Geo. E. Hale Opening Studio of Musical Art in Timmins

Geo. E. Hale, A.L.C.M., for several years a valued resident of Timmins, and prominent in musical circles here, returned this week from Saskatoon, Sask., where he has been for some years past. Mr. Hale was in Timmins a couple of months ago and at the solicitation of friends here then decided to open a studio of musical art in Timmins and South Porcupine. To conclude his affairs he returned to that Western city for a time and is now back in Timmins to follow out his plans of resuming his music classes here. Before leaving Saskatoon to resume permanent residence in Timmins Mr. Hale was made the recipient of several pleasing presentations expressing the appreciation felt for his notable services to music and community life in the West. He was fairly showered with testimonials as to his talent and ability as a musical director, and regret for his departure from the West. Along with these expressions were sincere good wishes for his personal success in the East. An item from The Star-Phoenix, the daily newspaper at Saskatoon, is published in this issue and expresses the feelings of Mr. Hale. Mr. Hale won fame in the West as the musical director of the Philharmonic Society, the leader of the Westminster church choir and the director of a children's choir that won a high place in musical circles in the West. Mr. Hale will be welcomed back to the Porcupine camp by a host of old friends and he will soon make many new friends in musical and other circles. He is a certified teacher of music of the Home Sol-Fa College, London, England, and a graduate of the University Conservatoire, Chicago.

McNulty and Griffin Get Three Cups in Swim Meet

Annual Golden City Event Bigger and Better Than Ever as Local Swimmers Show Good Form and High Speed. Close Finish in Two Mile Race as Eddie Caswell Loses by 35 Seconds.

The big swim at Golden City last week-end brought out the best of the talent in the district and showed some surprisingly good times for the distance events. In the two mile race, Chris McNulty and Eddie Caswell had a real fight for the first lap or so, and swam along side by side. McNulty kept up his speed all the way and in the end had only a 35 second lead on the Schumacher lad. Jimmy Burns, South Porcupine, made a good third, coming in about two minutes after Caswell.

Murray Griffin, hefty Hollinger student miner, had an easy time winning the mile event. He finished with only a 40 yard lead over Jack Dewar, but was not straining himself to make time.

Close Finish in 100 Yards. Pete Ostrosser and Murray Griffin made a good finish to the 100 yard race. They were only three yards apart when they crossed the line. McNulty was third.

McIntyre relay team had an easy win in the relay.


