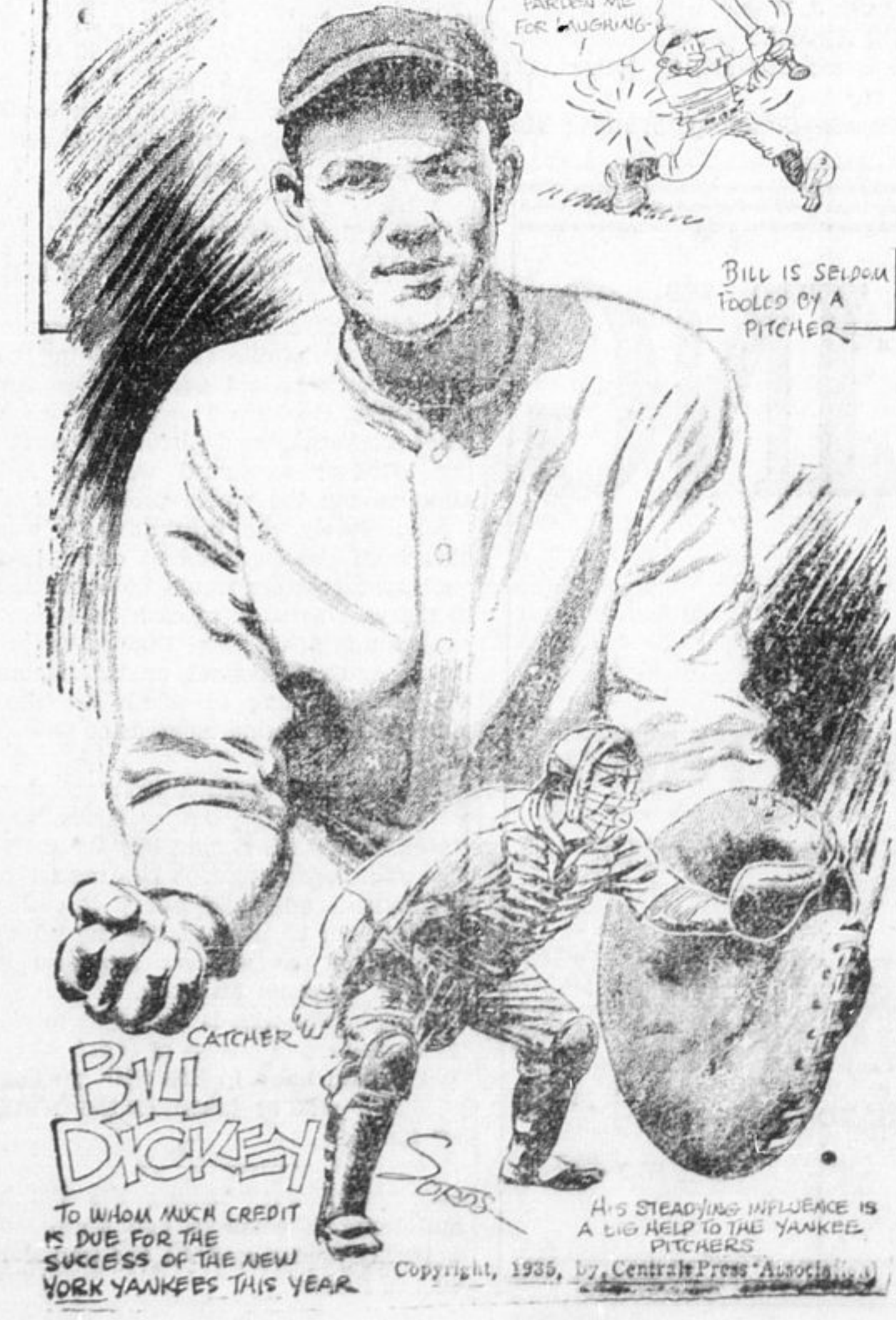
